Accidentally Shot.

Fred Martin, about 20 years of age, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Martin in Oscoda, was killed on Sunday morning while hunting several miles north of that place. There was a party of three, each of whom were chasing down a rabbit, and when the other two failed to shoot it Martin cried that he would get it. The other two heard the fatal shot but were not alarmed

until after calling several times to know if he had captured the rabbit and no response came. They then started to look for the boy and after 20 minutes' search came across the dead body. The shot was located in the upper part of the chest. The body was found face downward and the boy evidently lived for some minutes after falling. His thumb was thrust about an inch into the wound. The body was brought down at 8 o'clock the same night and was taken to the home of his parents.

The Destruction Caused by Voracious Insects.

Statisticians say that the chinch bug annually destroys crops valued at \$60,000,000; that the grasshopper eats up \$50,000,000 worth; the Hessian fly \$40,000,000; the cotton root worm, the corn ear worm, the cotton boll weevil and the codling moth of apple each \$20,000,000, the army worm \$15,000,000, the cotton leaf worm and the potato bug \$8,000,000. This makes a total of \$298,000,000 worth of products that might have been expected to but never do get into the market because of the ravages of these most numerous insects. And this is not the only loss charged to their account. Shortage of crops affects various industries and increases prices, and a deal of money is spent in fighting the pests. Taking into account all these things, the annual loss in this country from insect pests, distributed among the various products, is estimated as follows: Cereal, \$200,000,000; animal products, \$175,000,000; forest and forest products, \$111,000,000; truck crops and hay and forage, \$53,000,000; cotton, \$50,000,000; fruits, \$27,000,000; tobacco, \$5,300,000; sugars, \$5,000,000; miscellaneous crops, \$5,800,000, and products in storage, \$100,000,000, making a total of \$785,000,000.

Sixty millions of dollars will have been spent by the middle of December by the United States on the Panama canal, and one of the first demands that will be made upon congress at the next session will be for an additional appropriation.

A Lansing despatch says a motion is being prepared in the attorney general's department asking the U. S. supreme court to advance for an early hearing the case in which the Michigan railroads attacked the validity of the ad valorem taxation law and which was decided in favor of the state in the United States district court at Grand Rapids. The case involves about \$5,000,000 which the railroads haven't paid under the new assessments.

Folk As a Prophet.

During a speech at Kansas City last Saturday, Gov. Folk, of Missouri made the following remarks:

"The next few years will be distinguished as the time in which industrial troubles are settled, the reign of special privileges brought to an end, the recognition of the doctrine of equal rights fixed in national politics and in the conscience of mankind. We are in the midst of the most dramatic period of American history, the period in which the people's rights are to be defined and observed as they never have been before.

"There have been a great reform movements in the days gone by but they were local; the vapours of graft were driven away and remained but a season, and then returned after the waves of public indignation had spent their fury. The present day presents a situation of brighter promise to our vision. Reform shows signs of becoming universal instead of local and transitory.

"Will it last? is the question. Will not the people soon forget and allow things to continue in the same old way? I answer no. Revolutions never go backward, and this is a revolution that has been wrought in the conscience of men."

The present movement, Governor Folk said, did not mean the destruction but rather the putting of the organization of political parties on a higher plane.

Admission Retarded By Land Monopoly.

The well-known newspaper correspondent, William E. Curtis, who recently has been investigating conditions in western states and territories and writing a series of articles for the Chicago Record-Herald on the growth and development of the great southwestern region, in his article on New Mexico speaks pointedly of the land monopoly of that territory. He declares that one of the most serious objections to the admission of New Mexico into the Union is that a considerable portion of its lands are held in large tracts by corporations and individual owners.

Nearly all the available water is also monopolized by these large land owners and thus settlers are shut out and development is retarded. A few of the grants have been subdivided and sold, but most of them are held as stock ranches or for speculative purposes. These grants date back to the time when the territory was a part of old Mexico and under the government of Spain. After the annexation of New Mexico, several of the grants were confirmed by our congress and by other courts. Claims for enormous tracts were confirmed to individuals who paid little or nothing for them. The Mora is the largest grant which remains undivided and embraces 2,100,000 acres or less.

The federal government has reserved large tracts of forest in different parts of the territory, which will insure the safety of some of the most important streams and sources of water supply.

No doubt these large land grants are a great hindrance to the settlement and development of New Mexico and therefore a serious objection to the admission of the territory to statehood.

 One hundred and twenty-eight persons lost their lives by the wrecking of the English steamer Hilda, off the north coast of France last Saturday night.

The annual report of the United States Geological survey for 1904 or the production of gold and silver puts Michigan among the producing states. It shows that \$70,000 worth of silver was mined in Michigan during the year. It was obtained as a by product in refining certain grades of Lake Superior copper.

The National Grange, in convention at Atlantic City, has formally resolved that the prohibition should be enacted against all intoxicating liquor. At the same meeting it unanimously adopted a resolution of George B. Horton of Michigan urging congress to remove the tariff on alcohol to be used in the arts.

A family of thirty-four persons named Koot arrived Wednesday. There are Mr. and Mrs. Koot, seventeen children and fifteen grand children. They come from Weatherford, Oklahoma, to take up a farm on the A. S. & N. W. and when they arrived here the pater was shy \$945.00, of which he had been robbed on the train. He had the money sewed up in his vest. It is said that there is a clew as to the identity of the thief and a possible chance of recovering the money.—Oscoda Press.

Nearly two tons of undersized pickeral were seized last Friday at the Michigan Central freight sheds in Bay City by Deputy Game Wardens Grant and Coombs.

The U. of M. football team defeated the University of Wisconsin at Ann Arbor last Saturday by a score of 12 to 0. The Michigan goal line has not been crossed this season.

The U. of M. regents authorized a \$14,000 addition to the university hospital to accommodate Drs. Parker and Canfield in their special work on eye, ear, nose and throat diseases.

The department of law at the University of Michigan still enrolls a larger number of students than any other law school in the nation, according to the last report of President Angell.

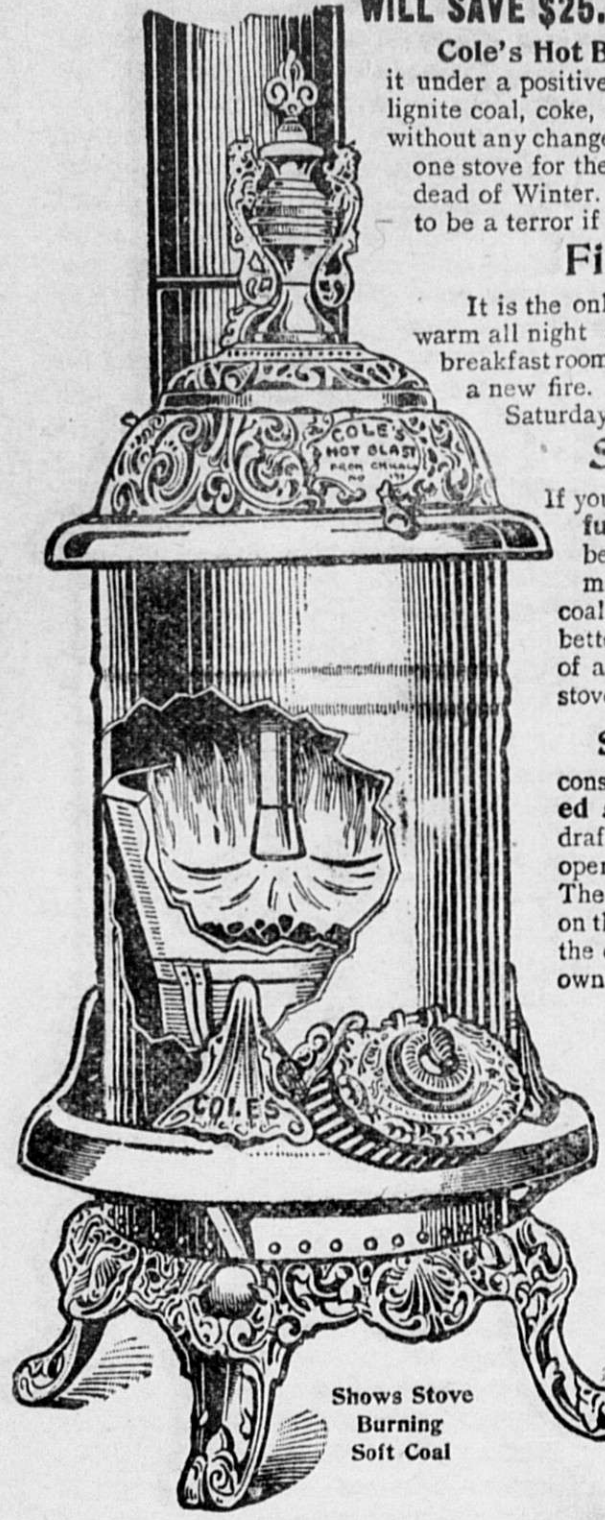
