To Our Subscribers.

A large number of subscriptions to the Herald have expired since October 1, which with the few that expired previous to that date, leaves a lot of our money in the pockets of our subscribers. We have secured Thomas E. Garber to make a collecting trip for us and between now and January 1st he will call on every subscriber in the county whose subscription has expired. We need the money and hope that each and every one will be ready to pay what is due when called upon.

Ten industries in the state employ 77,941 men, have invested capital of \$125,882,000, and the product annually is \$167,629,000, says Labor Commissioner McLeod. The industries are carriage and wagon factories, chemical plants, flour and grist mills, foundries and machine shops, furniture factories, tanneries, planing and saw mills, printing and publishing houses and tobacco and cigar factories.

The forces are gathering for a great fight in the coming congress over the question of railroad freight rates. President Roosevelt's ideas do not conform with the views of the railroad magnates, and consequently there is a division in the republican ranks. It is simply the old question of the common people against the money power, and it is an even bet that the best that will be secured will be a compromise that will not hurt the railroads. There are too many men in the United States senate who are elected by the money power, to see that power injured by honest legislation.

The machine papers of the state are now taking upon themselves the job of explaining to the people the working of the so called primary election law, passed by the last legislature. The plan seems to be to impress on the people that while the machine was opposed to any primary reform, the demand for it was so strong that they were forced to comply, and if the people do not find it successful they are only to blame themselves. The legislature that passed the law which now disgraces our statutes knew full well that they were not giving the people what they demanded and that the law enacted would be a farce and failure. It is innumerable with a lot of complications and drafted by a man whose whole aim as a legislator has been to defeat the will of the people. The one idea was to make something that would convey to the people that primary reform was a delusion. That an honest, simple primary bill would put an end to the domination of the Dohertys, Bairds and other machine men in our state legislature there can be no doubt. It is equally as evident that such a law will never be enacted so long as these men are intrusted to make the laws.

More Than \$8,000,000.

Dividend disbursements by Lake Superior copper mining companies during the current year will be the largest since 1899 and 1900 and with the exception of those years the largest in the history of the district. Already this year the dividend payments of the Michigan copper mines aggregate more than \$8,000,000. The earnings of these mines in 1905 will be the largest since active operations were commenced in this district more than 60 years ago.

Calumet & Hecla's total dividend payments will at the end of the year aggregate \$92,350,000, a record not equaled by any other mining company in the world. While the Calumet & Hecla has a magnificent past its future is rosy and the company will be a prominent factor in the copper mining world for many years to come.

U. S. Mint Grinds Out \$91,172,729.

A Washington dispatch says the annual report of Director Roberts of the United States mint bureau shows that the domestic coinage for the year amounted to \$91,172,729 and to 152,422,302 pieces. The coinage for the Philippines islands was 29,390,526 pieces; for Panama, 6,435,000 pieces; for Costa Rica 420,000 pieces, and for San Salvador 400,000 pieces. Total coinage, 189,097,828 pieces.

The total coinage for the Philippine islands to June 30, 1905, was 116,484,859 pieces, and the total payment by the insular government to reimburse the United States for the cost of the same has been \$398,335. The insular government also supplied the metal.

The original deposits of gold at the mints and assay offices amounted to \$143,378,969.

A summary of all earnings and expenditures, including seigniorage on silver and minor coins shows that the total earnings and gains of the mint service exceeded expenditures by \$3,289,019. The earnings amounted to \$2,024,635, of which the principal items are:

Parting and refining charges, \$246,861; seigniorage on subsidiary silver coins, \$2,772,737; seigniorage on minor coins, \$1,688,986; gains on bullion deposits, \$69,604; received for coinage for foreign countries, \$51,720; received for coinage for Philippine government \$134,370.

The expenditures aggregated \$1,745,615, of which the principal items are: New equipment, \$151,584; paid in salaries and wages, \$1,038,494; contingent expenses, \$437,449.

The director recommends that the provision of law which requires the mints to pay out subsidiary coin on demand should be repealed and all coin paid out hereafter through the offices of the treasury. There is a constant demand on the mints for new coin, although an abundance of coin in good condition, but which is not wanted because it has been in circulation, is in the treasury.

The director announces that all silver bullion purchased under the acts of 1878 and 1890 is now gone, the accounts with it closed, and the coinage of the silver dollar is at an end unless in the future new legislation upon the subject is passed. He says: "The silver dollar was originally authorized by the act of April 2, 1792, the first coinage act of the United States. The first dollar pieces were struck at the mint in Philadelphia in 1793.

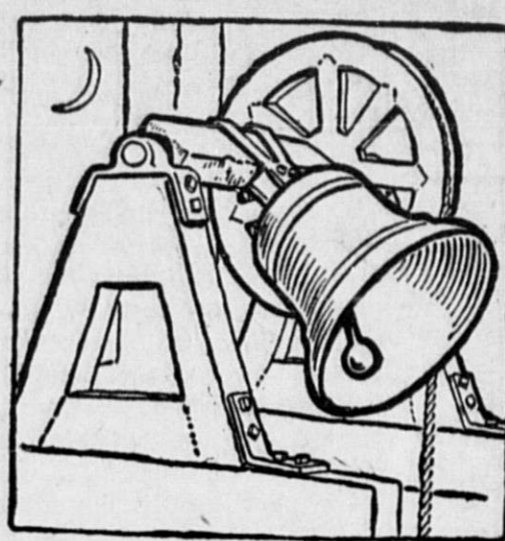

Mortality During October.

There were 2,838 deaths returned to the Secretary of State for October, or about 200 fewer than in the preceding month. The death rate was 13.1 per 1,000 population, somewhat higher than the rate for October, 1904 which was 12.0.

By ages there were 681 infants under 1 year, 219 children aged 1 to 4 years and 747 deaths of elderly persons over 65.

Important causes of death were as follows: tuberculosis of lungs, 163; other forms of tuberculosis, 27; typhoid fever, 102; diphtheria and eroup 57; scarlet fever, 11; measles, 2; whooping cough, 13; pneumonia, 97; diarrhea and enteritis of infants, 337; cancer, 141; accidents and violence, 175.

There was a very marked increase in the number of deaths from typhoid fever, and the number of deaths occurring from this cause, 102, was the largest reported for any month since the year of 1900.

Diphtheria and eroup also increased while diarrheal diseases as usual at this season showed fewer deaths.

There was no deaths from smallpox. One death from chickenpox was reported from Coldwater township, Branch county.

Halfback Bannard an Author.
William H. Bannard, the noted Princeton football coach, who was halfback on three varsity teams in the late nineties, has invaded the ranks of the athletic authors. In his recently issued book, "Football—How to Play," Bannard showed marked ability as an analyzer and teacher of the great game.

The famous halfback neglects no feature of the game, describing signals and trick plays as well as the duties of the respective players.

Bannard was one of the greatest end running halfbacks that ever donned

mole skin. His sensational dashes around the wings of Harvard and Yale elevens will live long in gridiron history.

After leaving Princeton Bannard was head coach at Cornell and Northwestern universities in different years, later returning to take charge of operations at the New Jersey institution.

Fitzsimmons and O'Brien.

Bob Fitzsimmons and "Philadelphia Jack" O'Brien will fight in San Francisco early in January. The terms are all fixed, but the number of rounds is to be left to the discretion of Coffroth. The attitude of the Frisco authorities toward them will go a long way toward influencing Coffroth in this matter.

Fitzsimmons is said to be in favor of a finish, but it is doubtful if O'Brien is. Very likely the bout will be set for fifty rounds, which means a finish fight in daylight.

The fight will be for the heavyweight championship, according to Fitz, though O'Brien has never claimed to be a heavyweight fighter.

The principals are to receive 60 per cent of the gross receipts, which will be divided on a basis of 75 per cent to the winner and 25 per cent to the loser. Moving pictures are to be taken, the division of receipts from them to be fixed later.

Indians as Football Players.

One of the most eminent authorities has stated that a pound of Indian muscle, so far as endurance and tenacity are concerned, is worth one and a half pounds of white man's muscle.
