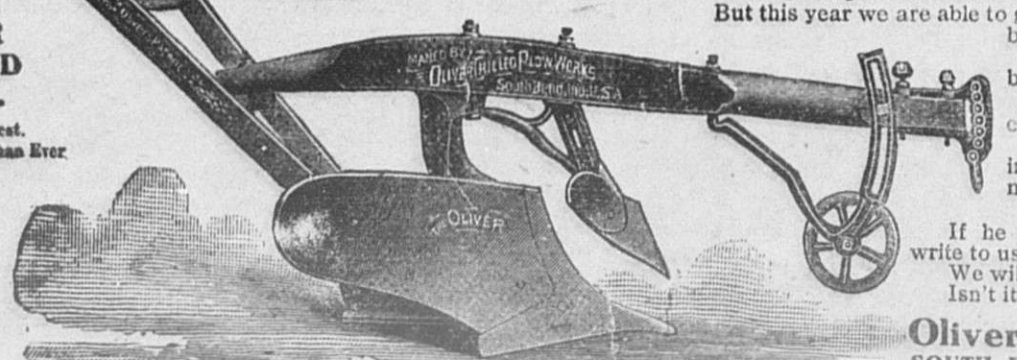

Gen. Joseph Wheeler, famous as a Confederate cavalry officer and a brigadier general of the United States army since the war with Spain, in which he participated, died in New York city of pneumonia, Thursday, aged 69 years.

It is the talk among Lansing republicans that Gov. Warner is bending every effort to prevent a warm senatorial fight, feeling that his personally appointed tax commission has given the party about all the lead it can carry in the coming campaign, and fearing that too much interest in the legislative ticket will mean the sacrifice of the state ticket.

A strenuous effort is being made by the state administration to have Attorney General Bird cease his fight on the recent railroad assessment. It is being pointed out to him that unless the matter is smoothed over it is liable to be detrimental to the republican state ticket this fall, and especially so to Gov. Warner. The attorney general is firm in his determination to make the fight against the railroad assessment as well as against the rate of taxation, and he is receiving many evidences of appreciation of his stand from the public at large.

Christian the Ninth, the aged king of Denmark, dean of the crowned heads of Europe, father of King George of Greece, of Queen Alexandra of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the dowager empress, Maria Feodorovna, of Russia, grandfather of King Haakon VII, of Norway, and related by blood or by marriage to most of the European rulers, died with startling suddenness in the Amalienborg palace Copenhagen Monday aged 89 years. He has reigned for 54 years. The accession of his successor, Prince Frederick, his eldest son, who will be known as Frederick VIII, was proclaimed Tuesday.

In Michigan the legislative sessions are prolonged to four and five months or longer, whereas all the business ought so be transacted in 90 days. The free pass is largely responsible for the delay. Not having to pay fare—at least out of their own pockets—the members make frequent trips home and go sight seeing and visiting when they should be applying themselves at Lansing. The prolongation of the session costing the state about \$1,000 a day, represents a heavy tax upon the people as a direct result of the free pass evil. The railroads may not get a direct benefit from the frequent vacations and recesses, but it is certain the people pay.—Hancock Evening Journal.

### Expert Advice on Advertising

### Coal Production for 1905.

The Black Diamond, the leading coal trade paper of the United States, published statistics of the coal production of the country for the year 1905, showing that the total output was 367,474,393 tons, as compared with 352,310,427 tons in 1904, an increase of 15,163,966 tons. The probable tonnage capacity of the United States at this time is very close to 400,000,000 tons of coal, but owing to the prolonged car shortage during October and November of last year, the output was materially reduced in practically every state.

The four states showing the greatest increase in production during the past year, in order of their rank, were Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Colorado and Illinois. Many of the older producing states show a slight decrease, due to the interruption by the car shortage referred to. The production in Michigan was 1,342,840 tons in 1904 and 901,000 tons in 1905.

Anthracite production shows an increase of practically 4,500,000 tons, having been the heaviest in the history of the industry, exceeding 1903, when the production was 74,607,068 tons, by 3,304,787.

### Arenac May Take Up the D. & M's Proposition.

Arenac county is considering the proposition made recently by the Detroit & Mackinac railroad to furnish laid down gravel for from 10 to 12 miles of improved gravel country road. The proposition of the railroad is to build its track along the main road from three to five miles, as the county may elect, out of Omer. The company will then deliver the gravel along the road and at intersections for 25 cents per yard. All cross roads are to be improved for a distance of one mile on either side of the main road. This with five miles of main road, would give about 12 miles of improved gravel road, the entire cost for material being but \$3,600 on a basis of 1,200 cubic yards to the mile.

The Detroit & Mackinac is willing to do this because of the encouragement to good roads building which would benefit it in two ways—one by giving the farmer better access to railroad transportation points, and the other increased freight on road making material.—Bay City Tribune.

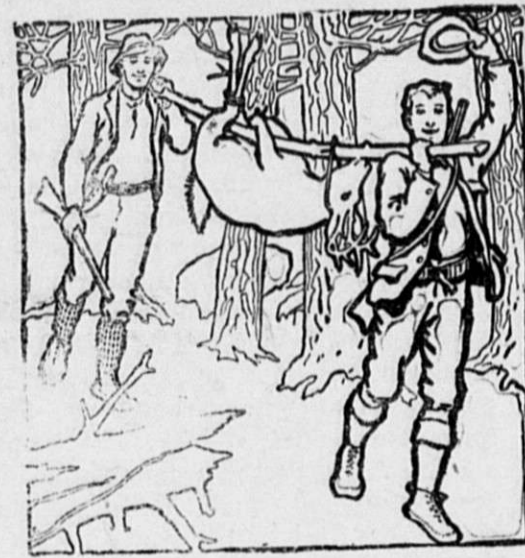
