

Sugar Factories.

A statement of much interest in relation to the proportions of the beet sugar industry in the state has been issued by Labor Commissioner McLeod. The cost of the plants was \$10,220,-000, or an average of \$638,000 each. The aggregate acreage of beets raised in 1904 was 58,213, or 3,880 for each plant, and in 1905 it was 79,457 acres an average of 4,766. The acreage in 1904 produced 328,316 tons of beets: and the estimate for the 1905 season is 566,638 tons. The average tons per

acre-being 5.7 in 1904 and the average sugar percentage 15.2; for 1905 the figures are 7 and 15.2 per cent. Sugar made in 1904 totaled 108,-
