 The second annual banquet of the Citizens' Social Club of the 23rd Judicial Circuit was held at the Elliott hotel, Oscoda, Wednesday evening.  The annual convention of the Y. P. S. C. E. of the 12th district was held at the Congregational church, Alpena, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Feb. 23, 24 and 25, and though the attendance of delegates from the societies throughout the district was not what might have been desired, the convention was a very successful and inspiring one.
 The Alpena societies had spared no pains to entertain the delegates and a very entertaining program had been prepared for the occasion. Those in charge had secured for the convention the services of Rev. R. H. M. Augustine, of Sandusky, Mich. and E. T. Lindsay, of Saginaw, corresponding secretary of the Michigan Union, both very able speakers and enthusiastic Christian Endeavorers.
 On Friday evening a short program was carried out after which a reception was tendered to the visiting delegates and a general good time enjoyed.
 Saturday forenoon occurred the regular business session, reports, appointment of committees, etc. The nominating committee in its report which was given at the evening session recommended the following officers for the ensuing year, which were endorsed by the convention?

 Saturday afternoon several five minute talks were given on various subjects, followed by a round table conducted by E. T. Lindsay. In the evening Rev. C. Wendling Hastings, of Tawas City, preached a very interesting and able sermon on "Christian Endeavor Evangelism," followed by Rev. Augustine in a short talk on the Clark Memorial and E. T. Lindsay on "Millions for Endeavor."
 Sunday morning Rev. Augustine preached an excellent sermon in the Presbyterian church, while Miss Pearl Williams, pastor of the Friends church at Onaway and E. T. Lindsay conducted the services at the Congregational church. In the afternoon a men's meeting was held at the Presbyterian church in charge of Rev. Augustine and a children's meeting at the Congregational church conducted by Mrs. Dillenbeck, of Whittemore, both very largely attended.
 In the evening at 6:30 a union meeting of the young people's societies of the city, of all denominations, was held, led by Mrs. Latham, of Alpena, who presented in a very interesting manner the life and work of Dr. Neesima, the great Japanese missionary, that being the Christian Endeavor topic for that date. Following this was the convention sermon, preached by Rev. Augustine, and a general consecration service to close the convention.
 Delegates present from Tawas City were Miss Jessie Robinson, Miss Ethel McCombs, Miss Margaret McRae, Rev. C. W. Hastings and Jas. E. Ballard. In response to a cordial invitation from this society it was decided to hold the next convention, which occurs in October, at Tawas City.
 Plans were formulated for a very active campaign throughout the district during the coming months and it is to be hoped that the next convention will see a material increase both in the number of societies in the district and in the membership of those already formed.

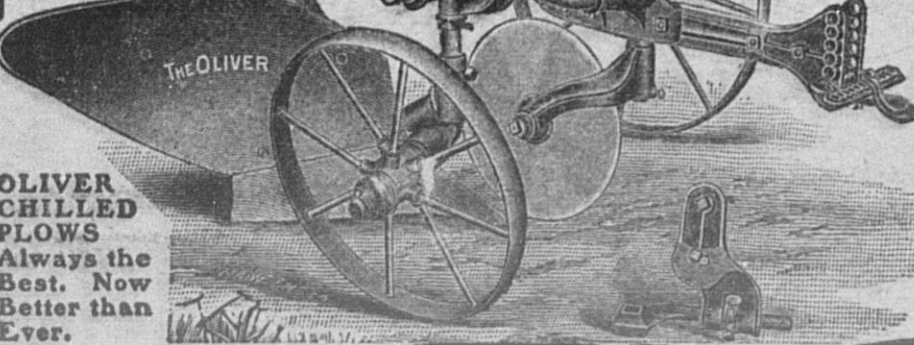

Revising The Constitution.

There are some things to be considered before voting on the question of the revision of the constitution. If it shall be decided to call a constitutional convention, it will cost the people directly nearly \$100,000 before a new constitution can be framed. The chances are that unless the work is admirably done the new constitution will be rejected. Even if it shall be approved, our laws will be unsettled for a long period of years and decisions of the courts interpreting the present constitution will be valueless.

At the same time we believe a revision of the constitution is desirable. Salaries should be readjusted to present conditions; municipal ownership should be provided for, and home rule should be granted cities and villages to a large extent. The constitution should contain some new provisions and some of the old sections might safely be eliminated.

It is possible however, that the time is not ripe for revision. This is a period of transition in governmental affairs. We are passing from the old to the new order of things. Many reforms are being agitated although but few of them have been given effect. It may be that in a few years more the atmosphere will have become purified, and we shall see some things in a different light.

The present constitution framed after the organic law of Massachusetts but differing in some particulars has served us well, developed our noble individual rights. It should not lightly be cast aside. No better subject for discussion can be found than that of constitutional revision.—*Lansing Journal*.

Galbraith Law Violates the Constitution.

In an unanimous opinion written by Justice Montgomery the state supreme court Monday held unconstitutional the Galbraith law which provided for the equalization by a state board of assessors of the assessment of railroad property and that of other properties in the state.

The law was enacted by the legislature of 1905 and governed the action of the state board of assessors in making their first, tentative, assessments of properties this year.

The court, in its opinion, says that the language of the constitutional amendment which provides that the railroad property of the state shall pay the same rate as other properties is too plain to need interpretation and means that there can be but one rate for all classes of property. The state board of assessors in making their final assessments of railroad property this year ignored the Galbraith law.

The political knave, like any other knave can do no harm unless there be opportunity and the opportunity in this case is afforded by the indifference of the citizen or by the citizen's fatuous devotion to his party. It is this kind of a man who has made the name politician less than honorable, by neglecting his own political duties. It is right, and it should be most honorable, for a man whose tastes and abilities urge him in that direction, to become a politician, and if such a man could always feel sure that public opinion would sustain him in doing right, there would be small temptation for him to do wrong.—*Philadelphia North American*.

The Lumber Output.

A statement of the pine lumber output of the three states of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota for 1905, published in the American Lumberman says:

There was last year a total production of white and norway pine in the three states of 3,628,029,000 feet against 4,220,917,000 in the year 1904, showing a decrease of 500,935,000 feet. This has been the average decrease for the last four years, and should this rate of decrease continue, the Lumberman estimates that with the present cutting capacity, the annual output will taper down to nothing in six and a half years.

In 1873 the preponderation output was in Michigan and eastern Wisconsin, now the greater production is in northwestern Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Direct Nominations Schedule For 1906.

APRIL 2—Party enrollment

MAY 12—Time expires for filing petitions for the submission of the act to a party referendum in each political district.

These petitions must be signed by a number of enrolled members of the party equal to 20 per cent of the vote cast in that district for the party candidate for governor in 1904.

JUNE 12—Party referendum in all political districts where petitions have been filed.

Delegates apportioned to each election district by party committees, to be elected by direct vote to attend county conventions to send delegates to state conventions.

On this day each party must proceed to nominate by direct vote its candidates for governor and lieutenant-governor.

On this day each party must also vote by referendum for or against this method of making nominations for these offices.

If any person receives a plurality and 40 per cent of the total party vote cast for the nomination for either office, and

If a majority of such person's party vote in favor of this method of making nominations for these offices—

Then such person is the nominee of that party.

But if both of these conditions are not complied with, the nominations of that party's candidates for governor and lieutenant-governor revert to the state convention, where minor candidates on the state ticket will be nominated as heretofore.

JUNE 19—All county conventions for the selection of delegates to state conventions must be held on or before this day.

All county conventions of any one party must be held on the same day, to be designated by the state central committee.

AUG 12—All state conventions must be held on or before this day.

SEPT 4—Direct nominations to be held in all districts in which any party's referendum vote of June 12 favored such method.

Only members of each party who enrolled as such in April can vote at these party elections.

In all districts in which the necessary petitions are not filed by May

12, or in which any party votes against direct nominations on June 12, nominating conventions will be held by that party as heretofore.

Independent voters cannot participate in the nominations of any existing party without taking oath that they intend to support that party's ticket.

Supreme and circuit court judicial districts are exempt from the operation of this act.

All political districts existing wholly within the boundaries of Wayne, Kent, Muskegon and Alpena counties are exempt from the operation of this act.

The representation of each county in the state convention of any party shall be appointed by the state central committee according to the vote cast in that county for that party's candidate for governor in 1904.

Primary election ballots for the republican party shall be white; for the democratic party blue; and for the prohibition party red. Different colors must be designed for other parties by the election commissioners.

Names of candidates shall be printed on primary election ballots first in alphabetical order; then the positions of the names shall be changed as often as there are candidates for any nomination, and to give an even division of ballots on this basis as possible.

Any person who wishes to have his name printed on the party ballot as a candidate for a nomination under the direct voting system, must first file with the proper officer a petition signed by a number of the enrolled members of his party equal to 2 per cent of the votes cast in that district by that party for governor in 1904.

Solicting votes or "plugging" within 100 feet of a voting booth is prohibited; and primary day is declared an election day within the meaning of the act governing the liquor traffic on such occasions.

This act applies to all congressional senatorial, representative, county and city districts. A plurality is necessary to nominate.
