The net earnings of the United States Steel Corporation last year was only a paltry \$119,787,658. It is certainly a "steal trust."

Remember that if you wish to vote on the adoption or rejection of the so-called primary law, next June, you will have to register on April 2.

The National Educational Association Convention to be held in San Francisco from July 7th to 14th, is likely to be the largest and the most important ever held by that organization.

Every effort is being made by the republican machine of the state to have their so-called primary law adopted. If the voters of Michigan ever adopt this hybrid law all hopes of an honest primary law, or a practical one, is lost for years to come.

In selecting your city and township officials at the coming election let the question of qualification be considered rather than party. If this rule is followed better officials will be secured and a better administration of local affairs will be had. If you have a man who has been favorable to all kinds of graft, the proper place for him is not in office.

There will be two ballots voted at the spring election on April 2. Besides the ballot for the city and ward offices there will be a ballot submitting the question of calling a convention for the purpose of revising the constitution. This is an important question and it is the duty of the person handing out the city ballot to also hand out to the voter the one relating to the constitution.

That the constitution of Michigan is in need of revision there is no doubt, or that many improvements can be made. The question of holding a convention for this purpose will be submitted to the voters of the state at the coming spring election. If the vote is favorable the convention will be held and the revision adopted by it will then be submitted to the voters for their approval.

It is doubtful if in all the years of Spanish rule in the Philippines a more heartless slaughter of the natives can be found than that by American troops last week, when 900 natives, including women and children were slain. What the natives of these islands gained by a change from Spanish to American rule is hard to see. Such acts as these should bring a blush of shame to the cheek of every true, liberty loving American.

Because there are men in Iosco county who aspire to serve in the state senate or the lower house of the legislature, and who have the manhood to announce their desire, our neighbor the West Branch Herald-Times goes into hysterics about once a week and accuses them of a desire to "hog" all the offices. As yet the Herald-Times has not named a candidate from that county and it begins to look as though none could be found. So far as the senatorial nomination is concerned, it is practically assured that A. C. Carton of East Tawas will land it without much of an effort.

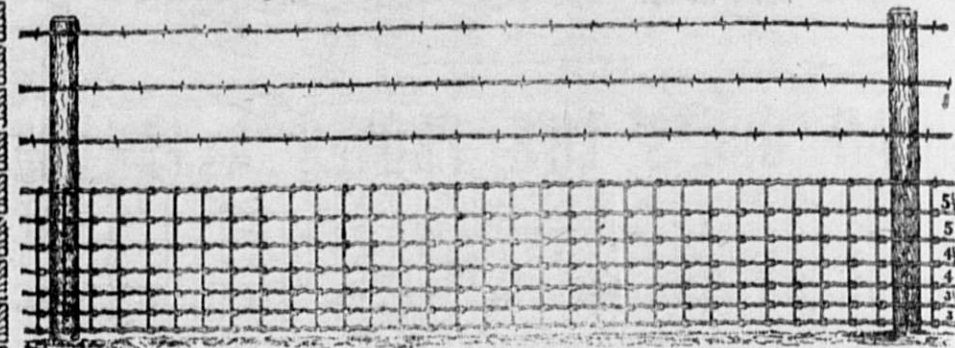

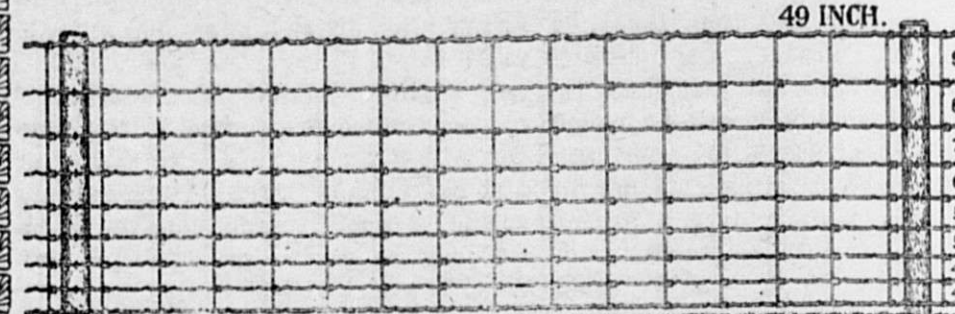

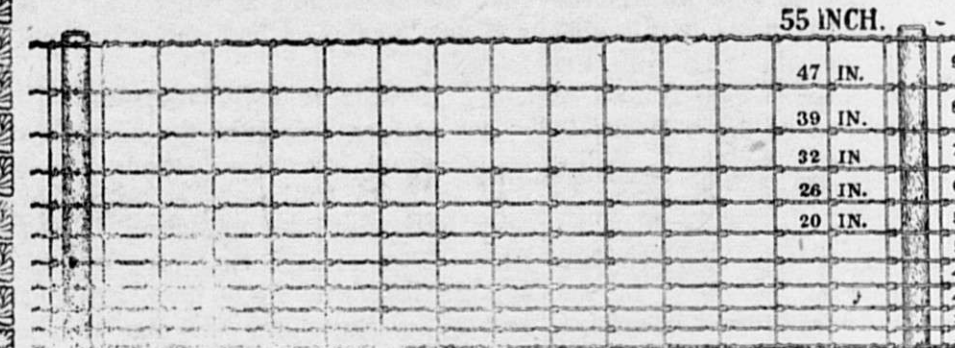
