The condition of winter wheat in this county is reported to be excellent this spring.

A slight blaze in John A. Grant's blacksmith shop called out the East Tawas fire department about 6 o'clock last evening. But little damage was done.

The ability of Mayor George Sutherland, of AuSable, as a presiding official were fittingly recognized by the board of supervisors last Monday when they re-elected him chairman of the board for the seventh consecutive term. The election was made by a unanimous vote.

Claud Hanson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hanson, of East Tawas, was a guest at the Grand Hotel, San Francisco, at the time of the great earthquake. He escaped without injury but lost what he had with him. Mr. Hanson is located at Kenapaw Nev., and was in San Francisco on business.

The indications are that a goodly number of delegates will be present from all points of the county at the county C. E. rally which opens at the Presbyterian church tomorrow. A very fine program has been arranged. Secretary Lindsay, of the Michigan Union, and W. A. Prince, of Alpena, will be present and take part in the exercises.

A company of outside capitalists are endeavoring to secure a franchise from this city and East Tawas for the erection of a commercial gas plant. Such an institution would be of much convenience both for the lighting and heating purposes. The matter will probably be considered by the city council in the near future.

While the calamity which befell San Francisco last week is one of the worst in the history of our country the damage to property nor the loss of life is not so large as at first anticipated. The suffering for want of food was intense for the first day or so, but the prompt relief furnished by the patriotic people from all parts of the country has done wonders in caring for the unfortunate.

## Board of Supervisors.

A special meeting of the new board of supervisors was held last Monday. The organization was completed for the ensuing year by electing Mayor George Sutherland, of AuSable, chairman, and Len J. Patterson of Tawas City, chairman pro tem. Both elections were made by a unanimous vote of the board.

The board granted a petition of a number of residents of Oscoda township to change the old state road in that township from the East side of Cedar lake to the West side, and Sherman township permission to raise a special highway tax of \$1000. The usual number of bills were allowed, and the board adjourned to meet June 25, at which time will occur the annual equalization of the county assessment rolls.

## D. & M. M. B. A.

The annual meeting of the members of the Detroit & Mackinac Mutual Benefit Association, composed of railroad employees, took place in this city last Sunday, at the Union Life Guards hall. There was a large attendance of railroad employes from various points along the line. The following officers were elected.

President—C. L. Bonney, of Tawas. Vice-Pres—P. O'Brien, of Alpena. Secretary—H. H. Funk, of Tawas. Treasurer—T. J. Hopper of Alpena. Relief Committee—Thomas Kennedy, Malcolm Morrison, Ernest Dege, T. Borland, C. Phillips, N. Robinson and James Nesbit.

Last year the benefits paid out amounted to \$4,269. Sick and accident benefits are paid and only members of the D. & M. railroad can be members of the association.—*Alpena Argus.*

## A Chance to Secure Good Roads.

State Highway Commissioner Horatio S. Earle, in speaking of the remarkable offer in the interests of good roads made to him by Mr. J. D. Hawks, president of the Detroit & Mackinac Ry. Co., said: "I re-offered his donation to Arenac county, the proposition being that they might pick out a road running at right angles to the D. & M. and the railroad would build a five mile spur track out this road and deliver twenty two thousand cubic yards of gravel, enough to build fifteen miles of road, at twenty five cents a cubic yard. This is about one third what the gravel would be worth, so it is a donation of eleven thousand dollars."

But Arenac county was like the man who was given a horse and who, before the donor had left, looked in the gift horse's mouth to see whether he was too old to accept or not—and the horse turned into a beautiful bird and flew away.

Then when it is carefully considered, Arenac was not only to get the eleven thousand dollar donation from the railroad, but would have received from the state for their fifteen miles of road, \$7,500 as a state reward, making a total of \$18,500, which would have been eighty seven per cent. of the cost of building the road. I am reminded of the man who would not accept a barn full of corn unless the donor would shell it.

This offer is now open to lakeside counties and the state commissioner is listening and wondering who will speak first, and not only speak but come up to the dough dish with the proof that they can and will build the road if given the donation.

The people of the United States are called upon to do more than send sympathy, and the opportunity is presented to us as citizens of the State of Michigan to prove that we are responsive to the call for aid from a stricken sister state. It is a time when it should be remembered that "he gives twice who gives quickly." The co-operation of mayors of cities, presidents of villages and other officials is asked in getting this matter before the people by calling public meetings or by taking such steps as they may deem best adopted to bring about the result which it is our plain duty to accomplish. The aid of churches, fraternal societies and other organizations, is requested, and the good work that can be done now by the press cannot be over-estimated.

Every contribution, large or small, sent to me for the relief of the sufferers in California will be at once acknowledged and transmitted to proper authorities.

Gov. Warner is certainly keeping up his reputation as a "machine" man. He has installed a gasoline engine and now milks his cows by machinery.

Hon. J. Adam Bede says senators would be honest if the government paid them larger salaries. The Hon. J. Adam should speak to them and ask them "right out" how much they would take to be honest.

If a town does not reach after the trade it will come only as fast as it has to; but if the merchants go after the business in the surrounding country, advertising in every way and make good every word of their advertising, trade will come from an ever increasing radius, the town will gain a reputation for being awake and it will forge to the front.

If, perchance, a copy of this paper should fall into the hands of any who are in search of a new location—a place where church, school and social advantages are given emphasis, and where you can live out your allotted number of years without fear of pestilence or famine, we say, like one of old, "Come thou with us and we will do thee good," without emphasis on the "do."

In a case at Detroit to test the constitutionality of the primary law, ex-Congressman Alfred Lucking made the point that the law is invalid because it violates every voter's right of secret ballot, says Mr. Lucking: "The present primary law does away with all secrecy and demands expression by viva voce, which is directly opposed to the intention of the constitution and is therefore unconstitutional."

Senator Bailly may not have convinced the railroad attorney in the U. S. Senate that congress has the power to deprive inferior courts of the right to suspend the rate fixed by the proposed commissioner for regulating railroad rates, but he has convinced every honest man and that is sufficient. There would be no need of having a commission if every little federal court could suspend its orders as the railroads own most of the federal judges.

In these days of strife between two great political parties we must remember that after all we are just a band of brothers here on earth, traveling from cradle to the grave. We live side by side, our children attend the same school and after the smoke of the battle has cleared away we will still be friends and neighbors. Let the bitter things be unsaid. At best, life is short, and we get out of it a full measure of sorrow. Let us in our little city live as one big, good natured family.

It is slowly but surely being learned that it is a poor public policy to allow the same men to hold office year after year, and it is becoming to be more and more recognized that not to exceed two terms in a public office is the best for honest and economical administration of public affairs. The man who is elected year after year is almost sure to become careless in the management of the affairs of his office, and when the same set of men have had charge of the affairs of a county or state for a number of years they find many ways of petty grafting which are very expensive to the taxpayers.

#### Crime Increasing.

In the penitentiary at Jackson  
there were in December, 681 prison-  
ers; in Ionia, 519; in Marquette, 293;  
in Ionia asylum for criminal insane;  
318, and in the Detroit house of cor-  
rection, 488. Of this latter number  
427 are men and sixty-one women.  
These figures which show an increase  
of 211 over the year previous, are  
from the state labor commissioner's  
report.

The cost of supplying food and  
clothing to the prisoners in all these  
institutions is very small. In Jack-  
son it averages fourteen cents a day;  
in Ionia it is nine and one-half cents;  
in Marquette ten and one-half; in  
Ionia asylum ten and one-half and in  
the Detroit house of correction thir-  
teen and one-half cents per day.
