For a New School.

MR. EDITOR:—

In these times when combinations and consolidation seem to be the proper thing to do to give strength and force to large business concerns, it occurs to me that the people of the two Tawas might put into practice some of these principles to the benefit of all of us.

Throughout the state in the country districts there is a general sentiment to build one central high school for each township, which gives better educational facilities for the school children of that township. This has been brought about by the state superintendent of public instruction at Lansing. This department has been urging the townships to take this course for some time.

Now to get quickly at what I have to say, I have this suggestion to make to the people of the two cities: Consolidate the two school districts of the towns, build one central high school and use our present school houses for ward schools. This will necessitate the employment of one superintendent of schools in place of two, lessen our taxes, raise the standard of both schools, increase their efficiency and give better quarters for our county normal department. It would have a tendency to draw pupils from the county, and all would be proud of our central high school.

Let us agitate this question, vote upon it at the coming election, and if the people approve of it, get an enabling act by the legislature this winter and build our school house next year.

I would like to see this matter discussed and if any one else has any ideas about it I shall be pleased to hear from them. F. F. FRENCH.
