The total membership of the Grand  
Army of the Republic is declared in  
the report of Adjutant General Twee-  
dale to be 235,823, an increase of 3,-  
468 during the last six months. The  
losses by deaths for the year ended  
December 31, 1905 were 9,205, or 3.90  
per cent of the total membership. In  
the preceding year the loss by death  
reached exactly the same percentage.
