A "named" trot or pace, between Air Motor, Harry K, the Curry mare and the Murray mare was pulled off to fill the program, and the horses finished in the order named.

The McMillen machine received a bad jolt at the Wayne county primaries last week, losing five of the 18 nominations for the legislature.

It is suggested that it must be a very strong platform the republicans will have to build in 1908, if they nominate Secretary Taft. He weighs several hundred.

After the Standard oil buys up all the distilleries, we may expect that enterprising corporation to be charged with drawing whisky and kerosene from the same tank.

If the attorney general goes ahead and collects the \$147,500,000 in fines for which Standard oil stands liable, won't that be a long step toward government ownership.

It begins to look as though the democrats of the tenth district were not even going to call a congressional convention to nominate a candidate against Congressman Loud.

Bryan's declaration for government ownership has accomplished one thing. It has brought from cover a few corporation attorneys who have been masquerading as democrats.

Independent republicans have united with the democrats in Ogemaw county this year and are making a strong fight to down the present "office holders" trust in that county. There is a strong feeling in that county against the continuation of one set of men in office year after year.

Must Speak English.

The act of congress to establish a bureau of immigration and naturalization and to provide for a uniform rule for the naturalization of aliens throughout the United States went into effect Thursday. The new law is very stringent in its requirements. In the future there will be no more rushing aliens into the courts for credentials upon which they may vote for any particular candidate or party.

Those getting out papers now declaring their intentions to become citizens will not come under the provisions of the new law, but will be allowed to secure citizenship papers when they have resided a sufficient length of time in the country. This must be done, however, within seven years or the declaration papers will be cancelled. One of the important sections of the new act is as follows: "That no alien shall hereafter be naturalized or admitted as a citizen of the United States who cannot speak the English language; provided, that this requirement shall not apply to aliens who are physically unable to comply therewith, if they are otherwise qualified to become citizens; and provided further, that the requirements of this section shall not apply to any alien who has prior to the passage of this act declared his intention to become a citizen in conformity to the law in force at the date

of making such declaration; provided further, that this section shall not apply to aliens who shall hereafter declare their intention to become citizens and who shall make homestead entries upon the public lands of the United States and comply in all respects with the laws providing for homestead entries on such lands."

The fees for securing papers are \$1 for declaration of intention to become citizens, and on the final hearing \$2. One half of the fees are retained by the clerk and the other half is turned over to the United States government.

All aliens entering this country will be required hereafter to procure from the immigration bureau a certificate of his intention to become a citizen and pay \$1 therefor. The penalty for violation of the law in any respect is very severe.

The new law imposes a lot of extra work upon clerks of the court where citizenship papers are procured.

Council Proceedings.

Regular meeting of the common council of the city of Tawas City held in the council rooms, Friday evening, Sept. 21, 1906.
Called to order by Mayor Wuggazer.
Present—Ald. Hadwin, Marzinski, Brabon, Davison, Attorney Jahraus and Clerk King. Quorum present, Minutes of special meeting Aug. 27th, 1906, read and approved.

Committee on ways, means and finance presented the following report. Your committee on ways, means and finance recommend that the following amounts to be raised by taxation upon the taxable property of the city of Tawas City for the ensuing fiscal year. The total amount to be raised \$2275.75 and shall be apportioned as follows:

Contingent Fund	\$ 600.00
General Street Fund	500.00

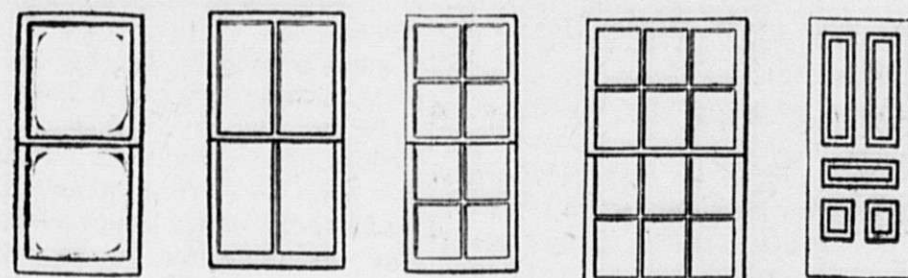

Solves Problem of Beet Harvest.

Saginaw, Sept. 23.—One of the most formidable obstacles to the development of the Michigan beet sugar industry has been that of the labor involved in the cultivation and harvesting of the beets.

Not only is help scarce and high-priced but it has been generally difficult to obtain at any price. It will be gratifying to beet sugar manufacturers and beet growers to learn that the problem in this matter in so far as it concerns the harvesting of the beets has been practically and successfully solved.

During the last three weeks a series of tests have been made with a beet harvesting machine on what is known as the Dunning farm, three miles south of Saginaw, and the machine has demonstrated its thorough success and ability to do what is claimed for it.

It was invented some five years ago and no difficulty was experienced at the outset in pulling the beets but the owners are not satisfied with that and have been perfecting the machine from that time to the present until every obstacle has been obviated.

This machine not only pulls the beets without any breakage but it removes the tops with far greater precision than could be done by hand, and also deposits the beets and leaves in separate and distinct piles. It does this with one team and driver at the rate of three to five acres a day.

It is claimed that with three horses five acres of beets can be pulled, topped and leaves bunched in ten hours. The machine is exceedingly simple and penetrates the ground to the depth of only two to two and a half inches.
