Divorce Mills.

Washington, Sept. 29.—The forthcoming report of the census bureau on marriage and divorce will not reflect any credit on the people of the United States. Government officials connected with the work of gathering the statistics will be surprised if the report does not shock the country.

Though the statistics are far from complete the work of gathering them has gone far enough to convince the bureau that the complete showing will reveal a startling condition of affairs. In some cities the agents of the bureau are finding that for certain periods the courts have been divorcing men and women about as rapidly as the preachers united them in marriage.

No information is available at this time as to what localities will make the most distressing showing, but it is evident that nearly all the northern cities will show that their divorce mills has been working overtime.

According to agents of the bureau the south will present a much more favorable record than the north. In most sections of the south the marriage vow is still held sacred. Even in the southern cities the agents are finding that divorce proceedings are seldom resorted to.

The prevailing impression is that after the bureau's report is given to the public there will be a popular demand for remedial legislation. It is hoped to have the statistics in such form that they may be of use to state legislatures which meet next January.

The congress can hardly deal with the subject in the absence of a constitutional amendment, but it is assumed that President Roosevelt will not hesitate to call the attention of the several states to the information the federal government has gathered and suggest that legislatures act.

The organization formed at the meeting of the national divorce congress two years ago has been inactive for some time because it desired the government's statistics before it took any additional steps. As soon as it receives the statistics from the census bureau it will renew the effort to obtain the enactment of a uniform divorce law in all the states. Government officials who have some idea of the showing the statistics will make say they will be surprised if a general campaign for stricter laws governing divorce is not set on foot throughout the country after the bureau's facts are published.

It may be that the completed statistics will not be available by the first of the year when most of the state legislatures meet, and if they are not the campaign for reform legislation will have to go over two years.

Provisional C. E. Program.

"Meet me at Lansing!" Is the slogan and when the convention of the Michigan Christian Endeavor Union convenes at the state capital Nov. 1, 2, 3, and 4 next, it is expected that one of the largest and most representative delegations of recent years, will be present from every section of the state.

The fall convention dates are an innovation which will prove popular and likewise is the program, which this year, for the first time is arranged as an "Institute" or "Conference," which allows of the greatest possible freedom for the discussion of all topics of importance to Endeavor workers, and yet places the responsibility of leadership and final decision with experts in this kind of work.

Several persons of national reputation and undisputed authority have been secured for this convention. They include Wm. Shaw, of Boston, who has been identified with the movement almost since its beginning and now the treasurer of the National and World's Union; Miss Grace Curtis Glenn, of Chicago, who has spent a number of years in Japan as a missionary, and is now in charge of the young peoples' work for one of the great missionary boards; Rev. Ernest Bourner Allen, of Toledo, the first secretary of the Michigan Union at its formation 19 years ago, and a pastor and speaker of much power and originality; Rev. C. H. Hubbell, of Columbus, Christian Endeavor field secretary for Ohio.

The provisional program is just issued and gives promise of a very helpful convention. The first public meeting occurs Thursday evening, Nov. 1, when President Chamberlain, of Detroit, will deliver his message, and Rev. E. B. Allen the convention address.

During the three days of the convention there will be several special features, such as a display of missionary literature and one of strictly Christian Endeavor publications. A reunion of Michigan delegates to the international convention at Baltimore last year, and a banquet of the Veteran's Union and organization which includes many of the past and present officers of local society and local county district and state unions.

These will certainly be busy and joyous ones for Michigan Endeavorers.

New Locomotives for D. & M. Ry.

The Detroit & Mackinac Ry. (the Lake Huron Shore Line) in order to take care of its constantly increasing traffic has just received and placed in service three monster freight locomotives, which were erected by the Rogers Locomotive Works, Paterson, N. J. This fine type of engine cannot be excelled for speed and power by anything in the locomotive line ever turned out of any shop. Some idea of these locomotives may be obtained from the following dimensions: cylinder 22 inches by 23 inches; eight driving wheels 57 inches in diameter; diameter of boiler 81½ inches; 598 two inch flues; fire box heating surface 218 square feet; total heating surface 3,100 square feet, grate area 36 square feet; capacity of tender 15 tons of coal and 7,000 gallons of water; weight of tender when loaded and ready for service 124,000 pounds; weight of engine ready for service 171,000 pounds on drivers; 21,000 pounds on truck; total 192,000 pounds. Total weight of engine and tender 316,000 pounds or 158 tons. Total length of engine from pilot to rear of tender 64 feet. The immense weight on the driving wheels together with the unusually large heating surface which provides an ample supply of steam at all times, admits hauling trains consisting of from 85 to 90 loaded freight cars. The fact that the Detroit & Mackinac Ry. road bed is unsurpassed by any in the state being laid with 85 and 90 pound steel rails, with practically no curves or grades, makes possible the successful handling of the immense weight put upon it by these powerful locomotives and heavy freight trains. It is interesting to note that this railway has the largest and heaviest passenger engines in Michigan.

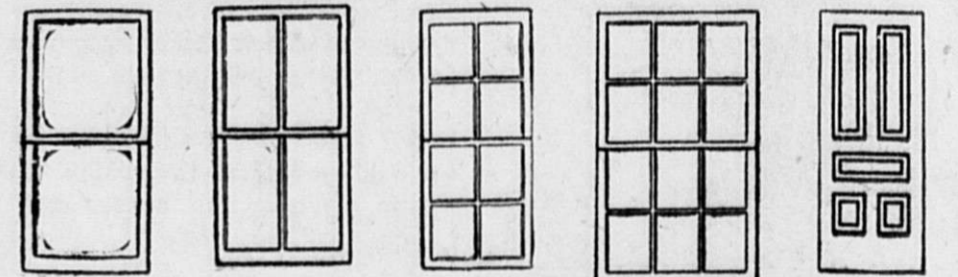

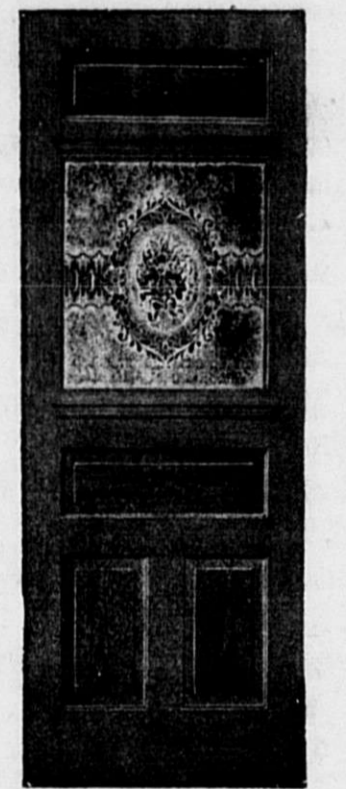

Council Proceedings.

Special meeting of the common council of the city of Tawas City, held in the council rooms Wednesday evening, September 26th, 1906, for the purpose of considering an electric light contract with F. W. Schlechte & Sons.

Called to order by Mayor Wuggazer.

Present—Aldermen King, Nelom, Hadwin, Marzinski, Davison, Attorney Jahraus and Clerk King. Quorum present.

Communication from Thorne Electric Co. read and on motion placed on file.

Following contract presented and read:

CONTRACT.

This Agreement made by and between F. W. and E. M. Schlechte, doing business as F. W. Schlechte & Sons, of Tawas City, Michigan, of the first part, and the city of Tawas City of the second part, witnesses as follows:

Said First party being the owners of a grist mill in Tawas City and having surplus power for rent, and Second party having leased an electric light plant to supply lighting to the city and citizens of Tawas City, and desires to lease power for its operation:

Now therefore, First parties agree herein in consideration of the rent and payment hereinafter agreed to be made, to let and lease and furnish to Second party sufficient steam power and engine capacity to run and operate such electric light plant in a good and efficient manner, so as to furnish lights through said plant in first class shape, and operate such plant in an efficient and serviceable manner, and to operate the same each night from dark until one o'clock a. m. upon all nights when the moon is less than one half full, and to operate such lights in each year for the arc lights used by the city, and all year round for incandescent lights; except that during seasons when necessary for lighting, said incandescent lights shall be run during morning hours from five o'clock a. m. to ten o'clock a. m. First parties also agree to furnish power and lighting for the city as follows: First parties shall also furnish all carbons and materials necessary to supply the waste and consumption incident to the operation and use of such plant and lights. Second party to supply all broken lights or material accidentally destroyed without the fault or neglect of First parties in operation, and for which First parties are not accountable.

First parties also agree to furnish at all times a man sufficiently skillful in such matters to look after and operate such plant, and to keep the same in good repair and running condition, and also agree to keep and preserve such plant and all material and property connected therewith, which belongs to said Second party during such operation, free from injury and waste, except such as may result from natural wear and tear and damage by the elements, and First parties each week to examine all arc lights and connections, and when necessary clean and trim and repair the same.

As a basis for furnishing lights to private parties, First parties agree to supply the same at the rate of fifty cents per month, flat rate for each lamp or light of 16 candle power, for the service as above; or, if meters are used, then prices therefor as quoted below, viz:—

For first 10 K. W. or less	14 cents per K. W.
For 10 to 25 K. W.	12 " "
For 25 to 50 " "	11 " "
For 50 to 75 " "	10 " "
For 75 to 100 " "	9 " "
For 100 to 200 " "	8 " "
For 200 to 400 " "	7 " "
All above 400 " "	6 " "

A discount of 2 cents per Kw. shall be allowed for prompt payment within fifteen days after first of each month; all bills to be paid monthly.

Second party hereby agrees to allow and designate one of its members, Clerk or City Marshal, as a representative of the city to inspect meters or lights, or any part of the connections of plant in private establishments or houses, if necessary, or demanded by first party for any cause, with a view of removing or certifying defects, injuries or improper use of lights or meters, and it is understood and agreed, and the city of Tawas City by its Common Council, hereby, in the execution and acceptance of this contract and lease directs, that First parties hereto shall have the absolute right, at any time they are satisfied that more light is being used than is reasonable for the flat rate charged, to increase the rate to such a price as will fairly pay for the light used, within the limits above prescribed.

First parties may make such rules and regulations for the guidance of users of lights as shall be necessary and proper, and the same shall be endorsed and confirmed by the council, and persons not obeying such instructions and rules, may have the use of such lights at once discontinued.

First parties shall have the entire control and oversight, and superintendence of such plant, subject to the right of the council or its officers to examine the same, and to inspect and investigate the same, and examine into its condition and operation, and as to its proper and efficient working, and the right to have the same operated properly and efficiently.

All connections made by private parties shall be subject to the supervision and control of First parties, and they shall supervise the same as far as necessary to secure the most efficient operation thereof, and without injury to the operation and efficiency of the main lines and plant and use of power.

Second party agrees to furnish when necessary, transformers and wire for connecting the same, as the incandescent service may require.

It is agreed and understood mutually that this contract shall run and be in operation for a period of three years, and second party hereby agrees that during such three years, it will allow no other firm or individual the use of its streets to furnish lighting in connection with First party in the carrying out of this contract.

In case of default in carrying out this contract by First parties, or in furnishing power for said plant, or in case they shall discontinue furnishing power, or move away, Second party shall be at liberty, and shall have the right to take immediate possession of said plant, and First parties shall turn the same over to Second party without cost or expense therefor.

It is agreed also that First parties shall keep an accurate expense account of all necessary expenditures in connection with the running of said plant, and shall submit the same to the inspection of Second party or its officers at any time; and it is also mutually agreed that when the income account from incandescent service shall amount to more than the monthly expense account so mentioned, including the \$25 paid by the city monthly for arc lights, that then and in such case the surplus over and above such monthly expense, shall be divided equally between First and Second parties; and if such surplus above expense, divided, shall exceed First parties share more than said \$25, then the city shall not be required to pay such \$25, and Second party thereby be relieved from such payment; and First parties shall be entitled to receive and keep all moneys received over and above the same, after Second party is so relieved from the payment of said \$25.

In witness whereof the parties hereto have hereunto set their respective hands and seals the 26th day of September, A. D. 1906.
