AN ENTHUSIASTIC SUCCESS.

The Annual Convention of the 12th District Endeavorers.

The annual convention of the 12th district Christian Endeavor Union, held at the Congregational church in this city last Friday, Saturday and Sunday, was one of the most successful gatherings of the kind ever held in this district. About forty delegates were in attendance from the various societies, twenty-one of whom came from Alpena where there are three societies. The banner for the largest representation at the convention was awarded to the intermediate society of the Congregational church, Alpena, which was represented by twelve delegates.

The program was an excellent one and was carried out in full, though substitution had to be made for one or two of the scheduled participants, who were unable to be present.

On Friday evening the program was short, consisting of the address of welcome to delegates, response to the same, and the address of the evening delivered by Rev. Thomas S. Anderson, of Bay City, on "The Relation of the Endeavor to the Church." Mr. Anderson handled this subject in a very skilful and forceful manner, bringing out the thought that the Endeavor society is not an organization by itself but an adjunct of the church with which it is affiliated.

At the conclusion of the services a reception was tendered to the visiting delegates, at which light refreshments were served and those present enjoyed themselves renewing old acquaintances and making new ones.

The main feature of the Saturday morning program was a paper by Mrs. C. B. Chaffee, of this city, on "Some of the reasons why Christian Endeavor does not prosper in our district," and a discussion of the same, in which was brought out some very good ideas both as to the reasons why it does not prosper and how to make it prosper.

On Saturday afternoon a roll call of the societies in the district was had, with a response from each, and a banner presented to the society having the largest delegation. Following this was a paper by Miss Mabel Edgar, of Alpena, on "How to make Christian Endeavor more attractive" and a discussion of the same, which was very interesting. An open parliament conducted by E. T. Lindsay, of Saginaw, corresponding secretary of the Michigan Christian Endeavor Union, also proved a very interesting part of this meeting, introducing many helpful points to those interested in the work.

The business session which was held at this time was short, the election of officers being the principal feature. A committee on nominations had been previously appointed and their report was accepted and adopted by the convention, and the following officers declared elected: President—Jas. H. A report on the general condition of the societies throughout the district was very favorable, showing one new society, that at Alabaster, and prospects for more in the near future. Standish was selected as the place for holding the next convention, at that place.

In the evening occurred the district president's address by Jas. H. Nisbet, of this city, which was replete with good cheer and encouragement for Endeavorers, and an able and eloquent address by Prof. Mitchell, of Alma college, who took the place of Dr. A. F. Bruske, who was unable to be present.

On Sunday morning the convention sermon was preached by Prof. Mitchell, who, though not an ordained minister, is a very earnest and capable Christian worker and delivered an excellent sermon. He was followed by Rev. E. W. F. Holler, who has recently been called to the pastorate of the Presbyterian church in this city, and who in his short address presented some very inspiring and helpful thoughts.

The Sunday afternoon meeting was perhaps the most interesting of all, for the program consisted of papers on different phases of Christian En-

deavor by workers from various parts of the district. We regret that lack of space forbids us publishing these papers in their entirety, that the many excellent thoughts expressed therein might be read and appreciated by our readers. However we can only give the subject of each and their authors, which were as follows: "Missions," by Miss Elizabeth Rayburn, of Tawas City; "Training in Christian Testimony," by Miss Mary Smith, of AuSable; "Tithing," by Fred Johnson, of Maple Ridge; "The Quiet Hour," by W. H. Price, of Whittemore; and "The Pledge," by Mrs. E. N. Durfee, of Standish. Mrs. Durfee was not able to be present and her paper was read by M. F. Parker.

A meeting for men and boys was held at the Baptist church co-incident with the foregoing, and though not so well attended as could have been desired, was nevertheless very interesting and of much benefit to those present.

The Sunday evening service was favored with by far the largest audience of any meeting of the convention, the services in both the Baptist and Methodist churches being entirely given up on this occasion and their congregations helping to swell the concourse which filled the church almost to its fullest capacity.

The regular C. E. prayer meeting at 6:30 was conducted by Miss Lillian Oliver, of Alpena, ably assisted by several of the Endeavorers from that city.

At 7:30 the regular services of the evening began. Rev. W. L. Hood, of Saginaw, and Rev. E. B. Griffith, of this city, both delivered able and eloquent addresses, which were greatly appreciated by the audience. The subject of Rev. Hood's address was "Some Ancient Endeavorers," among whom he classed some of the prophets and teachers of the Old Testament. Rev. Griffith's discourse on "Character Building," was full of enthusiasm and brought out among other good thoughts, the idea that though the Christian societies of young people may be working under different names, their aims and objects are the same.

A short talk by Mrs. E. T. Lindsay on the rescue mission work in Saginaw followed these addresses, giving to the assembled congregation some idea of the need of earnest, consecrated Christian workers in the lower quarters of our large cities.

The services of the evening and of the convention were closed with a consecration service conducted by E. T. Lindsay. He voiced the sentiment of the whole convention that these meetings might be beneficial to all who had participated in them and that they might go forth to their respective homes ennobled and uplifted by the many eloquent and inspiring thoughts that had been expressed.

A pleasant surprise just at the close of the meeting was the arrival of W. A. Prince, of Alpena, who entered in time for the closing address and consecration service. Mr. Prince is an earnest Endeavorer worker and a convention does not seem complete without his presence.

The singing throughout the convention was led by Rev. Hood, whose services were greatly appreciated. Several special musical features were introduced and formed a very pleasant part of the program.

The decorations, though not elaborate, were pretty and tasteful, as well as appropriate. Altogether this convention may be said to have been a complete success and the C. E. society of this city and the various committees are to be congratulated on bringing it to such a successful consummation.

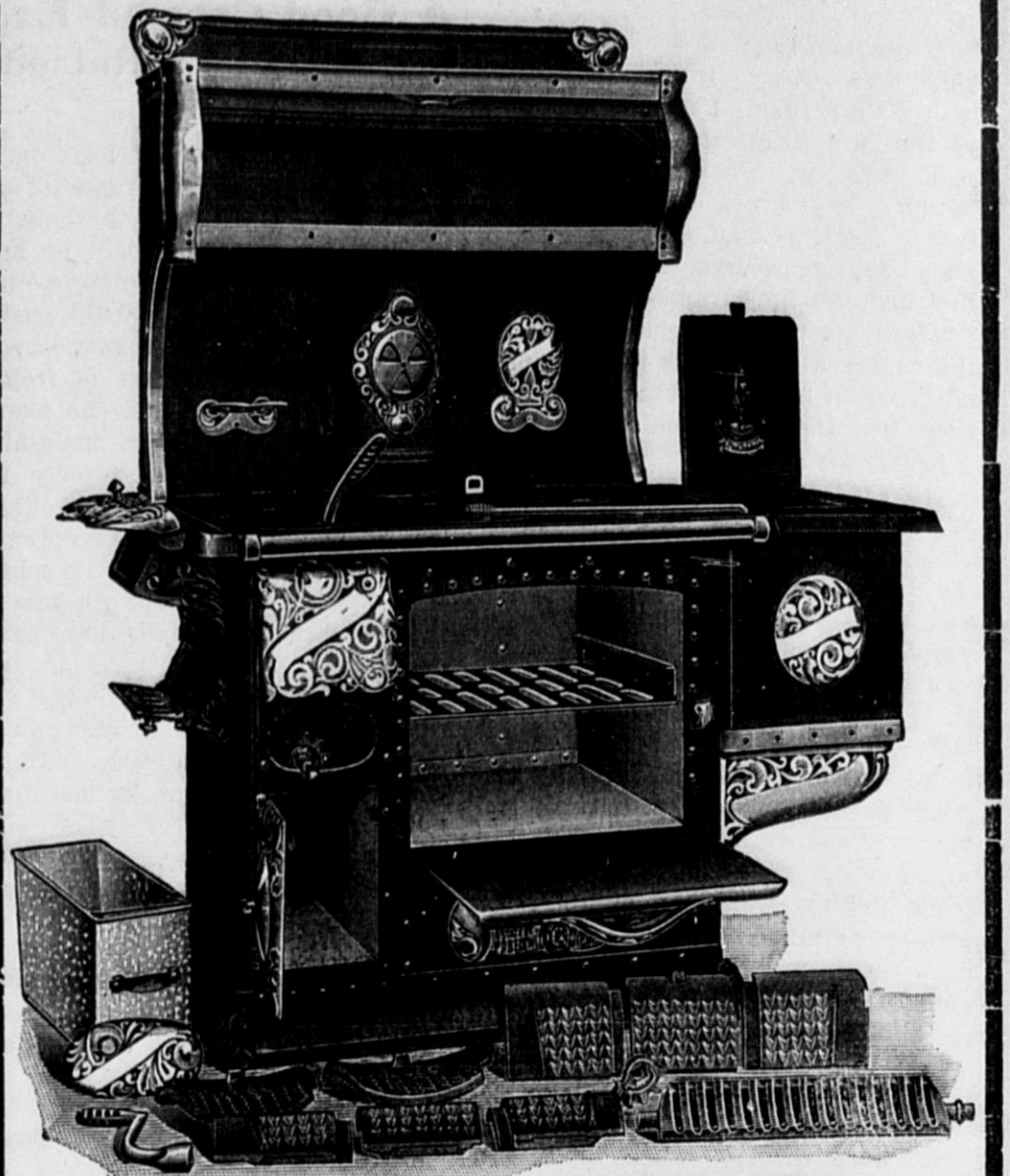
