**Another Fatality.**  
Another tragic death shocked this community Tuesday evening. August Bertch a farmer residing in Tawas township had been looking for his cattle in the neighborhood of Sand lake and as he was returning home between 6 and 7 o'clock in the evening he was met by J. G. Ellis, a 17 year old son of Wm. Ellis who resides on Island lake, who shot him with a heavy load of buck shot. The charge took effect in Bertch's left side, several shots striking his heart, killing him instantly.  
Coroner Armstrong was notified and went to the scene of the tragedy where he impounded the following jury: David Davidson, John Dempsey, Barney M. Long, James Chambers and John Durant. After viewing the remains the inquest was adjourned to Wednesday afternoon, when it was completed. Young Ellis testified that he was returning home when he saw what he thought was a bear and fired killing Bertch. The jury returned a verdict that "the shooting was uncalled for and an act of carelessness."  
A warrant was issued for Ellis under the statute providing for the punishment for careless killing human beings. He was arraigned before Justice Kelly and gave bond in the sum of \$600 for his appearance at the next term of court.  
The unfortunate victim, August Bertch, was 38 years, 5 months and 23 days of age. A wife and three young children are left to mourn his death. The unfortunate accident has cast a gloom over the community, both on account of the death of a highly respected young man, and the most unfortunate position in which it places the boy who did the shooting.

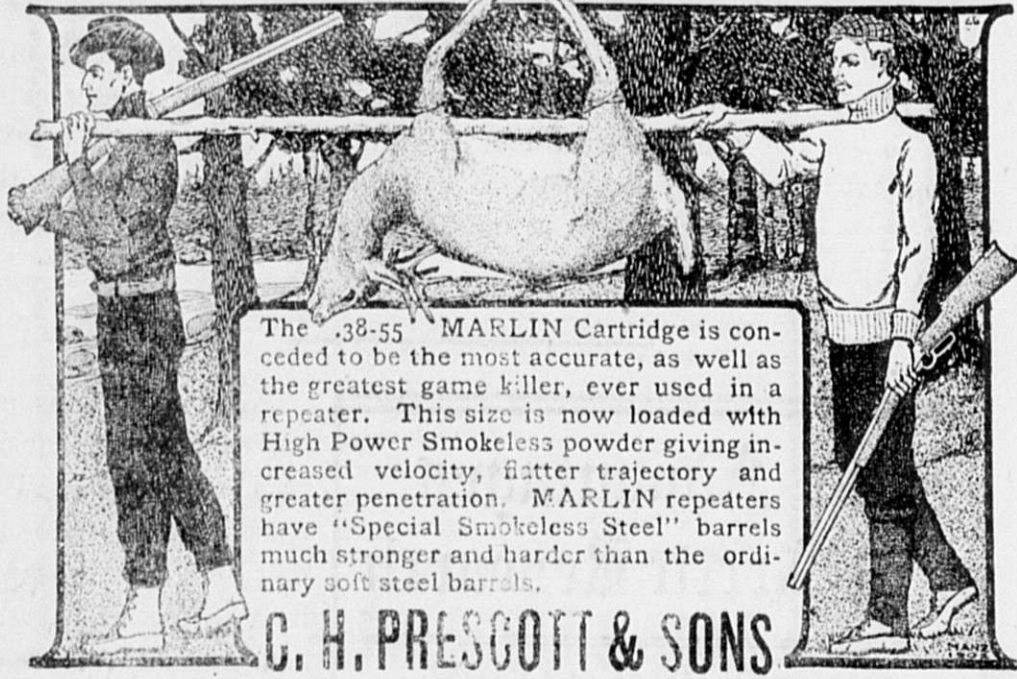

### Schoolmarm's Outing.

Through the kindness of Mr. James Nisbet the teachers of our city spent a delightful Saturday afternoon. In the morning they were notified by telephone and personal calls to be ready for a trip to Ottawa point on the beautiful sailing craft of the same name. At 1:30 all were on hand at Prescott's dock. The party consisted of 16, including the crew, who deserve special notice for the mastery way in which they looked after the temporal needs of the fair cargo. Captain, James Nisbet; pilot, W. F. Whittemore; cabin boy, Stephen Nisbet; chaplain, Rev. E. W. Faris Holter, who looks for his fee in the future as the feminine part of the passengers shall one by one lay down the school of 40 and take up the more interesting school of one; chaperones, Mesdames Downer and Chaffee. To make the work as easy as possible for them Stephen Nisbet was the only young man of the party.

We had to make our way to the point in the face of a strong head wind, so we beat our way very nearly out to the can buoy and then tacked back nearly to East Tawas, then in a straight line down the coast toward the dock of the life saving station in the light of the bay. The weather was delightful and the scenery was almost beyond description. Where else can one find so beautiful a bay with such varied scenery? Off to the right we see the smoke of the mill at Alabaster, in our own fair city we notice the flag of our country floating in the breeze from the top of the court house, behind us is East Tawas with its church spires and on our left is the park clad in its beautiful autumnal robes. The different colored leaves, soon to fall and enrich mother earth, remind us of mortality in contrast with the perennial green of the pine and cedar, "fading emblems of eternal life."

But we must hasten for we are nearing our goal. One of the teachers discovers a low-lying monster in the distance partly concealed behind a bush in its prow. She thinks that war has probably been declared between the U. S. and our brethren across the lake and that they have sent this infernal machine over here in the night with evil designs on the Ottawa. We begin to haul in sails and prepare for action, when suddenly a flock of ducks rise from the water, a man is seen to rise from behind the bush and fire, not at us but at the ducks, and we see one fall into the water. The man paddles out and gets the duck. We all him alongside and it proves to be that great duck hunter from East Tawas by the name of Sims, who has the reputation of never wasting any powder. The anchor was dropped, the captain and pilot manned the little boat and in two trips landed the party. We now resume our journey by land to the life saving station, passing by the site where thirty years ago stood the old lighthouse, a half mile from the present one, and crossing the marshy lagoon on which a quarter of a century ago boats sailed from the bay into Lake Huron. We are soon at the station and Captain Small, a veteran in the service of Uncle Sam, meets us with a cordial smile and every effort is made by himself and his genial crew to entertain us during our stay. We are given the "keys to the city." Every question concerning the history and geography of the point are promptly answered and the use of the instruments and appliances of the service explained. One will go far before he meets a more gentlemanly lot of men, and there will always be a warm spot for them in the hearts of our teachers. We made a trip to the lighthouse when we were cordially

received by Mrs. Palmer. Captain Palmer being absent on business we were unable to go to the tower, but were kindly assured that if we would call again we should have the pleasure. The shadows of evening were beginning to fall and we returned to the Ottawa, but the wind also had fallen and only a slight breeze was left to waft us slowly home. However we had the privilege of a sail by the light of the moon over our left shoulder, and the hour or more of our homeward journey was interspersed with songs, secular and religious. At the dock three hearty cheers were given for Captain Nisbet and his gallant crew and we separated, going to our various homes with a consciousness of a day well spent and with a desire to satisfy the inner man.

### Annual Report of the D. & M Ry.

The annual report of the Detroit & Mackinac Railway Co. for the year ended June 30, 1906 has been issued in pamphlet form. It shows the gross earnings increased \$164,271.68 for the year and the president is confirmed in his opinion that the limit has by no means been reached, that in fact the development has just begun in the territory traversed by the road in limestone, cement, gypsum, forest products, summer resorts and farming. The company purchased three heavy locomotives during the year which have been delivered. There has been a handsome gain in tonnage of commodities other than forest products. The total mileage of the road is 421.02. During the year the road carried 327,592 passengers, the total passenger earnings being \$258,222.40. The road carried 1,109,055 tons of freight yielding a revenue of \$816,689.11. The gross earnings amounted to \$1,154,826.85, a slight increase over the preceding year. The ratio of expenses to earnings was 74.61 as against 64.10 the previous year. The road hauled 122,158 tons of lumber compared with 98,931 tons the preceding year. Forest products other than lumber represented a tonnage of 470,276 compared with 407,702 the previous year. Of fruits and vegetables there was hauled 11,647 tons against 9,946 tons the previous year. There was hauled 262,783 tons of stone, sand and like articles compared with 124,837 the previous year. The equipment consists of 30 locomotives, 46 passenger, baggage and express cars and 1616 freight cars. During the year 14 miles of branch tracks were laid. The net earnings of the road were \$281,692.61 and there was a surplus at the end of the year of \$5,257.24, a surplus for the year ended June 30, 1905, of \$10,918.45, leaving a balance of \$16,175.69.

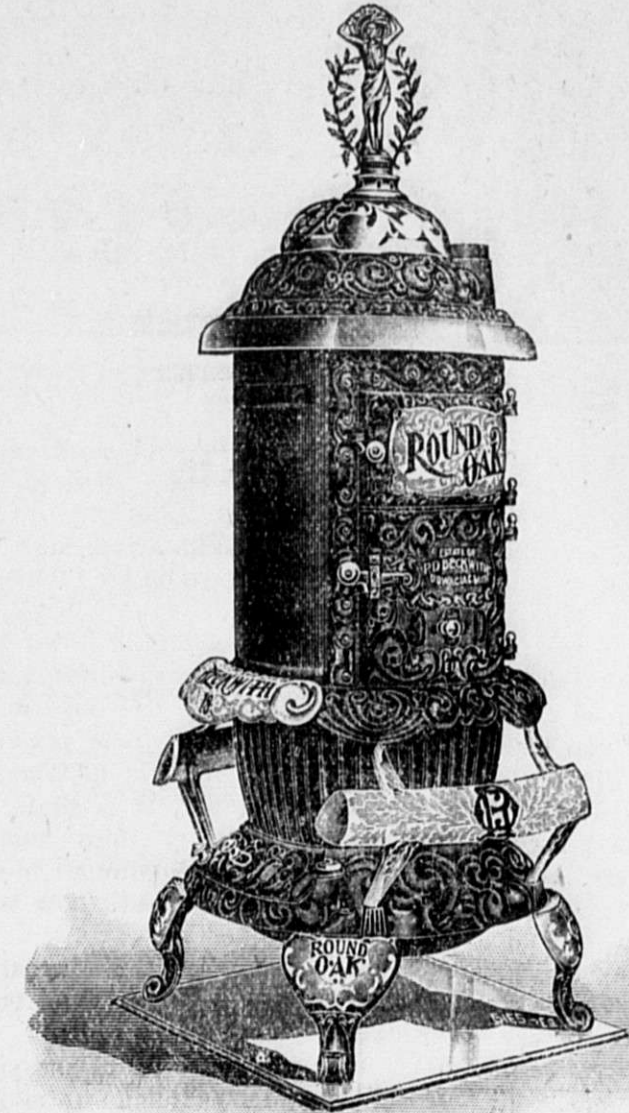
