We had to make our way to the point in the face of a strong head wind, so we beat our way very nearly out to the can buoy and then tacked back nearly to East Tawas, then in a straight line down the coast toward the dock of the life saving station in the bight of the bay. The weather was delightful and the scenery was almost beyond description. Where else can one find so beautiful a bay with such varied scenery?
