It is evident that the results of the election throughout the country has frightened the trusts, as an increase of wages has been granted by many of them.

Major-General Wm. R. Shafter, one of the most prominent figures in the Spanish-American war, died at the home of his son-in-law near Bakersfield, Cal., last Monday after an illness of only seven days.

Hon. Nathan B. Bradley, one of the pioneer lumbermen of the Saginaw valley, died at his home in Bay City, on Thursday of last week, of pneumonia. Mr. Bradley was 75 years of age. He was a former congressman and the first mayor of Bay City. He had been a resident of that city for 45 years.

They claim to sell goods that are not possible of sale at the prices asked when their guarantee is taken into consideration. Sometime an outraged buyer will make complaint to the post office officials, and that will be all that is necessary to teach them a lesson.

This howl about the second rate mail matter being responsible for the past deficits in all rot. Second rate matter pays at the rate of \$20 per ton, and the express companies transfer thousands of tons of this matter for one-third that price, and if the post office department would get as good rates from the railroads as they give the express companies, they would make money out of second class mail matter.

There must be some life in the boy, or he will not rise under any circumstances until the day appointed for the resurrection of the dead. If he starts out in life as a failure he will end as a one unless he gets thoroughly wakened up in some way. Michigan Crops.

Secretary of State Prescott, in his monthly crop report, issued last Saturday, confirms the claim that considerable damage was done to potatoes, sugar beets and apples by the weather of Oct. 10. He notes that the weather has been favorable for wheat which promises 85 per cent of a crop from the present outlook.

Corn is estimated as having yielded 37 bushels of shelled corn per acre. Seventy-two per cent of an average crop of clover seed was harvested, the yield being 1.62 bushels per acre. The potato crop is said to be considerably below the average, as a result of the long drought and blight, the estimated yield being 88 bushels per acre. Thirteen per cent of the farmers are said to have used commercial fertilizers on their wheat fields this fall.

The condition of horses and sheep in the state is 96 per cent, cattle 95 and swine 97. Considerable hog cholera is reported in the southern counties.

Next Year's D. & M. Ry. Annual Fall Excursions.

The D. & M. annual fall excursions to Bay City, Detroit, Toledo and points in Ohio and Indiana have grown so popular and assumed such proportions that it has been decided in 1907 to handle it somewhat differently than in the past. A special train will leave Cheboygan and pick up passengers to Alpena inclusive, then run through to Bay City without stopping; a second train will leave Alpena and pick up at all stations to Bay City. It is the present intention to run parlor cars on these trains and to stop at Saginaw about 15 or 20 minutes for lunch at the station eating house. These arrangements will prove very acceptable to the excursionists and insure the trains being on time. Those who patronized the excursion on the 3rd inst. and checked their baggage the day before found it a most convenient arrangement, inasmuch as they found their baggage awaiting them as soon as they got off the train.

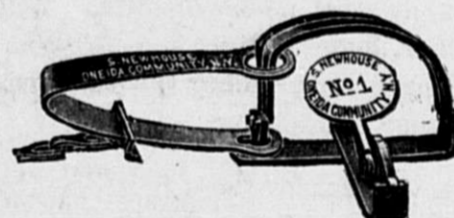


