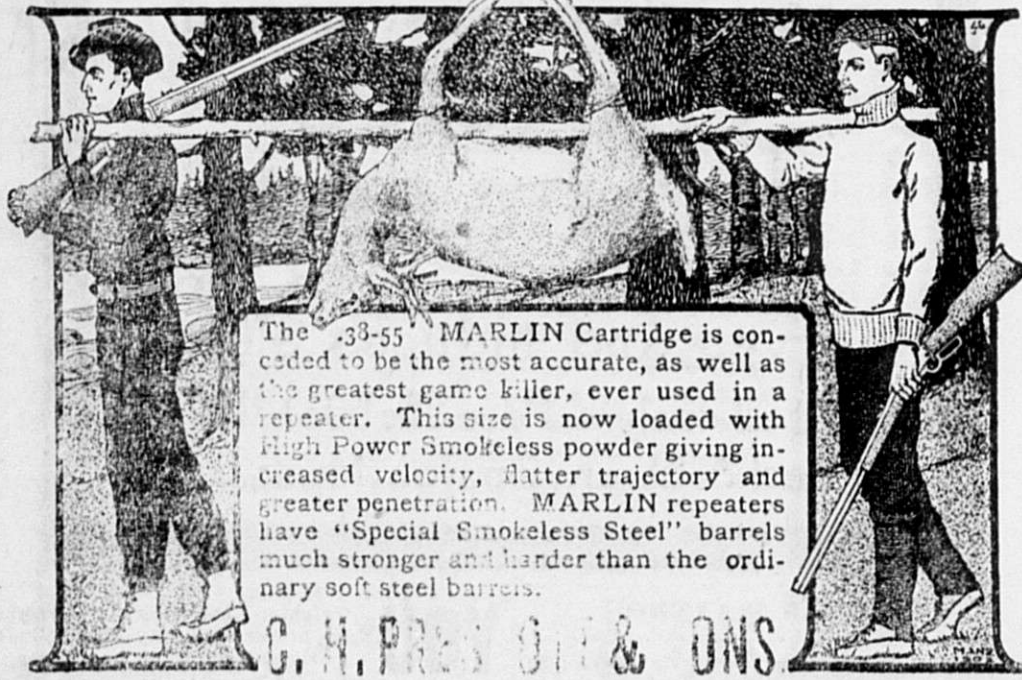

Bless the man who is to a reasonable degree uneasy as long as he owes a dollar. If you are at some time compelled by unavoidable circumstances to request your merchant to extend you credit for a time, in making your application to him for it do not tell him you will pay the first of the month when in your opinion it will be the tenth of the month before you will meet the obligation.

There were 3,374 deaths and 3,854 births in Michigan during October, according to reports made to the secretary of state. Typhoid fever caused 156 deaths in the state during the month, which is the greatest number of deaths from this disease in the month of October for the past five years. It is claimed that health officials are becoming lax in the reporting this disease and in restricting its spread.

The habit of treating those who nearest and dearest to us with discourtesy is one that clouds the sunshine of too many homes. If you are young and looking for your prince, just test his home conduct. Do not be guided in your choice by what a young man is in the parlor; find out what he is in his mother's sitting room. Do not judge him by the way he tips his hat, but by the way he treats the old, especially his parents.

That young man who thinks he is poor because he has no bank account, little understands the value of God's free gift of health and strength, little appreciates the fact that the brightest and best of the country are self-made, and come to the notice of the world from just such beginnings. Not by idly moaning that they are poor, but by going carefully to work, perfecting themselves in their chosen pursuits and becoming so useful to those about them that their services are always in demand, whether it be on the platform, in the shop or in the kitchen, for all are honorable alike.

The purpose of store advertising is not merely to sell goods, but to sell more goods—to make friends, build up a patronage that will not only stick but grow. Newspapers reach the greatest number of people in the immediate vicinity in the most natural way, at the least expense, and they are therefore the best of all medium for stores. In a newspaper you follow the lines of least resistance—you follow with the stream—you talk to an audience already assembled, to the people you want to read—their mental cosmos is right—they are on your wire, and they won't ring off if you hold their interest. Attraction is the basis of all

advertising—the store is the sun, the customers the planets that revolve around it.

A plan for drawing trade to a town that has been successfully worked at several points might be adopted to advantage in this city. The plan is as follows: An agreement was reached between all the merchants whereby they offered special sales on certain days, each merchant selecting some special line of goods upon which he made a lower price than usual. Thus one dry goods house would sell goods at a special price, while another would offer bargains in dress goods. One hardware merchant would reduce the price on skates. Every line of business was represented and care was taken that no conflicts occurred. Prizes were then offered to the farmer bringing in the best load of grain or the handsomest baby, and the bargain day was extensively advertised in the surrounding country, the names of the merchants and their special sales being in all cases stated. The farmers responded in a most gratifying manner and the merchants were well pleased with the plan. The idea has already been carried out in several cities.

Dr. Howell Dead.

Word was received last Friday announcing the death of Dr. DeWitt C. Howell at Harper's hospital, Detroit. His death was caused by a stroke of paralysis.

Dr. Howell was a practicing physician at East Tawas for many years previous to his removal to Onaway some five years ago. He was a member of Baldwin Lodge F. & A. M., under whose auspices the funeral was conducted at Onaway last Sunday, about 35 of the Masonic fraternity of the Tawasess going up Sunday morning by special train. The Onaway Outlook says:

Dr. Howell was born in Hillsdale county, Feb. 5, 1855 in which section he was raised to manhood, having graduated from the Eaton, Rapids high school. In 1877 he entered the medical department of the University of Michigan, from which he graduated with distinctive honors in 1881. Soon after he began practice at Davison Station, Genesee county, and about 15 years ago located at East Tawas, where he remained one of the most prominent and successful practitioners until he came to Onaway on his 47th birthday. For many years he has been chief surgeon to the Detroit & Mackinac Railway and has gained a wide reputation as an honored member of his profession. Socially Dr. Howell was a most pleasing gentleman and during the time he has been a resident of Onaway he has made many warm personal friends. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity, the Knights of Pythias and the Odd Fellows, among whom he was deservedly popular. He was a loving father and a good husband. He leaves a widow, two daughters, Miss Zou Howell and Mrs. E. J. Annibal, and one son, Donald Howell, and many friends to mourn his loss.

Obituary.

Sarah Elizabeth Waterberry, was born in Prince Edward, Tear county, Canada, Nov. 5, 1836. She was united in marriage to Wallace Brown, at Clayton, N. Y., October 15, 1886, and died at her home in this city November 15, 1906, aged 70 years and 11 days. The family came to this city in 1879 where they have since resided. The funeral was held from the M. E. church last Sunday afternoon and was largely attended by sorrowing friends. Rev. N. Dicksey officiated, and the remains were laid at rest in the city cemetery.

Besides the bereaved husband seven children and a large circle of other relatives and friends are left to mourn her death. The surviving children are, Mrs. Mary Briggs and Mrs. Mattie Gilmore, of Grand Rapids, Mrs. Lucy Lathrop, of Flint, Mrs. Elizabeth Shaw, of Bevil, Ont., Mrs. Cynthia Ryan, and James H. and Charles Brown, of this city.

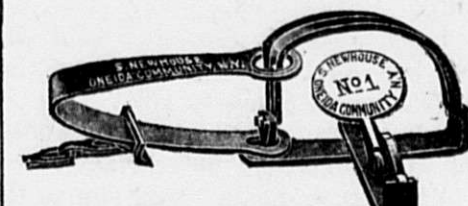

Examination in all branches of study Thursday and Friday of this week.

The first primary of the ward school and the grammar room are closed on account of scarlet fever as two of the teachers are quarantined.

The pupils of the zoology class are studying fishes. On Thursday last they had a perch, pilot and a herring for observation and dissection.

An experiment proving that starch is made only by the green leaf and by the aid of sunlight, was performed in the laboratory. A cork was split in two and placed on the opposite sides of a geranium leaf and connected by pins in order to shut out the light from that portion of it. This was left on for three or four days and at the close of a day of sunshine the leaf was detached from the plant, the cork taken off and the leaf placed in alcohol. This takes out the chlorophyll and leaves the leaf nearly a pure white. Then it was placed in a solution of iodine and all of the leaf, except the part which was covered by the cork, was stained blue as iodine turns starch that color. The part covered by the cork remained white showing the absence of starch.
