



HON. JOHN R. CARR Candidate for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court

Herewith is a cut from a recent photograph of Hon. John R. Carr, of Cassopolis, candidate on the democratic state ticket for one of the associate justices of the supreme court. He is a graduate of the law department of the University of Michigan. On receiving his degree, B. L., in May 1870, he commenced the practice of law in Cassopolis, where he has resided ever since.

He has been circuit court commissioner of the county two years, prosecuting attorney four years, a member of the board of education fifteen years, and judge of the 36th judicial circuit six years. The above is all of the offices he has ever held. He is an ardent believer in the rigid enforcement of the laws.

The supreme bench is composed of eight judges, and they are all republicans. The office is not a partisan one, and the bench should be non-partisan. Two associate judges are elected every two years. The law placing the election of the judges at the town meeting, in the spring, shows that it was the intention of the lawmakers to place the election of the judges away from any politics.






