Loss From Lightning.

This section was visited last Monday night by one of the most severe electrical storms ever known, accompanied by a heavy rain. Much damage is reported from various points

The most severe loss sustained was that of Reuben Wade, on the Hemlock Road. One of the fine large barns on his farm was struck and set on fire, and destroyed together with all its contents, including 13 head of cattle, one fine two-year-old colt valued at \$200, a large quantity of grain, hay, and other products. Mr. Wade has made a careful estimate and places his loss at \$3,600, with an insurance of \$1000 on the barn and a small amount on the contents.

The barn on the H. L. Drake farm was also struck but not set on fire. The damage was slight. C. R. Jackson's building at East Tawas was also slightly injured.

Naturally there is wide interest in the story the farms will tell during 1907. Already the area under fall tillage is pretty accurately known; it exceeds the fall tillage record for 1906 by about 300,000 arces. In regard to spring tillage, estimates as yet are at wide variance. 
