When Jefferson was asked by the Maryland legislature to accept a third term, he answered: "If some termination to the services of the chief magistrate be not fixed by the constitution, or supplied by practice, his office, normally four years, will in fact, become for life, and history shows how easily that degenerates into an inheritance."

Two more states have established a direct election of United States senators—Iowa and Washington—making five states this year, and a total of eighteen. The northern states are Oregon, Washington, North Dakota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri and Oklahoma, with a unanimous vote in the senate. The southern states are Virginia, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Texas, Arkansas, Tennessee and Kentucky.

Attorney Charles S. Hampton, of Detroit, is being urged by the people of Detroit for the appointment as the democratic member of the state railroad commission. Under the law passed by the legislature creating this board of railroad commissioners, it shall be composed of not to exceed two members of any one political party, thus being non-partisan. Mr. Hampton is a man of large ability and thoroughly conversant with matters to be considered by this important commission, and his many friends in the tenth congressional district will unite in urging his appointment by Gov. Warner.

Say Something Good.

When people come to our town for business, pleasure or just drop in it is the good booster and wise citizen that speaks well of our little city and has only kind words for the various business firms and his neighbors generally.

The people here average up as intelligent, capable and honest as in any town of its size in the United States.

Too many knockers and carping critics and grudge nursing citizens can hurt the prospects and business of any city.

They keep back the growth of a place by discouraging industrial enterprises, and business men from locating there. The man who is given to running his neighbors down and speaking ill of the business of his competitor or of the legitimate business of any enterprise, is a bad man in a town. If he happens to have money or an official position, he can do more to hurt a place, and kill prospects, than two booster clubs can counteract.

Don't discourage visitors or strangers by speaking ill of your neighbors.

Rather let your efforts be directed to convincing them that they have struck a place where many good people live.

Grafting in Primary Fund.

Lansing, June 24.—The alleged misuse of about \$10,000 of the primary school funds in Huron county will lead to a thorough investigation of the disposition of the money all over the state. The department says there have been irregularities in Lake and other northern counties. Immediate investigation of 10 districts in Huron county will be made by A. Hamlin Smith, chief clerk of the department.

The department last year sent out blanks designed to bring out information as to the use of the primary money and on the reports this year it finds that large amounts has been diverted by township officers.

Large opportunities for graft are afforded because there are many parochial schools and the money is given out on the basis of the entire school population. Under the department's new system it is easy to discover if funds have been diverted and the effort now is to find out who got the money; whether it was used for buildings; for other purposes outside the law, or for personal gain.

Prosecutions will follow if the present conclusions of the department are sustained by investigation. Chief Clerk Smith will go to other counties not yet designated after completing his work in Huron.

The attorney general is now investigating two cases of alleged fraud in the use of primary funds. In one case there is said to be a shortage of \$900.

LIBERAL PREMIUMS FOR FRUIT EXHIBITS.

The Michigan State Agricultural society, Detroit, has recognized the opportunities and advantages of the newer section of Michigan for the production of fruits and general farm crops, and is desirous of stimulating and encouraging producers in this direction. To this end the society's executive committee has made provision for the following special prizes for grain and vegetable exhibits outside of the regular premiums offered:

For the largest and best exhibit of grains and vegetables from Arenac, Ogemaw, Alcona, Iosco, Alpena, Presque Isle, Cheboygan, Emmet, Charlevoix, Grand Trunk, Leelanau, Antrim, Benzie, Manistee, Lake, Oscola, Clare, Gladwin and Mason counties, \$60, \$50, \$40 and \$30.

For the best exhibit as above of grains and vegetables from any other county in the lower peninsula collected by individual or society, but one premium paid to one county, \$50, \$40, \$30, \$20.

For the best exhibit of fruit to be shown at the State Fair by an individual or society from either the counties of Cheboygan, Presque Isle, Alpena, Montmorency, Otsego, Crawford, Osceola, Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw, Roscommon, Arenac, Gladwin and Clare, but one premium to be paid to any one county, \$50, \$40, \$30, \$20, \$15.

For the best exhibit as above from either the counties of Emmet, Charlevoix, Antrim, Leelanau, Benzie, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, Manistee, Wexford, Missaukee, Osceola, Lake and Mason, but one premium to be paid to each county, \$50, \$40, \$30, \$20.

For the best exhibit of fruit from any other county in the state than those mentioned above, west of the meridian line, number of varieties and quality to be considered, but one premium to be awarded to any one county, \$50, \$40, \$30, \$20.

For the best exhibit of fruit from any one county other than those mentioned above and east of the meridian line, \$50, \$40, \$30, \$20.

Freight Charges on Fair Exhibits. Farmers, fruit growers, dairymen, and stock raisers who contemplate exhibiting at the State Fair this summer will be interested in knowing exactly what arrangements have been made with the railroad officials for the handling of freight.

Every railroad entering or making connections with other roads running into Detroit will transport livestock and property on the following conditions:

The freight must be received for as entirely at owner's risk, and in case of livestock the usual contract must be executed.

Charges from point of shipment to State Fair must be paid at full tariff rates.

Upon presentation of the original bill of lading or contract and paid freight bill, within 10 days after close of fair, together with certificate signed by secretary of the fair, that articles tendered for return shipment are unsold, exhibits which paid full tariff rates one way, they will (with the exception of horses as noted below) be returned free over the same routes, at owner's risk to the original forwarder at the original point of shipment.

In the event of change of ownership, full tariff rates will be collected for the return.

If exhibitors wish to show at original point of shipment, charges to such fair (if on the line of the original railroad which handled the original shipment to Detroit) will be assessed at half tariff rates, and will be returned free to original point by roads that carried same.

Horses for exhibition purposes only will be returned free (except on the L. S. & M. S., Wabash and D. T. & I. roads) on the same conditions as other livestock, but this privilege is confined to the state of Michigan only, and will not apply to horses originating from beyond the confines of the state.

The Grand Trunk has established a permanent station at the grounds called "State Fair," and all shipments for exhibition should be billed for this station.

The "Glade," the Midway Pleaisance of the State Fair will be enlarged this year and will contain the greatest number of clean, refined, and instructive entertainments ever seen in Michigan. A fine list of shows has been arranged for and attractions may be seen ranging from the "deep sea" divers to the smallest man in the world.

Among the entertainments that have been provided for young and old will be: Trained animals, a real Gypsy camp where the fortune telling seer can be consulted, the rattle dazle merry-go-round, both steam and electric, a zoo and many others. The fair offices in charge of the "Glade" will revoke the permit of any attraction that does not come up to the high standard of moral tone that they have set.

The bureau of information at the State Fair will be located near the main entrance this year. This bureau will furnish visitors the names, location and rates of many excellent boarding and rooming houses in Detroit, as well as to direct them to hotels and restaurants. It is the wish of the fair officials that out of town visitors feel free to consult this bureau for information of any kind, which will be promptly and gladly furnished.

The beautiful stained glass window in the Michigan building showing a life size figure of Father Marquette is one of the most beautiful and artistic examples of stained glass work ever seen in Michigan. It is just at the turn in the stairway of the building and can be seen on the way to the art exhibit.

A large grove of forest trees on the State Fair grounds this year will provide abundant shade, and afford a cool place where visitors who do not care to lunch at any of the numerous restaurants may enjoy their lunches and enjoy a picnic dinner with friends. The grove is remote from the more frequented places and free from dirt, noise and other annoyances.
