

Previous Conventions.

The state constitution was drafted at a convention convened at Detroit, May 11, and adjourned June 24, 1835, the delegates to this convention hav ing been elected April 4, 1835.

The constitution was then adopted by a vote of the people in October, 1835, there being 6,299 yeas and 1,359 nays. It remained in force until the constitution of 1850 went into opera-


The constitution now in force was drafted at a convention convened at Lansing, June 3, and adjourned August 15, 1850, and adopted by a majority of 26,736 votes. It has been amended from time to time. There was a convention for the purpose of revising this constitution convened at Lansing May 15, and adjourned August 22, 1867. That constitution was submitted to the people April 6, 1868, and rejected by a vote of 71,733 yeas to 110,582 nays. A second convention for revision of the constitution was held at Lansing from August 27 to October 16, 1873, and its work submitted to the people, was rejected by a vote of 39,285 yeas to 124,034 nays.

Term "Watt" in Electric Talk and Its Meaning.

In the electrical world one hears ****************************** and reads a great deal about "watts." Henry Kane was at Ellake on the machinery is rated by watts; The current is measured by watts; lamps burn by watts. To the ordinary layman all this talk of "watts" is as mystifying as the death of the late Akhood of Swat.

The man to whom we owe the idea of the horse power was a Scottish inventor, James Watt, and when the electric unit involving the idea of working capacity came to be formulated the name of Watt was chosen to indicate this unit, just as that of Volta has given us the term volt and Faraday the farad.

Watt considered that taking the average, a London dray horse was capable of doing the work of lifting 33,000 pounds through one foot of distance in one minute of time against gravity. The introduction of this time limit, the minute, gave the unit of power or the rate of performing work. This or its equivalent has ever since been called a horse

The electrical unit called the watt is capable of being represented in terms of the horse-power, and in that form it is perhaps more intelligible to those who are familiar with mechanical rather than with electrical expressions. The electrical watt is the product of volts multiplied by amperes, where the volt is the unit of electrical pressure and the ampere is the unit measuring the destiny or volume of an electrical current.

Careful experiments have demonstrated that 746 watts per second, are equal to 550 foot-pounds per second, or to state the equation in its usual form, 746 watts equal one horse power. The form in which electrical power is generally sold is computed on the basis of kilowatt hours. The prefix kilo comes from the Greek Chilioi, one thousand. 




