The fifteenth annual meeting of the Michigan state association of farmers' clubs will be held at Lansing Dec. 10-11.

From the reports obtainable eighteen men met death by accidental shooting during the hunting season which closed last Saturday in this state.

The Jamestown tercentennial closed Saturday with the record of being one of the most complete failures in the history of expositions. Its debts form a total of \$2,500,000.

Was there any foundation for the charges made during the campaign of a year ago that the state funds were being manipulated in the interests of private individuals? The present failure of State Treasurer Glasier would indicate that possibly it was not all politics.

The old fashioned business man who always said: "Oh, it's no use to advertise; everybody knows me," isn't making any great killing these days. Mr. Everybody is a pretty wise proposition. He knows where all the dead ones are and he's steering clear of them. The man behind the "ad," and behind it right, is delivering the goods.

The contest for the republican nomination for the presidency next year has been complicated by the open announcement of Senator Foraker, of Ohio, that he is a candidate. This brings on an open fight between the Taft, or administration faction and the Foraker faction in that state. Foraker is conceded to have a strong hold on the party in Ohio, and it looks very doubtful if Taft can secure his own delegation. This certainly would be a serious set-back to the administration forces.

Rev. Sam Bettes, St. Clair county's eccentric cowboy preacher, struck Hazelton, Ind., last week and the morning after his sermon at the German Baptist church secured the arrest of the members of the choir, three young women and three young men, for chewing gum while he was preaching, says the Detroit News. The specific charge against the sextette is disturbing a religious meeting. Bettes had been invited to the pulpit by the pastor and the church was well filled. He suddenly deserted his text and directed the attention of his hearers to the choir, at the same time unmercifully scoring the latter. The warrants next morning caused something of a sensation in the Hoosier town.

Great Season For Farmers.

In a compilation of the agricultural exports for the fiscal year, ended June 30, 1907, Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, in his annual report, shows that the farm products sent out of the country were valued at \$1,055,000,000, or \$79,000,000 above the high record for 1906. Plant products made up four-fifths of this total, cotton alone amounting to \$482,000,000. Animals and animal products—mostly packing house products—were exported to the value of \$255,000,000. The live animals exported were worth \$41,000,000 and the dairy products \$6,600,000.

Agricultural products valued at \$627,000,000 were imported during the past fiscal year—\$403,000,000 worth of plant products and \$224,000,000 worth of animal products. The principal items among these imports were: Sugar and molasses, \$94,000,000; coffee, \$78,000,000; fibers, \$62,000,000; packing house products (mostly hides and skins), \$96,000,000; silk, \$71,000,000 and wool \$42,000,000.

Eat More Candy.

"Give children plenty of pure sugar, taffy and butterscotch and they'll have little need of cod-liver oil," says Dr. Woods Hutchinson in the Christmas Woman's Home Companion.

"In short, sugar is, after meat, bread and butter, easily our next most important and necessary food. You can put the matter to a test very easily. Just leave off the pie, pudding and other desserts at your lunch or mid-day dinner. You'll be astonished to find how quickly you'll feel 'empty' again, and how 'unfinished' the meal will seem. You can't get any working man to accept a dinner pail without pie in it. And he's absolutely right. The only thing that can take the place of sugar here is beer or wine. It is a significant fact that the free-lunch counters run in connection with bars furnish every imaginable thing except sweets. Even the restaurants and lunch grills attached to saloons or bars often refuse to serve desserts of any sort. They know their business! The more sugar and sweets a man takes at a meal, the less alcohol he wants. Conversely, the nearly every drinking man will tell you that he has lost his taste for sweets. The more candy a nation consumes, the less alcohol.

The United States government

buys pure candy by the ton and ships it to the Philippines to be sold at cost to the soldiers in the canteens. All men crave it in the tropics, and the more they get of it, the less 'vino' and whisky they want."

"In fine, the prejudice against sugar is born of puritanism and stinginess, equal parts. Whatever children cry for must be bad for them, according to the pure doctrine of original sin; besides, it costs money. I know families in the rural districts yet where the head of the family groans over every dollar's worth of sugar that comes into the house as a sinful and 'unwholesome' luxury."
