

The Next Fair.

That the annual fair which will be held Sept. 15th, 16th and 17th, should be the best ever held is evidenced by the large number of special attractions of local interest. The officials are making several radical departures this year with the express purpose of interesting the people of Isosco County and at the same time make the largest entry list in the history of the society. Liberal prizes are being offered for agricultural exhibits and races, and only residents of the county can compete for any of them. A large list of special prizes are also being arranged for the exhibitors.

Another special feature which should prove interesting and draw a large list of entries is the baby show in which prizes are offered for the prettiest and the heaviest babies. Isosco county has a large number of pretty, fat babies and they should all be on hand to compete.

The racing this year is confined to horses owned in the county, and the conditions are very novel. The entry fee has been placed at the nominal sum of \$1.00 for all races, for the express purpose of securing a large entry list for each race. Instead of having to train your horse to stand the best three in five heats, no horse will have to go more than two heats to win the money, or lose it. The plan is to divide the entries and pull off trial heats, and the heat winners to go for the purses. It gives all the boys a chance to see what their horses can do. The races include both trot and pace, and running.

Another new departure is the placing of each department in charge of some of the directors of the fair association. The arrangements are as follows: Speed department, George H. Hadwin and Thomas Curry; horses, Moses Kehoe; cattle, Thomas Ruckle; sheep and swine, T. J. Warren; poultry and domestic and foreign manufacture, J. G. Dimmick; grains, roots and garden plants, James Lalberge; fruit, C. R. Jackson; ornamental and artistic, and needle work, A. W. Black; dairy and household, Len J. Patterson.

Each director is expected to use his best efforts in securing a large list of entries for his respective department and to be present in person to have charge during the fair. If this is done much will have been done toward making the fair a success.

The officials are doing their part and the Herald hopes that the people of the county will do their part by making a large list of entries in each department.

Putting Sawdust to Practical Use.

Sawdust is one of the puzzling wastes in lumbering operations. The waste is serious, too, for the kerf---the part cut out by the saw in the mill and transformed into sawdust---always bears a rather high ratio to the boards obtained. In cutting thin stuff, one-fourth of the log, or even more, may be kerf.

Efforts to turn sawdust into pulp for the paper mill have usually been unsuccessful on account of mechanical difficulties in handling. In several European countries, however, a new way has been found of turning sawdust to account. The sawdust, chiefly pine and fir, is ground with millstones, exactly as old-time mills made cornmeal, or wheat or rye flour. Expensive machinery is not required, but it is necessary to take special precaution against fires which might start from sparks between the millstones.

The sawdust flour is sold to the dynamite factories to be mixed with nitroglycerine and forms the body or absorbent for that high explosive. It is also in demand for the manufacture of cheap blotting papers. The mills in the Harz Mountains, in Germany, an important manufacturing center, are kept busy meeting this demand.

The price of the "flour" in Germany ranges from \$7.50 to \$12.50 a ton. It is shipped in bags, like meal, or in bales of about 40 cubic feet, made by means of high pressure.
