William L. Clements, a well known business man of Bay City, has announced himself as a candidate for the nomination for regent of the U. of M., on the republican ticket next spring. He is a graduate of that school and is being backed by the Bay City Alumni association.

A writer in the Boston Herald recalls a remarkable prophecy made by Wendell Phillips in July, 1865. In addressing a collection of school children in Music hall, he made use of the following language: "Now, boys do not imitate us. Be better than we are, or there will be a great many cracks. We have invented a telegraph, but what of that? I expect, if I live forty years, to see a telegraph that will send messages without wire both ways at the same time."

Most Important Work.

Probably the most important work to be done by the legislature of 1909 will be the enactment of a law under which cities and villages will be permitted to frame their own charters and provide for self-government to a much larger extent than has ever been enjoyed in this state. Safeguards that must be provided in the general charter law will require the best thought of the legislature. At the same time its enactment will greatly relieve the legislature as under the new constitution local legislation will be done away with. The provision of the law to the effect that no special or local act shall be passed where a general law can be made to apply will cut off nine-tenths of the local legislation which has heretofore absorbed the attention of the legislature and constituted trading-stock among the members. The benefits to result from the elimination of local legislation are scarcely to be estimated.—Lansing Journal.

Thirty-five Thousand Workmen Slain in One Year.

Washington, Dec. 14.—Between 30,000 and 35,000 deaths and 2,000,000 injured is the accident record in the U. S. during the past year among workmen, according to a bulletin on accidents issued by the bureau of labor. Of those employed in factories and work-hops it is stated that probably the most exposed class are the workers in iron and steel. Fatal accidents among electricians and electric linemen and coal miners are declared to be excessive, while railway trainmen killed in the proportion of 7.46 deaths per 1,000 employes.

The bulletin declares that much that could be done for the protection of the workingman is neglected, though many and far-reaching improvements have been introduced in factory practice during the last decade. It is pointed out that the possibilities for successful accident prevention have been clearly demonstrated in the experience of foreign countries.

"Granting," the bulletin states, "that the underlying conditions in European countries are often quite different and many of our industrial accidents may be the result of ignorance, reckless indifference or carelessness, the fact remains that an immense amount of human life is wasted and a vast amount of injury is done to health and strength, with resulting physical impairment which has a very considerable economic value to the nation as a whole."

It is insisted that it should not be impossible to save at least one-third and possibly one-half by intelligent, factory inspection and government factory control.

A Communication.

EDITOR OF HERALD:—In your issue of December 4th you stated that Iosco is one of the counties that will not receive their primary school money until after the taxes begin to come in after January 15th. I can see no reason why you should expect that we would receive our primary money then, as every dollar spread upon this year's tax rolls for state purposes has already been appropriated to the several state institutions. Does Treasurer Rich expect to continue his policy of "robbing Peter to pay Paul?" If so, what funds does he propose to hold up? Is it the fund appropriated to maintain our prisons, the insane asylums, or our colleges and state university? Surely he would not dare stop the pay of our game and fire warden and his deputies? Then there is our noble naval launch, the Chase Osborne, that must be refitted and manned in the spring, for without it and his gallant crew, every fish in lakes Huron and Michigan less than eight inches in length would be sacrificed to the greedy plunder of our law breaking fishermen.

I would like to ask State Treasurer Rich, after he had used up \$400,000 of the primary money why he paid the county of Wayne \$201,000, the full amount of primary money due that county, and not their just proportion of the amount still in his hands. Was he afraid that some one in the city of Detroit might make trouble for him? Did he think the little amount of \$6,000 belonging to Iosco county was so small that no one would question his right to misappropriate it? Whatever the shortage of the state funds may be after the Glazier muddle is settled, there will have to be an appropriation made by the legislature before the shortage can be made good.

Right now is a good time to get busy in the office of the superintendent of public instruction, and find out what state officers are responsible for the misappropriation of this primary money. If it had belonged to any fund of the state there might have been some excuse for transferring it to another fund. The primary money never did belong to the state, it is only held in trust by the state for the several school districts of the state, and unless the money deposited in the Glazier bank was primary money, the state treasurer would have no right to assume that the shortage belonged to that fund. When your trading is finally completed, take your folder to the office of the Trade Excursion Association, of Bay City, just the same as you would a check, merely showing your receipt for fare paid, no other identification or red tape.

The fare refunded is based on your total trade. Thus you may spend \$2.00 with one store, \$3.00 with another, and \$5.00 with the third, and so on. The entire sum so refunded shall not exceed 5 per cent of your actual outlay for transportation be paid.

In case your full round-trip fare cannot be refunded because of the insufficiency of your total purchases, 5 per cent of the total amount entered on your folder will be paid toward your fare.

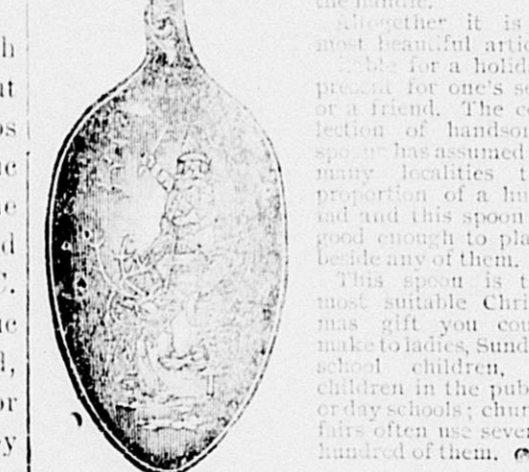
