


When Lent Commenced.

One Druggist Sells Equivalent of 2,240 Drinks in One Week.

Pontiae, Mich., Jan. 23:-The books of one Pontiac druggist show nat in a single week recently he had 80 sales of whiskey. Although Pouse is in a "dry" county druggists are rmitted to sell, as in all dry counes, under certain restrictions. The juor they sell must not be drunk on e premises, and a record must be ade of every sale.

In 1904 hearly every city in the state of Kansas had lopen saloors perated under a mulct or fine system (lthough a state wide prohibition law was in effect at that time) and during his year the total number of prisoners the state penal institutions was 771. In 1909, with the open saloon a polished, but "blind pigs" and dives runing in every city and viliage in ie state of Kansas, the total number prisoners was 819.
