

The Senator Fox highway bill. which passed both houses, is the longest bill introduced in either recomme house this session. It makes 187 follows: printed pages. Also it directly concerns every farmer in the state.

There are today over 100 laws on the books relating to country roads. Some were enacted a half-century or more ago, and some contravene each H Rempert 151/2 " other. The Fox bill repeals them all and re-enacts the best of all of them, that are not obsolete. In addition there are many new provisions. The most essential ones are:

All country roads are placed on a uniform system, and must be surveved and marked with monuments every 80 rods and recorded in the permanent record in the town clerk's
