**A Distressing Accident.**  
During the celebration in this city last Saturday an accident happened in which Earl Allen came near losing his life and a valuable driving horse owned by Collie Johnson was killed. An attempt was made to pull off a running race on Lake street. Three horses were entered and the start was made from the Prescott corner with the intention of running to Friedman's corner. When in front of Johnson's jewelry store "Honest John," owned by Collie Johnson, with Earl Allen as rider, collided with a maple tree. Young Allen was picked up in a semi-unconscious condition and taken to Dr. Crane's office where it was found he had sustained a fracture of two ribs and was otherwise badly bruised. He was removed to the home of his sister, Mrs. William Roullier, and is now making satisfactory recovery. He is the son of William Allen, of Grant, and that he escaped with life is a miracle.  
It is to be hoped that this will be the last attempt ever made in this city to pull off a horse race on our streets. Had the accident happened a block further down the street where the crowd was there can be no possible doubt but what someone would have been killed and more injured.
