Farm Insurance.

Lansing, August 5.—Next month the amendment to the farmers' mutual fire insurance law of Michigan whereby the class of companies indicated may classify their risks and make rates of assessment in accordance with the hazard assumed, will become effective. Ever since its enactment in 1873, this law has provided that all classes of property shall be assessed ratably, which means that the same charge necessarily was made for a ramshackle, dilapidated barn as for a steel and concrete structure, if there happened to be such a building within the field of such companies' operations. The growing use of lightning rods within the past few years suggested the advisability of amending the law so that a less charge might be made for properly rodded buildings than for buildings without rods. For a number of years a very large percentage of the losses sustained by farmers mutual were due to lightning, and observation evidently convinced the officers and members of these companies that properly adjusted rods are a positive protection. So strong has this belief become that within the past year there has been organized in the state a mutual company which will insure nothing but rodded buildings, and it makes a very low rate of this class structures. This induced the members of the state association of farmers' mutual fire insurance companies to ask the last legislature to amend the law so that the companies represented by them might meet this reduced rate. It is probable that as soon as the law takes effect next month the 100 or more mutual companies throughout the state will make a reduction in the rate of assessment on rodded buildings. While the losses due to lightning are not as great as has been advertised throughout the state recently through the circulation of a bulletin issued by the Ohio fire marshal. This bulletin embodied the statement that in 1906 the farmers' mutual fire insurance companies of Michigan sustained losses aggregating more than three million of dollars from this cause. This is a gross error. The fact being that the aggregated losses reported by the mutual companies of Michigan for the year named were \$713,096, while the aggregate of losses due to lightning for that year was \$241,411. It will be seen that the percentage of lightning losses was sufficiently large to warrant the adoption of any and all measures that reasonable promise a reduction. If the plan works out as its projectors hope, the average rate of assessment on farm risks will gradually decrease.

Notice is hereby given, That we, A. B. Schneider and A. H. Townsend, County Drain Commissioners of Iosco and Arenac, State of Michigan, will, on the 11th day of August, A. D., 1909, at the residence of Chas. Cottrell, in the Township of Sherman, in said County of Iosco, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, proceed to receive bids for the construction of a certain drain known and designated as "County Line Drain," to be located and established in the Township of Sherman, in said County of Iosco and described as follows, to-wit:

1 Commencing on the west bank of the Au Gres river 17 feet north of the county line and running thence north 88 degrees and 30 minutes west, 203 1/2 feet to the west line of section 33, at a point 17 feet north of the section corner, along the lands of J. C. Barber, thence north 88 degrees 45 minutes west 346 1/2 feet, thence north 88 degrees 30 minutes west 171 1/2 feet to the section line between section 31 and 32 at a point 17 feet north of said corner, thence north 88 degrees 15 minutes west to a point 101 1/2 feet west of the section corner between section 31 and 32 and 17 feet north of the section line, the said lands of H. H. APPIN.

SPECIFICATIONS.
1 Three rods wide on either side of the center line shall be required for the right of way and for the depositing of the excavations taken therefrom.
2 All excavations taken from said drain shall be deposited on south side and in center of highway and leveled down so as to form a road bed 16 feet wide on top.
3 Said drain to be five feet wide on the bottom and to have side slopes of one foot horizontal to one foot perpendicular.
4 Grade stakes are set 100 feet apart commencing at outlet and numbered consecutively therefrom.
5 The width of the surface excavation shall be governed by the slope width on bottom and depth which is mentioned from a level with the top of grade hubs in feet and tenth of feet as follows:
