War On Public Spitting.

A state anti-tuberculosis law having been passed, the state association wishing to concentrate its energies during the coming year in securing the passages of anti-spitting ordinance in every town and village in the state of Michigan; further, not only to secure the passage of such an ordinance but to rouse and educate public sentiment to such a degree that the ordinance will be enforced. Inasmuch as spitting is the chief method by which tuberculosis is spread throughout the community, efforts are to be directed to the suppression of this unnecessary, offensive and dangerous nuisance. The state association has had drawn up for it a model anti-spitting ordinance prepared by Prof. Henry M. Bates of the law department of the University of Michigan. Ionia has already passed this ordinance and the local association of Ypsilanti is working to have its passage in that city. Every effort to stamp out the spitting nuisance in each community is being made.

A Chunk of Wisdom.

Editor Bodene, who runs a country paper in Missouri, hands out the following chunk of wisdom: "Whatever you do, brother, don't get too good. There is a piety that is depressing and which immediately breeds suspicion and distrust. Most every man has his faults, and if our secret acts and thoughts, or even

those things people know about us, but which we think they don't know about us, were held up to the public we would shrink, cut to the quick, and flee to hide our moral and spiritual nakedness. Some of us get drunk, and that's bad; some of us lie like dogs, and that's worse; and some of us love money better than we do truth; some of us cheat, steal and dodge our taxes, and that's 'worse' still; though among the 'worse' it is considered a virtue. But the crowning sin of all this is our charity for the frailties of others, which rejoices when others are crucified, and which attempts to hide its secret joy with sniffling and pious depreciation. Men dislike such people, and God despises them. No, whatever you do, don't get too good.

The Coming Building Material.

Concrete is composed of cement, sand, and fine rock or gravel. Its manufacture is as old as the Roman Empire, but it is only of late years that Portland cement has been known; and that the wonderful combination of cement and steel, reinforced concrete, has become an important factor in building operations, especially in supplanting structural steel. So far as the supply is concerned and likewise the value of concrete as a building material, its position as a competitor of stone or as a supplement to stone in building operations is in most instances unsatisfactory, while the reinforced concrete beam and column have, in the opinion of many engineers, great advantage for certain purposes over steel framing. The constituents of concrete are not only unlimited in quantity, but they are widely distributed, so as to be cheaply procurable in every section of the country; and when properly made it seems to be not only the equal, but in many respects the superior, of the very best

building stone, excepting probably the question of appearance. Moreover, it is useful in a score of ways where stone and brick cannot be economically employed. Sand and rock or gravel are, of course, present in every state in the Union in absolutely inexhaustible quantities, and the materials for the manufacture of cement are only slightly less widely distributed and plentiful. Green Corn on the Cob.

The taste for green corn, like that for the symphonies of Ludwig van Beethoven, is not universally diffused among the races of men. The Scotchman, though he eats oats with gusto, regards corn as a feed rather than a food, and the German busy with his rye bread sauerbraten, has no time to master the difficult art of eating it.

Certain misguided persons, in an effort to spread the cult of corn on the cob, have recently devised ingenious hooks and prongs for holding it to the face. The idea of these inventors seems to be that the prejudice against corn, among many races, is due entirely to the risks attending the orthodox method of eating it. The new fangled corn hooks makes the operation so simple that a novice can master it in one lesson. When they are employed the fingers do not touch the ear at all, instead, it is safely impaled, like a beetle on a pin, and so all danger to the clothing, eye and surrounding public is removed.

Despite the apparent refinement of the art, we are unable to approve it. To get the true flavor of green corn one might eat it in the manner followed for centuries by those epicurean eastern shoremen who are the acknowledged rhapsods of the art. If the fingers do not touch, how can one get the full measure of its electric warmth? With a steel prong piercing its vitals, how can it appeal to the imagination? With all danger of its sudden flight removed, where is its old romance? Away with all such mechanical impediments to poetic eating! As well kiss a pretty girl through a sieve!—Baltimore Sun.

State Capital Briefs.

Lansing, Aug. 12.—During the month of May there was sold at the binding twine plant at the Jackson state prison \$7,126.18 of twine.

The annual excursion to the Agricultural College at East Lansing will be run during the week of August 23, and trains will carry excursionists from nearly all of the state. Uniformed guides will conduct the visitors about the buildings and grounds and the laboratories and shops will be open for inspection.

The monthly report of Game Warden Pierce's department shows that a total of 182 complaints of violations of the law were received. After investigating this number, 108 cases were started and 96 convictions were secured. During the month the department collected \$1,372.70 in fines and costs and seized fish for \$72.42.

The first consignment of the new public acts have been received by the secretary of state and the general distribution of these acts started this week. All the new laws except those given immediate effect under the emergency section of the constitution will take effect September 2.

Political matters are still in the limelight. There is now however more gossip about the republican nomination for lieutenant governor than about the gubernatorial nomination. Three possible candidates for lieutenant governor have been mentioned. Ex-Congressman A. B. Darragh, of St. Louis; Senator L. B. Dickinson, of Charlotte; and Fred Postal, of Detroit.

The Secretary of State's office is working on a new design for automobile license tags which the state furnishes when the \$3 license fee is paid by buzz wagon owners. A new color or style is required each year so that it can be readily seen whether the license is paid or not.

Owing to a lack of funds in many counties Highway Commissioner Ely states that not as many miles of roads will be built this year as usual, but for all that about 200 places in the state are building roads.

Raw Material Import Records Are Smashed.

Washington, August 8.—All records for importations of manufacturers' material imported into the United States were broken during the fiscal year 1909, according to the bureau of statistics, in a statement made public today.

Raw wool, raw cotton, raw silk, fibers, hides and skins, India rubber, tobacco, tin, copper, lumber, and certain articles included under the general group "chemicals, drugs, and dyes," are the principal articles imported for manufacturing, and in nearly all of these the quantity imported in 1909 exceeded that of any earlier year.

There are a few exceptions: Raw wool, for example, shows a slightly higher quantity imported in the fiscal year 1897, pending the enactment of the Dingley law, which transferred wool from the free to the dutiable list; pig tin, lead, cotton, and lumber show in certain earlier years quantities slightly in excess of the figures of 1909. But in all other important articles of manufacture, such as copper ore, copper pigs, fibers, hides and skins, India rubber, raw silk, tobacco, and many other articles of less importance, the quantities imported in 1909 are larger than ever before, and so much exceed the record of any earlier year as to fully justify

the assertion that the quantity of manufacturers' material imported in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1909, exceeded that of any earlier fiscal year.

While this is the highest record as to quantity of manufacturers' material imported, it does not represent the highest values. On the contrary the figures of the bureau show that the value of crude materials imported for use in manufacturing in the fiscal year 1909 was twenty-four million dollars below the value of this group of imports in 1907, and manufacturers for further use in manufacturing were fifty-two million dollars below the figures of 1907.

The fall in value is ascribed to the lower prices prevailing in 1909 than in 1907.

First Exemptions Next Year. Lansing, Aug. 12.—Many supervisors are already requested to exempt property from taxation this year under the D. G. Chandler bill which passed at the last session of the legislature, but this will be impossible although the act goes into effect next month.

The act exempts property of veterans of the civil war who own property of a value not exceeding \$1,200, from taxation. Also some are requesting, where they own property valued above that figure, to have that amount deducted, but this is also impossible, the law being very clear that anyone owning property valued at any more than \$1,200 must pay taxes.

Liquor Law Provisions.

Lansing, Aug. 12.—Under the new liquor law which was passed at the last session of the legislature, and which goes into effect September 2 a great many saloons in Michigan will have to discard expensive signs, electric signs, etc., which hang over their front doors. The law prohibits the display of a sign advertising liquors upon the outside of any part of a building used for retailing liquors.

Many places will also have a problem to face in deciding the limits of districts where saloons may be located, the act prescribing that no new bar or saloon can be established within 400 feet along the street line from the front entrance of a church or public school house, or to establish a new bar or saloon in any residence district without the consent of all the property owners within 300 feet. Just how to define a residence district is a matter which will probably be up to many councils to decide in many cities.
