A NEW DEVELOPMENT

Which Offers Our City an Opportunity of Securing an Important New Industry.—Another Use for the Remains of Our Saw Mills.

During the past year Albert Widdis has been shipping the slabs removed from the old docks along the bay to Detroit, as everyone supposed for kindlings. It now develops that he has been experimenting on their use for the manufacture of paper, and that the experiment has proven entirely successful, and that the very best grade of paper can be made from the pulp obtained from these slabs.

Mr. Widdis has shown us a sample of the pulp which is of excellent quality. He owns a large quantity of this material along the Huron shore, having purchased many of the abandoned lumber docks, even as far north as Cheboygan, and estimates that he has sufficient to supply a first class mill for 25 years.

In talking of the matter to Mr. Widdis, the Herald scribe broached the matter of manufacturing the pulp here. A mill of ordinary capacity gives steady employment to about 50 hands and such an institution would certainly be a god-send to our city at this time. In addition to the material already mentioned it would supply a demand for the pulp wood of our farmers, thousands of cords of which are growing tributary of this to this city.

Why should action not be taken at once to see what can be accomplished toward the establishment of this industry here.

It would be a permanent institution as the demand for paper is ever increasing. Let our city fathers and citizens generally "get a move" on them and see if we cannot land this industry instead of

allowing the raw material to be shipped elsewhere to be manufactured thus supplying labor for others while our laboring men have to go elsewhere for work. The matter has been broached to a number of our leading citizens and all are most favorably impressed with the idea, and it will probably be taken up by the city council at once.

A Game of Swap and Swindle

The whole tariff discussion has been unspeakably sickening. Time was when the American people thought they were doing a man honor by sending him to congress. If they still retain that superstition, it is another evidence of the triumph of hope over experience. From the start of the tariff debates to their present dragging finish it has been a game of swap and swindle. The first consideration has been to get the greatest possible loot for the favored "interests," the next to keep the greatest possible number of votes in line for the complainant congressmen; and never yet have the interests of the people, or the plain call of decency received official attention in the tussle. There have been exceptions—brilliant exceptions—the most constant and brilliant of them being Senator Gore, of Oklahoma. But no fraud yet proposed has lacked a majority when the test came, and no decent proposition has been able to do better than rank as a bad second in a foredoomed race.

And the utter shamelessness of some representatives of the "interests" is appalling.—Denver News.

The Farmer Smiles.

In estimating the scope and weight of the mighty forces that are working for the full restoration of that prosperity which ought to be the normal condition of the American people, city dwellers should not lose sight of the farmer and his crops.

The latest government report shows striking gains in spring wheat. This indicates that the output of bread-making material will not only be ample for our own wants, but that a substantial surplus for supplying the hungry consumers of Europe will be available. Corn and cereals in the west promise record smashing yields. It is declared that the products of the western soil this summer may exceed in value the enormous sum of eight billion dollars—to say nothing of the crops grown in the east and south.

The farmer in his shirt sleeves and overalls is a romantic figure as he toils under the blazing sun to reap the grain that feeds all of us. But his persevering industry, when crops are good, furnishes the surest and most solid basis for the operations of forge, factory, mill and mart. When he thrives the rest of the nation is apt to prosper also, and all the signs go to show that he is doing very well indeed in the year 1909.—Saginaw News.

Troubles for Saloonists.

The new liquor bill which goes into effect next month contains many interesting features and bids fair to cause considerable trouble and it is not unlikely that the supreme court will be called upon to settle some points in dispute.

In the new law it is provided that in case of two violations of the liquor laws the license shall be forfeited and the violator cannot longer engage in the business. The old law provided for a similar punishment upon one conviction, but this was declared unconstitutional. However the new law gets around this difficulty by making it an agreement on the part of the man taking out the license that if he is convicted twice he shall forfeit his license. When he gets his red card he signs this agreement and thus becomes a party to a contract which, is claimed, cannot be broken.

Another feature which will make it difficult for saloon keepers to secure bondsmen lies in the fact that no surety can go on more than one bond and he cannot obligate himself to a greater amount than the assessed valuation of his property in the county free from all incumbrance and indebtedness. Heretofore one man has gone upon many bonds and while his assessed valuation might be but \$5,000, he has claimed he was worth \$10,000 and has been allowed to obligate himself to that extent.

From Abroad.

Heidelberg, Germany.
July 30, 1909.

Friend Patterson:—

We have been having an ever changing panorama since last Sunday. From Cologne we have been in the Rhine valley, traveling chiefly by boat. From Borm to Coblenz the mountains and valleys vie with each other in grandeur and beauty. We have grapes everywhere. No wonder this is a wine district.

At Cologne we listened to a concert in the cathedral. There were at least 100 voices and the melody filled the great nave and seemed to come rolling down from the ceiling 150 feet above our heads. It should be remembered that this is the finest cathedral in Europe outside of Italy. Top of spires is 512 feet from ground and entirely of stone. We climbed up about 400 feet, getting a splendid view of the city and surrounding country. Castles and crags, mountains and valleys, islands and villages, greeted us at every turn of the Rhine. Strip this river of its history and "chiefless" castles and it would still be grand.

Nothing is wasted in this country every twig is saved and every foot of ground tilled. Terrace above terrace has been built upon the hill-sides by carrying up good soil—here the grape thrives. No one is idle men, women and children all work in the fields.

We are here under the mountain which we explored—for it is covered with dense forest—yesterday. Today we visit the old castle and take a look at the great "tun" which held 49,000 gal. of wine.

Holland with its dykes, cows, canals, dogs, and cheese was a delight; so clean and tidy and flowers everywhere. The trip from Amsterdam to Marken was one not to be forgotten—the fisher folk are so strange they have not changed in a century.

State Capitol News Briefs.

Lansing, Aug. 19.—During the month of June the number of persons confined in the asylum at Ionia only exceeded the previous month by one and but few changes were recorded. At the close of May there were 391 persons in this institution and at the close of June 392 of which 336 were males and 57 females.

There were but two new additions during the month of June and one removal by death.

Prof. R. C. Allen was chosen state geological survey which held its meeting in Detroit and he will succeed Alfred C. Lane September 1. Dr. Lane has held the position for the past 20 years, but resigned recently to take a position on the faculty of Tuft's College.

A commission which will not assume its duties for four years has been named. It is the commission provided for by the legislature to represent Michigan at the centennial celebration of the Battle of Lake Erie, which is to be held at Put-in-Bay in 1913. The following commission was named: Charles Moore, Detroit; Roy S. Barnhart, Grand Rapids; E. K. Warren Three Oaks; S. L. Merriman and Albert L. Stephens, of Detroit.

The convictions of two men in Presque Isle county for trespassing on state lands has been reported to the state land office.

State Game Warden Pierce has received word that "shining deer" proved an expensive method of hunting for William Rooma, of Marquette. While hunting deer the report says Rooma shot a valuable horse by mistake and he had to pay \$250.

Elliott F. Grabill, of Greenville, has been appointed as a member of the board of managers of the soldiers, home at Grand Rapids to succeed Townsend A. Ely, resigned.

The Michigan railroad commission left last week for the upper peninsula for the annual inspection of the railroad lines in that section of the state. Secretary Kelley, Engineer Bice and Inspector Steyens accompanied the party which return to Lansing about August 22.

There was quite a decrease in the number of people confined in the Michigan asylum for the insane located at Kalamazoo during the month of June over the previous month. At the end of May, 1,892 people were confined in the institution, whereas at the end of June the number was 1,883—957 males and 896 females.

The charges were brought about by 31 new persons being admitted, four former inmates re-admitted and the

return of 10 probationers, while 27 were allowed to leave the institution on probation six were given indefinite leave and 20 deaths were recorded—14 males and six females.

Michigan Soldiers' Home.

Lansing, Aug. 19.—The month of June was a busy one at the Michigan Soldiers' Home, located at Grand Rapids, although the total attendance did not reach the figures of the previous month, the number of charges was large.

At the close of May there were 1,046 persons in the home—924 men and 122 women, as compared to 934 at the close of June—825 men and 109 women. However, 19 new admissions were recorded, 24 former inmates readmitted and 348 absentees returned.

These figures were offset by 28 persons being discharged during the month, 494 being dismissed on vacation or indefinite absence while 15 deaths—14 males and one female—were recorded.

Alaska's Coal.

Alaska has no competitor. Its store of high-grade fuel can not be equalled in quality west of the Rockies.

In fact to find anthracite and bituminous coal which compares in fuel values with that of Alaska one must come east to Pennsylvania. These coals are, therefore, the key to the commercial situation on the west coast. For a high-grade steaming coal used for manufacturing industries or a merchant marine or a coke for smelters in the western states one must turn to Alaska.

The quantity of this anthracite and bituminous coal is not as yet determined, but it certainly is not unlimited and hence should not be wasted. To use it, however, will not be to waste it unless it be improperly mined. A surveyed area of about one hundred square miles is known to be underlain with these coals, and it is probable that further investigation may show an extension of the field.

A rough estimate of the quantity within this surveyed area gave some six billion tons, or more than one and a half times the entire production of Pennsylvania since coal mining began. It is fair to assume that this coal is worth \$1 a ton, which would make its total value about forty times as great as the entire gold output of Alaska to the present time. It is probable, therefore, that the value of the coal fields exceeds that of the gold reserves.

These coals are, however, practically untouched, for the only coal mining in Alaska is that of some lignites for local use.—American Review of Reviews.

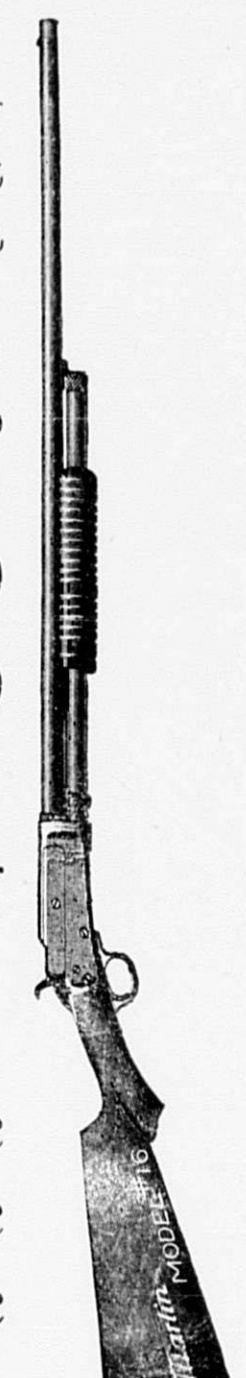
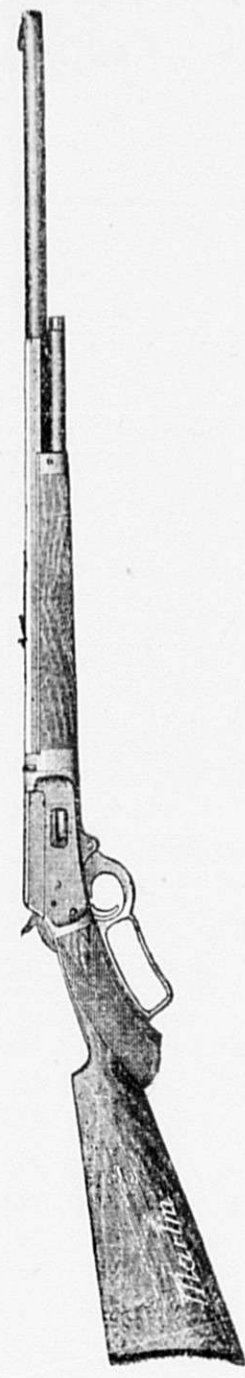
