

Congressman Loud has decided to hold an examination of candidates for appointment of a cadet from the tenth district West Point, at the Federal building, Bay City, on November 20. Any young man in this district is obliged to take the examination if he be 18 years of age, sound mentally and physically and of good character.

The penalty for selling any kind of tobacco to minors under 17 years of age is a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50 or imprisonment for not less than 10 nor more than 30 days, or both. For selling cigarettes to any person under 21 years old, \$50 or 30 days. Any minor smoking cigarettes in public is liable to a fine of \$10 or be sent to jail for 5 days.

The last legislature passed a law providing that at least once a year a meeting of the township clerks, truant officers and other school officers of the county should be held to consider school law and matters of interest to the schools. In accordance with the law state superintendent of public instruction, L. L. Wright, will conduct a meeting in this city, November 30.

Unless people stop selling stale and rotten eggs for fresh ones there will be trouble and an example made. Merchants are paying a big price and it will become the farmer to palm off rotten and stale eggs at 25c per doz. The attorney general and pure food commissioner have been notified and this should be a warning to all guilty parties that a detective may be on the ground any day.

They draw some loads when delivering beets in the neighborhood of Bay City. Joe Minor, who is weigh-master for the Michigan Sugar Co., at Hausbeck, tells us of one load delivered at that station by Reinold Hass, which contained six tons 640 pounds net of beets, and was drawn three miles. One load delivered at the Auburn station by C. J. Schmidt contained six tons 1370 pounds of net beets. Good roads are certainly a good investment for the farmers of that locality.

On account of its constantly increasing business, the Detroit Journal finds it necessary to add to its mechanical facilities, and has now ordered a new stereotyping outfit of the latest pattern, and a Hoe sextuple press. This press, which will be constructed especially for the Journal, is a marvel in its line, and will print a paper containing up to 48 pages, or an eight, ten or twelve-page paper at a speed of 72,000 per hour.

On December 2 delegates from the various counties in the northeastern part of the state will meet at the common council chamber in Bay City, for the purpose of devising ways and means of advancing this section of the state. The agitation for such an organization was started a few weeks ago and the boards of supervisors were invited to elect delegates to such a meeting, and nearly all did so. The delegate elected from Josco county was L. J. Patterson, of Tawas City. In addition to the delegates elected by the supervisors it is requested that the business men's associations, common councils and other organizations send delegates. The idea is to boom northern Michigan. Much interest is being manifested in many of the counties and a big meeting is expected.

Getting Our Rights.

Most people fail to get from others all the consideration they might have. They do not realize that they would have it if only they would stop demanding it. The man who gets least consideration from every one around him is the man who demands most. And the man for whom every one loves to show regard is he who never asks it or even seems to expect it. If we find ourselves jealously noticing that a certain person among our acquaintances always seems to be made more of, and deferred to more readily, and welcomed more eagerly than we are, let us ask ourselves honestly if the reason is not just this: That he does more for others, and asks less for himself, than we. Rights-getting is a sure result of rights-giving. If we really want our rights, let us banish all hint of this from our lives and our actions.—Sunday School Times.

Law of Finding.

How few people seem to appreciate the importance and seriousness of the law governing lost and found property of whatsoever kind.

It is presumable that if anything with a property value exists, that it has an owner somewhere, though that owner may be temporarily separated from that property for a time, and may be out of touch completely, but that property is as surely and really his as though still in his possession, and whoever finds that property is under just as much obligation to make every reasonable effort to locate the owner as though he knew who he was, but how many do so, some, of course, and advertise the same, but the hundreds of lost and found articles that are never mentioned.

Again, other persons finding an article thinks they are under no obligation to restore it unless the owner advertises for it, under the assumption, that if the owner valued or cared for it he would advertise, but this does in no way release the obligation of the finder to locate the owner.

Some time ago a gentleman in the city lost a watch, and it was found by a party who appropriated it to his own use, and took it to a neighboring village for repairs and never mentioned the matter, until a sheriff officer got on the trail of the time piece and traced it to the possession of the finder, and it was restored to its rightful owner, who was not satisfied merely with its restoration, but had the finder arrested for larceny, and upon a plea of guilty he was fined quite heavily by a local magistrate.

One day this week another man found a piece of jewelry and evidently having heard how the just judge rewarded the other fellow, sent it to the justice with the request that he advertise the property, and then in case the rightful owner is not found, the title of the finder is absolute.

The rights of property must be held sacred, no matter how small the article.—Petoskey Independent.

Bad Money Discovered.

Treasury officials have in their possession a counterfeit \$2 silver certificate of the series of 1890. It bears the check letter "A" and the face plate is No. 1110; has the portrait of Washington and the signatures of W. T. Vernon, register of the treasury, and Charles H. Treat, treasurer of the United States. The counterfeit is printed from etched plates and is on good quality of bond paper, but no attempt has been made to imitate the silk fibre effect. The worst feature of the counterfeit is the portrait of Washington in that it does not stand out in relief to the background, which fails to give the life-likeness of the genuine. Darker green ink than that used on the back of the spurious paper.

Strong Drink Habit.

Washington, Nov. 8.—Alcohol and alcoholism are two of the real and substantial enemies of moral, artistic, and commercial progress of the human race, according to the report of the United States delegates to the Twelfth International Congress on alcoholism, just made public by the state department. The delegates were appointed by Secretary Knox as one of his first official acts. The congress was held last July in London, and 25 governments were represented, the delegates of each concurring in the general finding that alcohol not only was unnecessary to human life and comfort, but was inimical to both.

Three departments of the United States government were represented by delegates—the state, navy and treasury. Twelve representatives were abroad, and all unanimously signed the report, the finding of which is to condemn the drinking habit as dangerous to public health and morals and subversive of national moral, commercial, and military greatness.

While the congress urged the necessity of imposing the most rigorous restrictions on the sale and traffic in alcoholic liquors. It regarded as equally important the need of educating the younger generation to a true knowledge of what alcohol is and what its effects upon the human system are. The delegates believe that the numerous recent discoveries as to the harmfulness of drunkenness and even of moderate drinking, also, should be set before children in order that they may see the danger of the practice. The American delegates saw up this phase of their report by saying:

"Increased teaching as to its character and influence should be provided, to conserve industrial efficiency in the commercial competition of nations, as well as to promote two of the chief objects of government; the public health and morals."

The value of this method of combating the growth of the liquor habit is emphasized in the report. While acknowledgement is made that the organization of associations of juvenile abstainers is useful, it is declared that the chief reliance should be placed on scientific temperance education in the public schools as a means of ridding the public mind of errors about the effects of alcohol.

The delegate accepted Queen Wilhelmina's invitation to hold their next meeting, two years hence, at The Hague, in conjunction with the conference of the committee that is working for universal peace.

Refusing Statements.

Lansing, Nov. 11—Many small telephone companies of the state have refused to furnish the state tax commission with a statement as to their annual earnings, claiming that as their gross earnings do not exceed \$500 a year, they are not required to make the report as the law exempts such companies from taxation under the ad valorem system.

In response to a request Attorney General Bird has furnished the commission an opinion in which he states that all telephone companies must make an annual report to the commission and in case they fail to do so, that body has authority to examine the company's books and ascertain what its gross earnings are. He points out that the commission and not the company determine whether the company's earnings are so small as to exempt it from taxation by the commission.

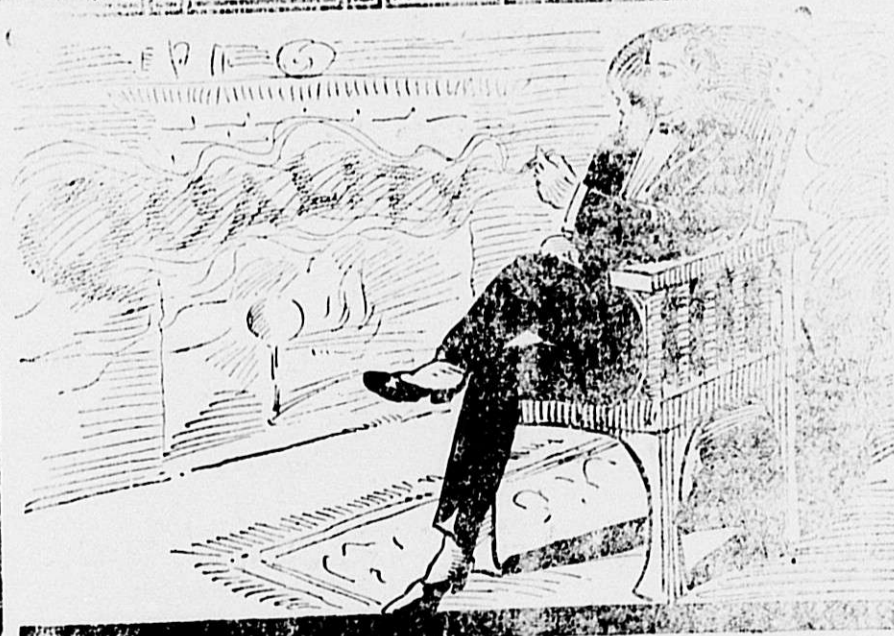
