A Few of the Things the Almanac Schedules for 1910.

The almanac for 1910 has put in an appearance and as usual contains many statistics of interest. The new year will be ushered in on Saturday and it will end on the same day of the week. It is not a leap year. It comprises the latter part of the 134th and the beginning of the 135th year of American independence.

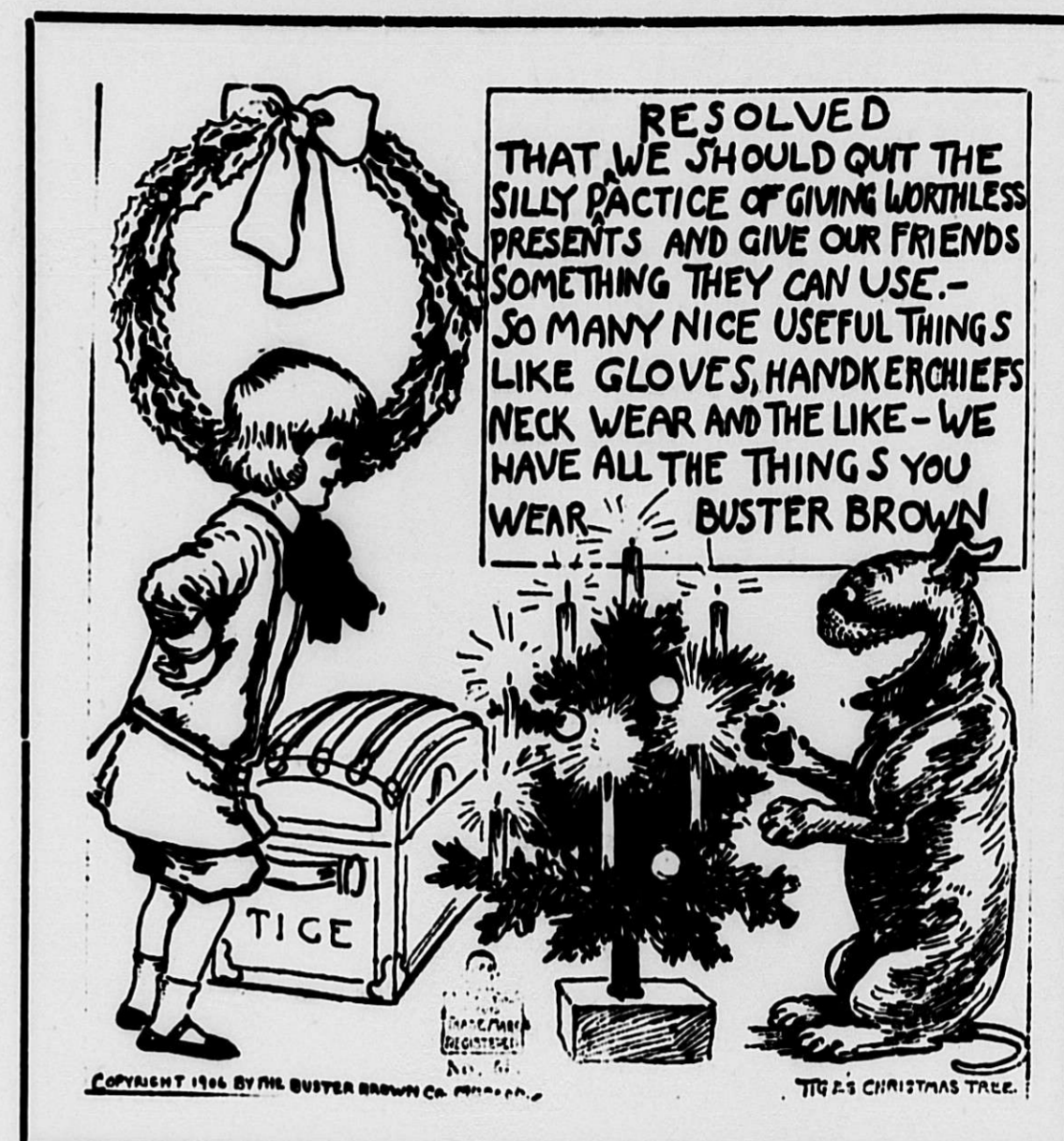
Spring will begin on March 21st, summer on June 22nd, autumn on September 23rd and winter on December 22nd. The ember days will be February 16 18 and 19th, May 18, 20, and 21st, September 21, 23, and 24th, and December 14, 16, and 17th. The feast of the Epiphany will be January 6th. Lent will begin February 9th. Palm Sunday will be March 20th. Good Friday, March 25th and Easter Sunday March 27th. Ascension day will be May 5th and Trinity Sunday May 22d.

There will be one very unlucky day and only one in the year for the superstitious people. This day will be Friday and the 13th day of May. There will be two election days. The spring election will occur on Monday, April 4th, and we will have a state congressional senatorial, representative and county election next year on Tuesday, November 8, which is the very latest it is possible, for November 1st will fall on Tuesday.

There will be four eclipses in 1910 two of the sun and two of the moon. On May 8th there will be a total eclipse of the sun, and on November 1st a partial eclipse, both visible here.

On May 23rd and 24th a total eclipse of the moon will be visible here. It will begin about 8:30 p. m. on the 23rd and end about 2 a. m. on the 24th. Another total eclipse of the moon will be seen here beginning about 3:45 p. m. on November 16th and ending about 9 p. m.

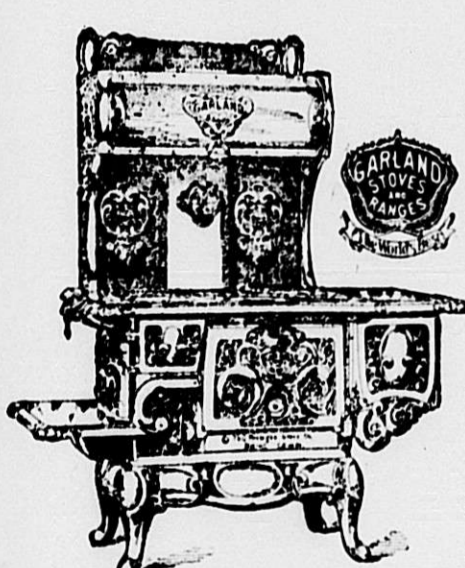

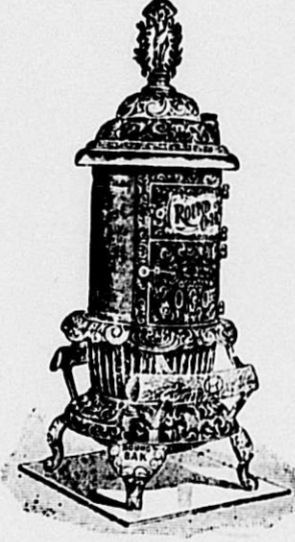

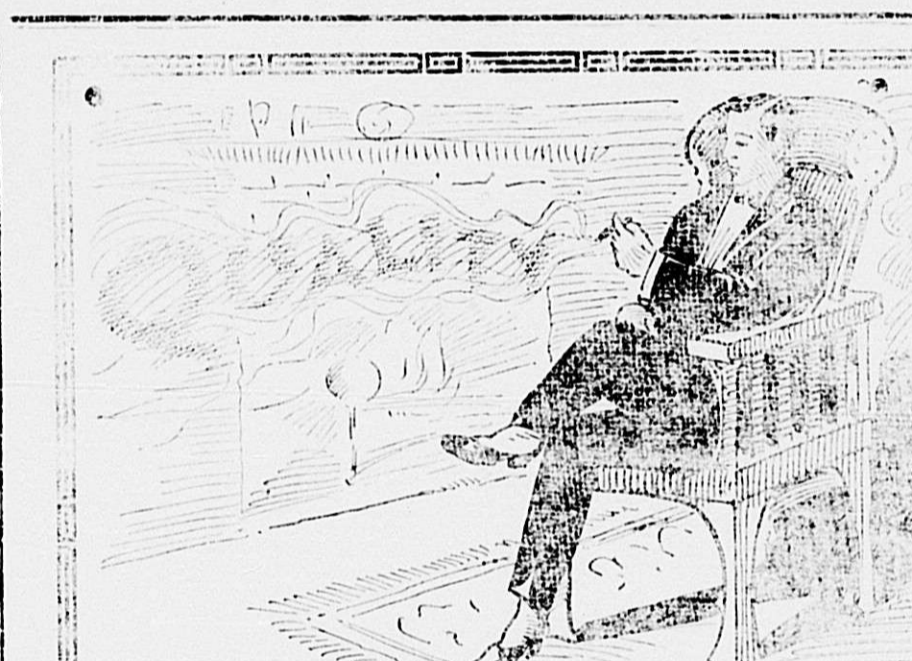

Designs for the new postal cards to be issued by the government have been approved by Postmaster General Hitchcock. The cards will be furnished to the postoffice department by the government printing office in accordance with a contract effective January 1, 1910.

On the ordinary card, the head of former President McKinley will appear, as now, but a much better portrait has been selected. On the new small card, intended for index purposes and social correspondence a likeness of President Lincoln will appear. The two-cent international card will bear a portrait of General Grant.

A novel and pleasing innovation has been made for the double or reply postal card. On the first half will be a portrait of George Washington, while the stamp on the reply half will be a likeness of Martha Washington.

On all the cards the words "Postal Card," will appear on the borders of the stamp and not, as now, as a separate inscription.

An Interesting War Article.

Amid the present-day talk of monster battle-ships to provide for the heaviest batteries, and now that it is agreed that big guns are the great essential, and every nation is trying to have the biggest guns and the biggest vessels to carry the greatest number of big guns, it is interesting to have an article from the pen of an ordnance officer who fought with the first breech-loaders. 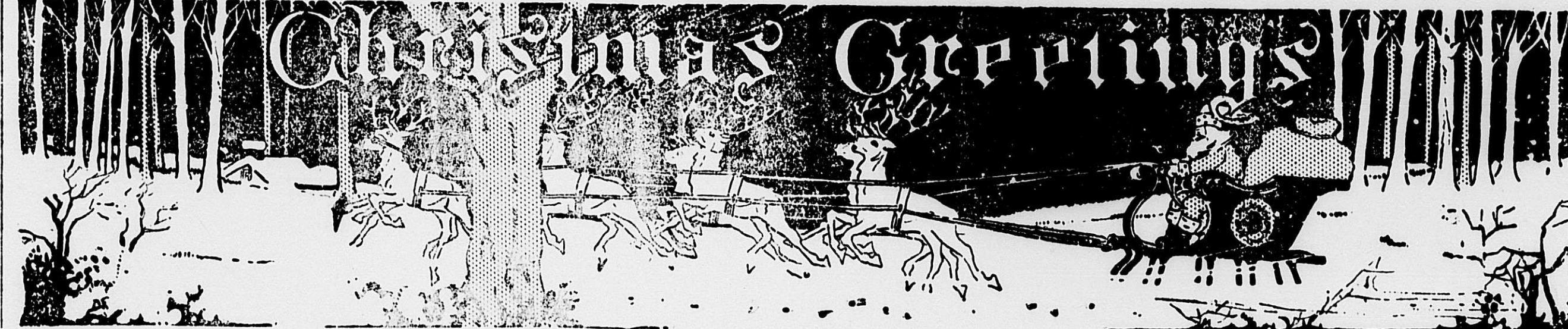
