HIGH RECORD AT SCHMIDT FARM

Cow Produces 686.2 Pounds of Milk and 33.014 Pounds of Butterfat in Seven Days

Four creditable records for the production of butter were made recently in the herd of C. E. Schmidt, of Oscoda, Michigan by his purebred Holstein cow, Eco-Sylv Belle Pietje, according to an official announcement made by the advanced registry department of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

At the age of four years and one month this cow produced 686.2 pounds milk containing 33.014 pounds butterfat equal to 41.27 pounds butter in seven days. In thirty days she produced 2,804.8 pounds milk containing 127.781 pounds butterfat equal to 159.73 pounds butter. In sixty days she produced 5,755.5 pounds milk containing 223.873 pounds butter fat equal to 279.85 pounds butter. Her ninety-day record is 8,274.5 pounds milk containing 802.323 pounds butter fat equal to 377.9 pounds butter.

Testing for the advanced registry is one of the two chief agencies for improving the capacity of dairy cows. The other is the cow testing association. The latter aids the farmer dairyman to size up his herd, cull out the undesirable animals and put his dairy on a paying basis. The former, testing of purebred cows for advanced registry, sorts out the most desirable cows and bulls for the improvement of the breed. Purebred bulls from cows holding advanced registry records are in demand for the improvement of dairy herds in cow testing associations.

1924 Last Noisy Fourth of July in Michigan

Commissioner Harry H. Jackson of the department of public safety has modified the department's ruling in which the sale of fireworks is banned in the state of Michigan. The state will allow dealers to dispose of present stock until July 5, 1924.

July 4, 1924 will be the last noisy fourth in Michigan, Commissioner Jackson declares.

"We are simply putting off the effective date of the order to let the merchants clean up their stock of fireworks and get out of the business," says Jackson. "By this we do not mean that any kind of fireworks can be sold this year. We are going to insist that the law be complied with in every respect, but we are going to permit the sale of firecrackers and the like for the last time."

HIGH CIVIC STANDARDS

A woman whose house needed painting badly at one time excited considerable criticism among her neighbors. She began to get discreet hints, suggesting how regular painting makes a building last longer and increases its sale value. She was somewhat impressed by these hints, yet she delayed and postponed. She told a neighbor finally that she knew her house needed painting, but she would criticize any color that she would put on that she hesitated to do anything, about it. Possibly those particular neighbors were too much inclined to pick flaws. Yet in the main their idea was right, that people ought to consider the effect that the condition of their homes has upon the neighborhood where they are located.

There are many towns and locations where anything seems to go. A man may put up an ugly building or allow his property to become decadent, but no one seems to care or find any fault. There is an easy-going feeling that it is a kind of go as you please place, where anything is accepted tolerantly, and where people can do just as they like without regard to its effect on the community.

Such a state of things may seem pleasant to indolent and careless people, but it checks progress.

If it is proposed in a town to put up an ugly or inadequate public building, public sentiment should demand something more appropriate. The people who allow their places to run down, should realize that they injure others as well as themselves by such neglect.

It would be a fine thing if every real estate owner in Tawas City could look over his property critically beginning this day, and see what renovations are needed this spring. He should not merely be satisfied with what will get by, but should ask if conditions conform with his ideal of what he wants his home town to be.

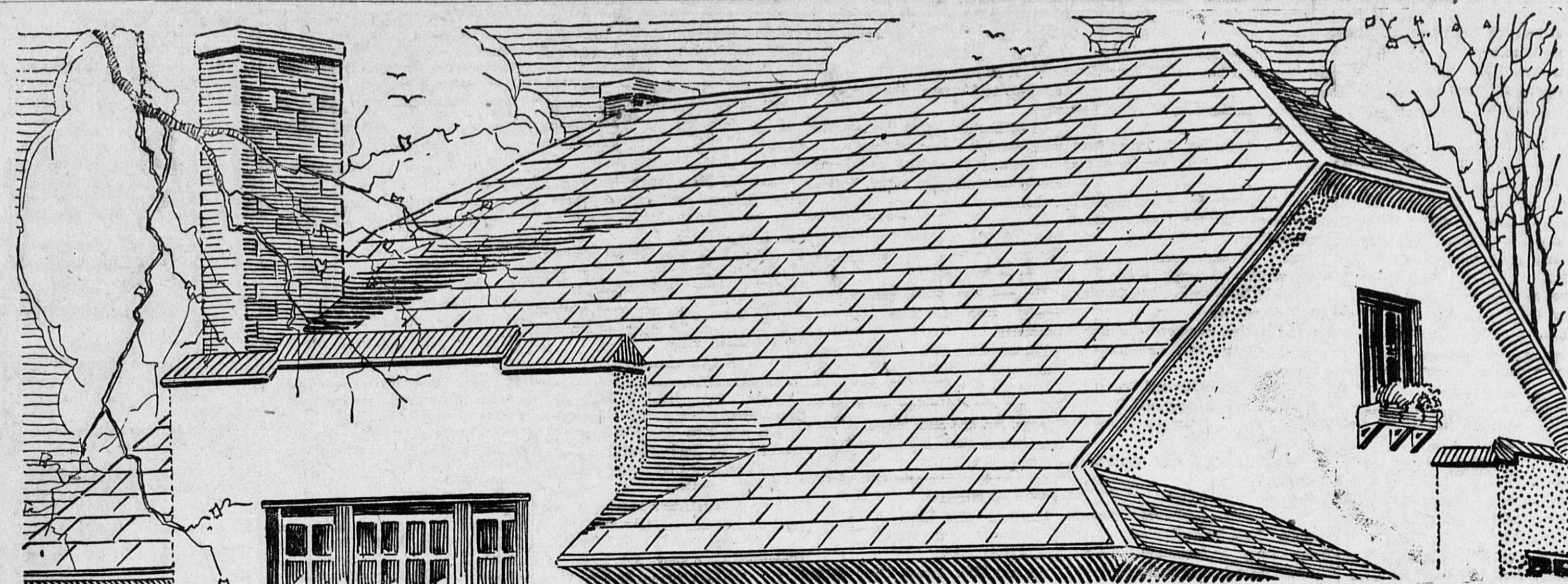

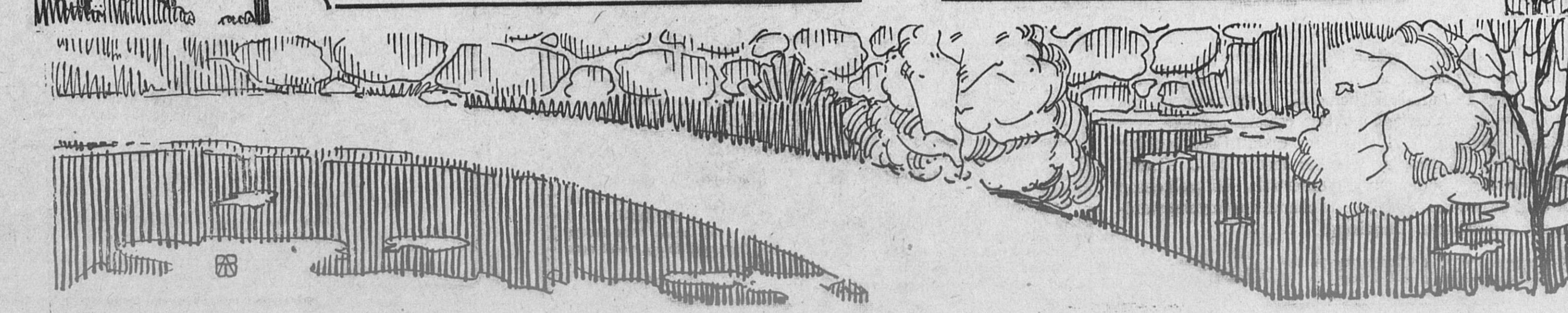

The work of art, however, is not merely the material object, but that object charged with the personality of the artist. It is in his power to make that charge effective that his true faculty of expression lies.—George E. Woodberry, in "The Heart of Man and Other Papers."

In me as Governor of the State of Michigan, I do hereby designate and proclaim Sunday, May eleventh, 1924, as Mothers' Day, and I call upon our people, both old and young to gather in their several places of worship and take part in services appropriate to the day.

And let absent sons and daughters take occasion to visit the mother in the old home, or, where such a visit is impossible, let them send a message of cheer and greeting.

In accordance with a resolution of the Congress of the United States, I further, request the people of Michigan on the day aforesaid to display the United States flag in their homes and in other suitable places, as a fitting expression of their desire to pay homage to American motherhood.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of the State this nineteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-four, and of the Commonwealth the eighty-eighth.

The Romance of Words

WHILE the English or Anglo-Saxon "necktie" is far more generally used in this country than the French "cravat," the latter has a history more striking than could be attributed to the combination of the two mono-syllabic words "neck" and "tie."

The cravat is so-called from a famous French regiment of light horse, named "The Royal Cravates," because they were attired in the fashion of an Austrian province who made up a large portion of the Austrian army. In 1686, the French regiment bearing this name was in uniform in imitation of the Croatian troops, precisely as the Zouaves of a later day took their name and their uniform from a savage tribe in South Africa—and when the neckties worn by these troops became fashionable in civil as well as in military life, the name of the regiment was given to the tie.

The regiment has long since disappeared from the roster of the French army, but the name persists, even in English, as a reminder of the Austrian troops who first wore this style of neck adornment.

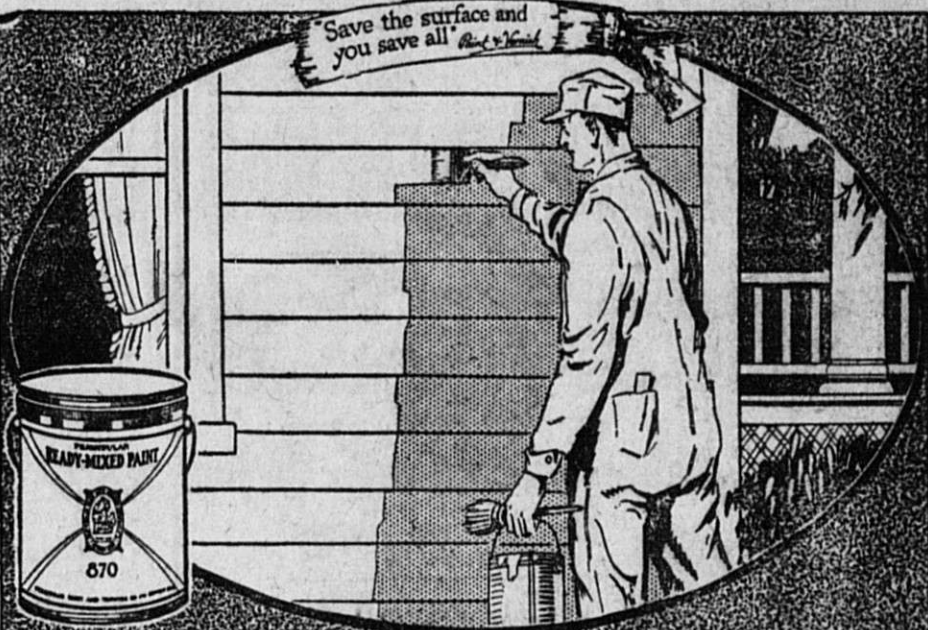

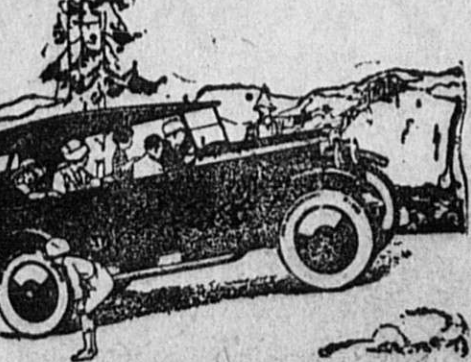
