#### Meeting Called for Tuesday Evening to Aid Veterans Prepare Blanks

Application blanks for adjusted compensation have been received this week by the various American Legion Posts of the state from the War Department.

Veterans wishing to make application for adjusted compensation should apply to the adjutant or welfare officer of his post, or if not a member, of the Legion, should apply to one of those officers of the nearest post. In order to fill out application blank it is necessary that you should have your discharge certificate or certificate in lieu thereof, for detailed information must be given of service, also finger prints must be taken and the application made under oath.

The next regular meeting of Jesse C. Hodder Post, American Legion, will be held Tuesday evening, July 1, at the city hall, Tawas City. At this meeting men who are familiar with work necessary to fill out blanks will be there to help you and the proper officers to administer the oath. There will also be equipment to take your finger prints. Veterans from any part of the county may attend this meeting and receive aid in making out their applications for adjusted compensation.

An invitation is extended at this time to veterans to join Jesse C. Hodder Post at Tawas City. This is the oldest post in the county and has a welfare service record of which its members are justly proud. It has been placed on the roll of honor in the Department of Michigan.

### Revolutionize Target Work at Oscoda

With the closing of military maneuvers at Oscoda field for the season it is found that much has been accomplished in improved air defense at this field during the past month.

Major Carl Spatz, commander of the air forces at Selfridge field, believes that more has been accomplished at Oscoda during that time in the development of air defense than during all the remaining period since the war and the science of shooting from planes has been revolutionized.

"There is nothing fancy or intricate about what they have accomplished," he said, "but they are hitting ground targets five times as often as the expert aerial machine gunners did during the World War, and are hitting aerial targets six times as often as the experts did during the war.

"This improvement in accurate shooting from airplanes is not a gradual development. It is not more than a month old. What the fliers of the First Pursuit Group have done, any flier can do by applying the same methods.

"These methods can be easily adapted to practical training that will be swiftly effective in a national emergency. I think their discovery and application here at Oscoda is the outstanding advance in military aviation since the war.

"The principal explanation of the remarkable shooting at Oscoda since May 1 is a very simple new sight developed at Oscoda. Chief credit for its discovery is given Lieut. Oliver W. Broberg, regarded as champion aerial machine gun shot. Since the plane, not the gun, is aimed at the target, the height is placed on the cowl of the airplane, directly over the engine."
