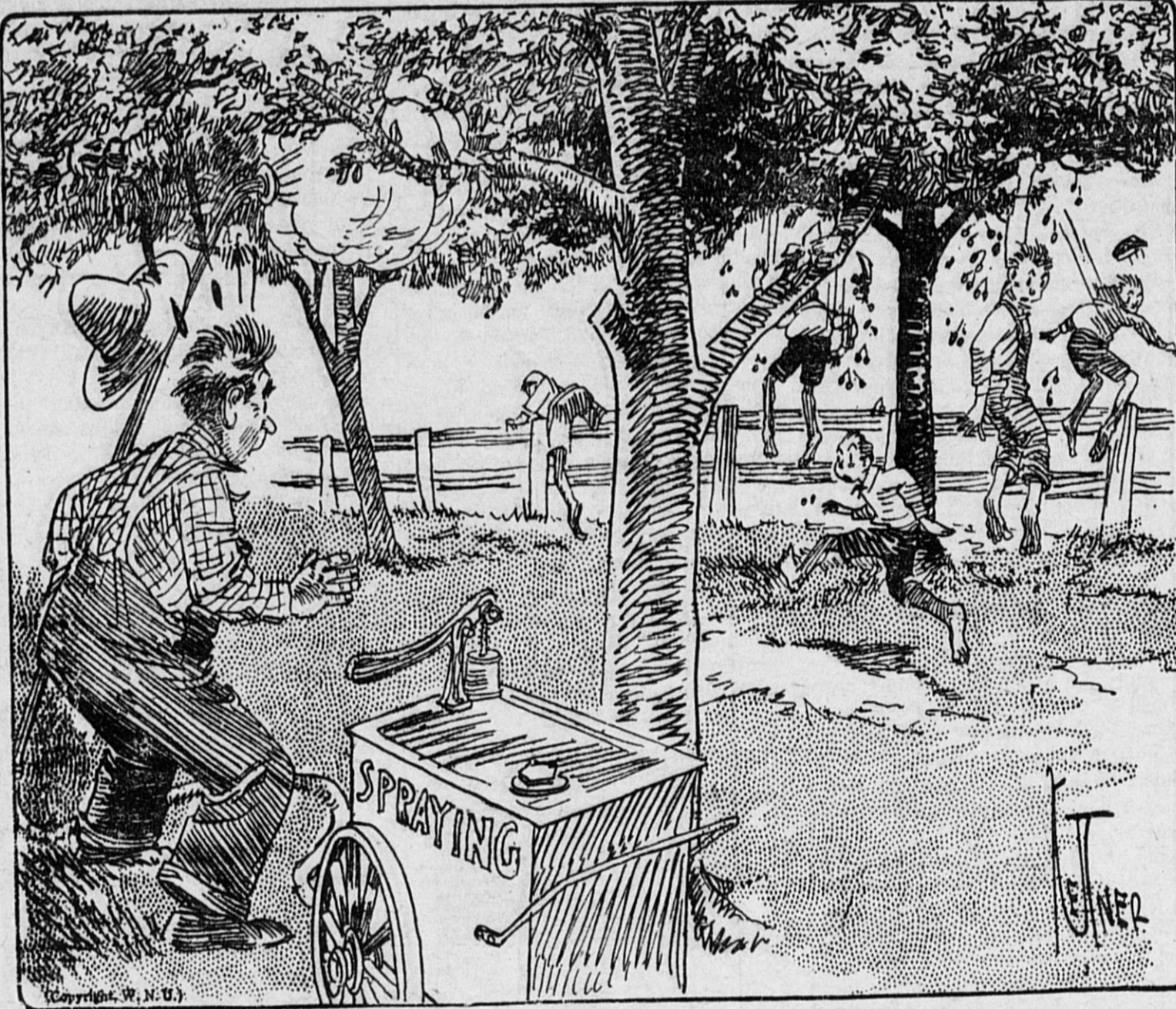

THIEVES ENTER STORES OF CITY SUNDAY NIGHT

Last Sunday night or early Monday morning thieves entered the store of C. H. Prescott & Sons, hardware, C. L. McLean, M. E. Friedman & Sons and the Tawas City filling station in this city. They got away with from \$700.00 to \$1,000.00 in goods and a considerable amount of cash. No trace of the whereabouts of the thieves has so far come to light.

When L. H. Braddock, manager of C. H. Prescott & Sons hardware opened the store at 7:30 Monday morning the first indications of the thieves came to light. The contents of the safe were strewn about the desk and floor. Upon examination it was found that the thieves had entered the back window of the store room and then gained entrance to the sales room by breaking a panel of the door and opening the bolt. From the hardware they entered the sales room of the store of C. L. McLean in the same building. The door was fastened with a bolt here and again they broke a door panel.

Considerable goods were taken from the C. L. McLean store, consisting principally of men's suits, overalls and a large quantity of silk.

The office of C. H. Prescott & Sons was then entered and the safe containing records was ransacked.

The thieves broke into the Tawas City filling station owned by John L. Swartz through a window and removed the cash register, which was locked. Monday afternoon the cash register was found in the brush at the rear of the filling station.

In getting into the store of M. E. Friedman & Sons entrance was gained by unlocking the rear door. Here a large amount of clothing consisting of men's suits, ladies' coats, dresses and skirts and other smaller items were taken away.

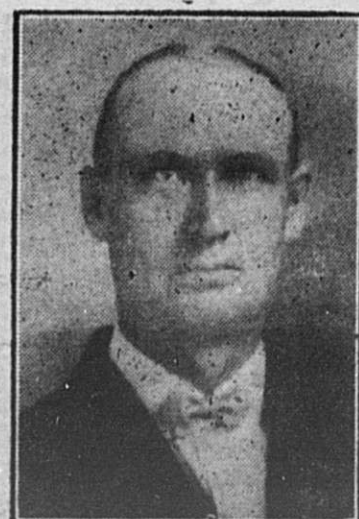
