At the meeting Tuesday evening an assessment was levied on the members and money raised to paint the billet. The new officers also were installed.

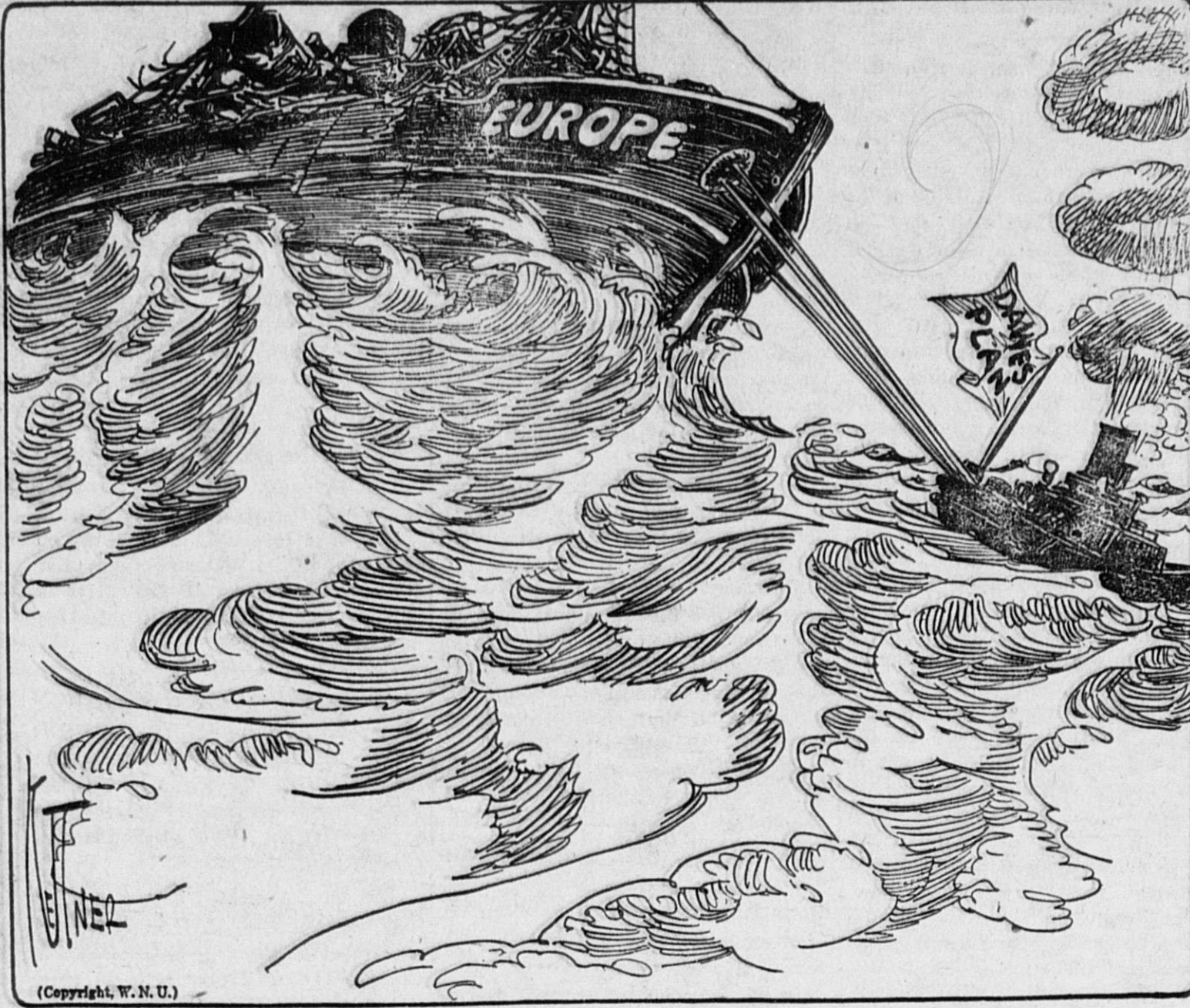

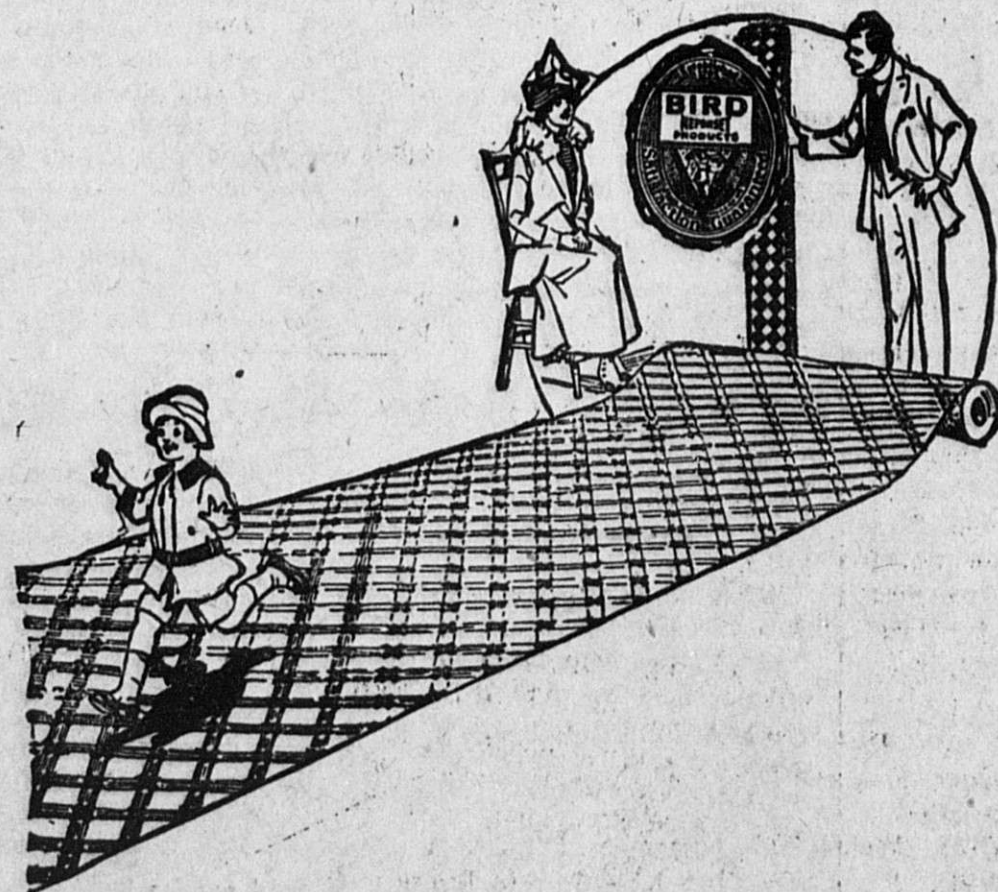

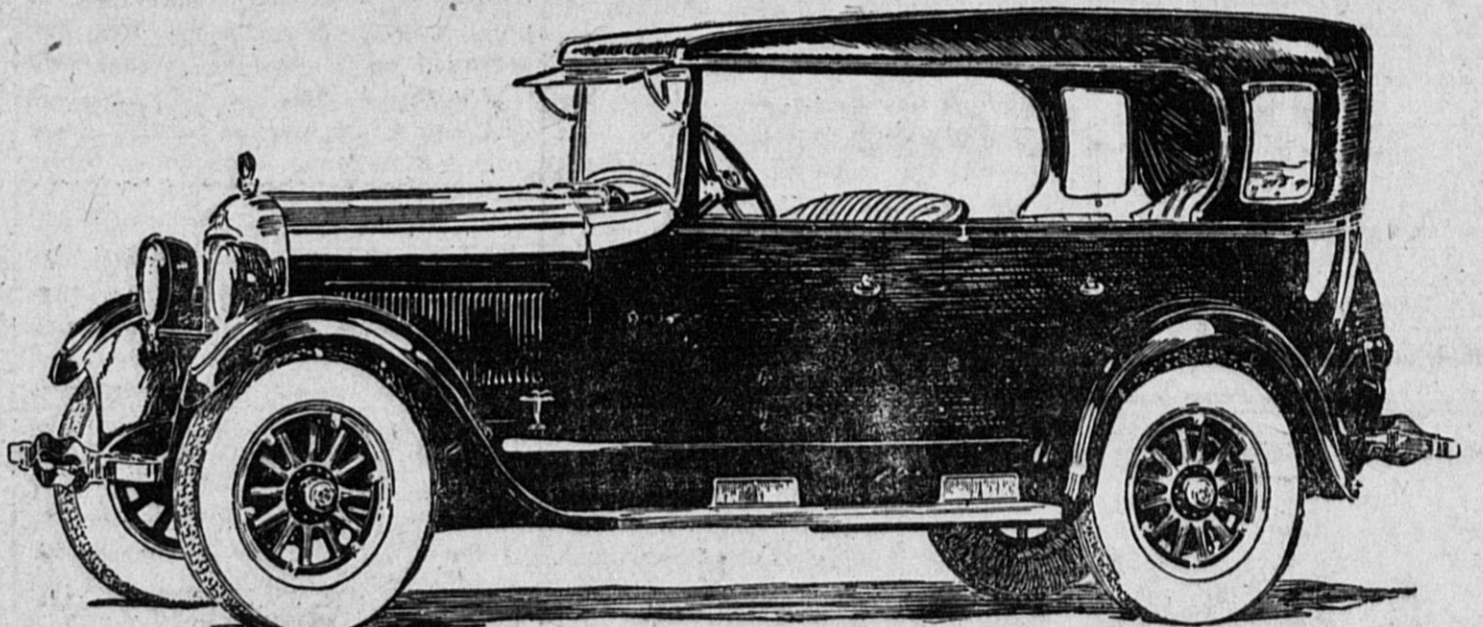
