Mother's Cook Book

THANKSGIVING DINNER

Fruit Cocktail
Chicken Pie Cranberry jelly
Mashed potato puff
Carrots and peas

Celery Olives
Brown and white bread
Lettuce Salad
Pumpkin Pie or Mince Pie

Nuts Coffee

Fruit Cocktail
Equal parts of grapefruit, orange and pineapple. Cut the fruit in small pieces. Sugar to taste. Add two tablespoons of lemon juice for five cups of fruit. Decorate with Maraschino cherries. Chill and let mixture stand one hour before serving.

Chicken Pie
Cook chicken, cut in pieces until tender. Set the hot chicken in baking dish, sprinkle on salt and pepper, pour on the broth to nearly cover the chicken. Have ready the pastry, set it above the chicken letting the edge rest on dish. Make a rich baking powder crust; roll to half an inch in thickness and lay over the top, first buttering the edges and putting bits of butter over chicken, cut gashes in crust, brush with milk, and bake in a hot oven until the top is a rich golden brown. Brush with melted butter when removed from the oven.
