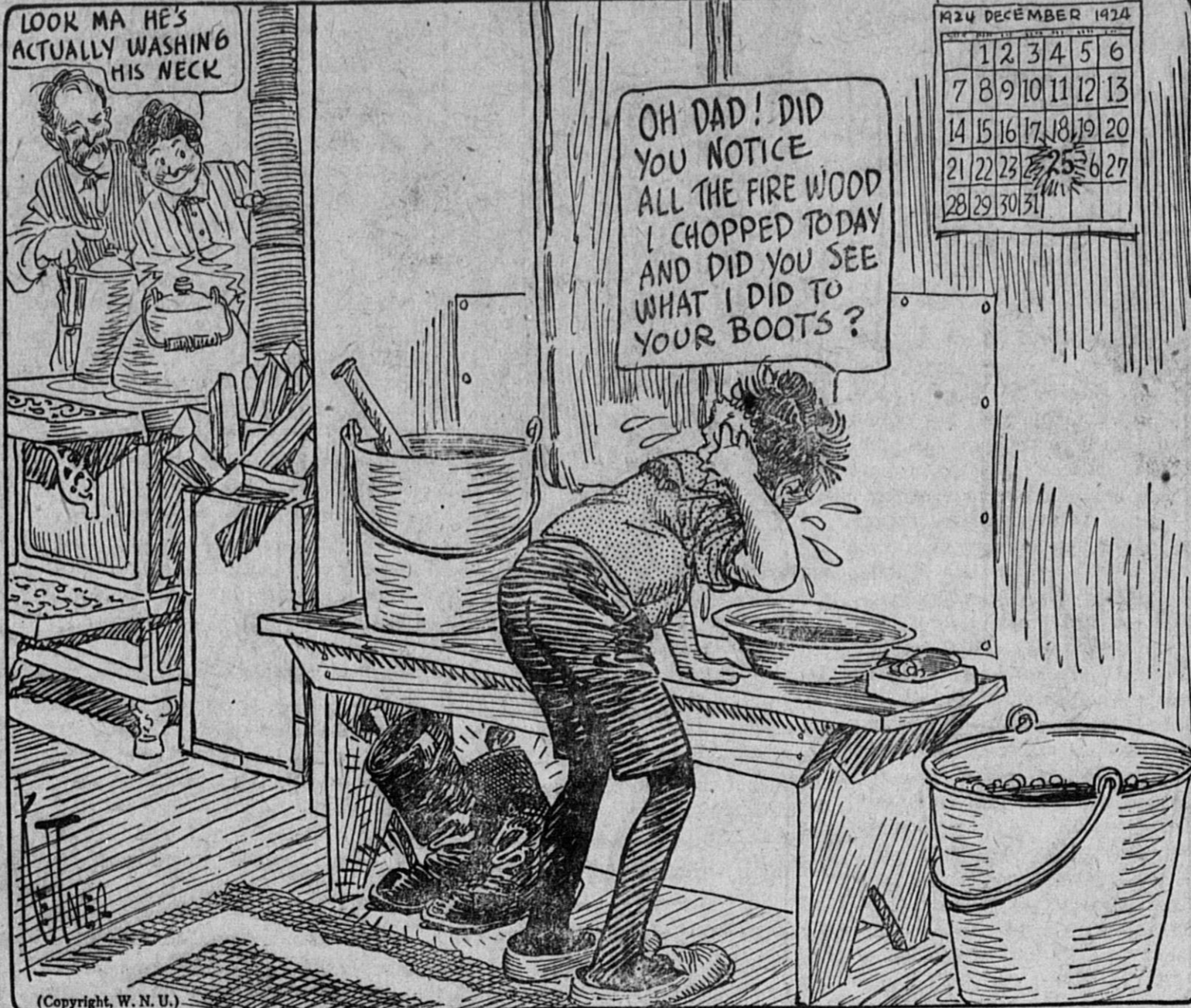

MAIL EARLY FOR CHRISTMAS

The following communication was received by Postmaster M. C. Musolf relative to Christmas mail:

Christmas is a holiday on rural delivery routes. Postmasters and postal employees are urged to give as much publicity as possible to this fact through their local newspapers and otherwise, without expense to the department.

The public should be advised that parcels for delivery on rural routes should be mailed so as to reach the office of delivery at least three or four days before Christmas; also that there is no objection to placing upon the Christmas parcel the inscription "Please do not open until Christmas," or words to that effect.

Christmas last year was observed for the first time as a holiday by the carriers on rural routes throughout the country. This was an experiment. No complaint has resulted from the suspension of service on that day, therefore the holiday will be continued. H. H. Billany, Fourth Assistant Postmaster General

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND KANOTIN CLUB MEET AT HOLLAND HOTEL

Between forty and fifty members attended a joint meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and the Kanotin Club held at the Holland Hotel on the evening of December 5 and enjoyed a dinner prepared by the hotel.

The meeting was begun by community singing after which R. G. Schreck acted as chairman for the evening. The meeting was called to discuss such matters pertaining to conservation as were of vital interest to East Tawas and the surrounding region and to prepare the delegates who are to attend the general conservation meeting that will be held in Lansing on December 10th and 11th as to the views and wishes of the local people.

The following are the resolutions adopted at the joint meeting:
Game—It was moved and supported that the deer season remain as is now. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the protection of does or female deer continue and that the penalty for killing a doe remain the same, or if anything, higher. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the trapping of bear be prohibited and that an open season on this animal be declared for the months of November and December. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the season on partridge extend from October 20 to November 10, annually, that the limit be three birds in one day and ten birds for the season; further, that metal tags be furnished by the Department of Conservation to hunters securing licenses so that all birds may be marked; further, that any birds found in possession not marked in this manner be considered as a violation of the law. Carried.

It was moved and supported that an open season on pheasants be declared for the month of November, that the limit be three birds in one day and ten birds during the season. Metal tags to be furnished by the Department of Conservation for marking dead birds. All birds not so marked and found in possession should be considered a violation of the law. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the State Department of Conservation use their very best efforts to protect private and state lands from the wholesale slaughter of Christmas trees. Carried.

It was moved and supported that a fire lookout tower be erected between East Tawas and AuSable to protect the very valuable timber and recreational resources in that region, that the tower be a modern, inclosed steel structure connected by telephone. (Continued on 1st page section two)

WINS 1ST PREMIUM AT DETROIT CATTLE SHOW

Steer From Richland Farms Makes Excellent Showing

A registered Shorthorn steer shown by C. H. Prescott & Sons at the Detroit Fat Stock show, last week, won the grand championship prize. This steer was 11 months old and weighed 895 pounds. G. A. Prescott, Jr., says that it was one of the finest steers ever grown at the Richland farms.
The steer was purchased from the Prescotts by S. Lowenstein & Co., of Detroit at 85c per pound. This is the highest price ever paid in Michigan for a beef animal.
The steer was accompanied to Detroit by a "nurse cow" to keep it supplied with nourishment. She was not the steers' mother but willingly assumed the duties. It had been fed in this manner to bring it to prime condition quickly, but the excellent condition and growth was due principally to breeding and the high type of Shorthorn cattle grown on the Prescott farms. Mr. Prescott says that the animal would undoubtedly have won grand championship prize at the International show at Chicago if it had been shown there.

A carload of Shorthorn cattle from the Prescott farms also won second prize in the carload class. This was in a competition of 25 cars of cattle. Each car contained 15 animals. The Michigan Beef Co., of Detroit purchased the car load from Prescott's at 16c per pound.
The prize money won by the Prescott cattle amounted to \$250.00. The steer received a \$100.00 premium and the car lot a \$150 premium.

REDUCED PRICES ON FORDS

A cut of \$25 in the price of the Ford sedan, one of the most popular of the Ford enclosed cars, was announced by the Ford Motor Co., late Monday afternoon. The same announcement carried substantial reductions on all other Ford cars. The new prices become effective Tuesday, Dec. 2.

The price reductions come at a time when the car is enjoying the greatest sales in its history, for retail deliveries of Ford cars have so far this year far exceeded the same period in any previous year. Contributing to bringing about lower prices are production advancements during the year in which it has been possible to bring about many improvements and at the same time effect numerous manufacturing economies by the opening up of new resources under company control, the announcement says:

The big reduction in the price of the Ford sedan presents it to a new and larger field of buyers. Originally priced at \$725 when it was introduced in the Ford line about two years ago, the price of the Ford was cut \$40, when reductions were announced October 2, 1923, and now, much improved in appearance by better and more attractive upholstery and equipped with many accessories, the new reduction of \$25 brings this popular family closed car to the remarkably low figure of \$660.

London's City Hall

The Guildhall is the city hall or town hall of London. It dates from the early Fifteenth century. It is the grand civil hall where sovereigns and princes are entertained, freedoms conferred and the great city functions take place. 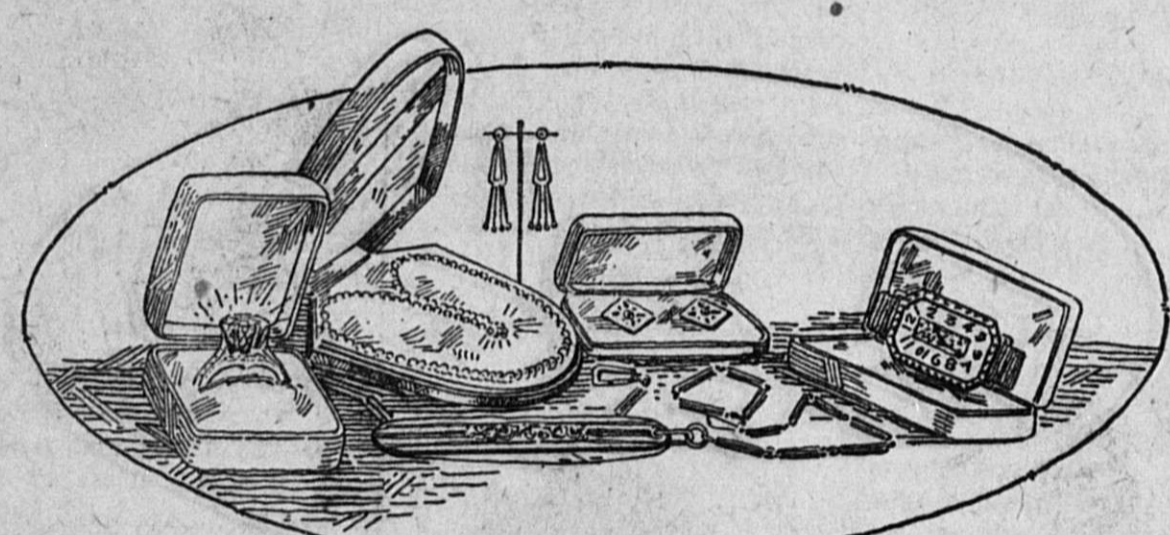

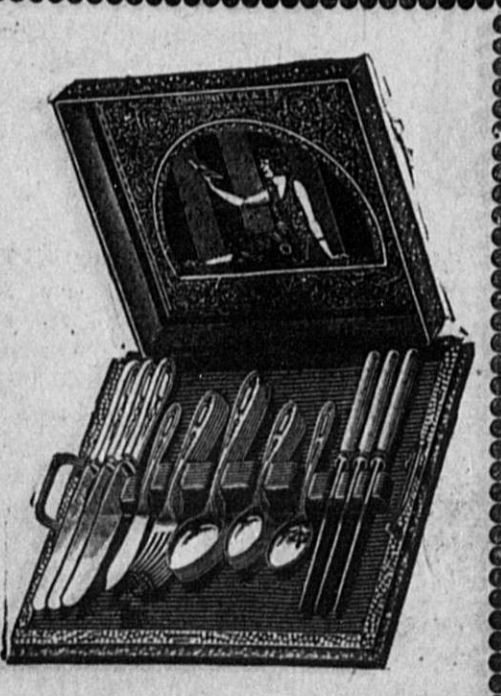

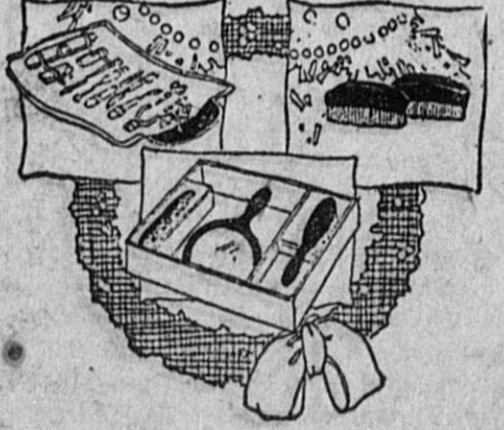

phone and manned by a lookout observer during the entire fire season. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the State Department be requested to furnish all fire wardens with trucks, plows, shovels and other needed equipment for adequate fire protection. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the East Tawas Chamber of Commerce endorse the move of the State Conservation Department in increasing their annual planting program to 10,000 acres per year. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the State Conservation Department set aside the area included in the Michigan National Forest on the Tawas District near East Tawas as a game refuge and that the same be supervised by the U. S. Forest Service. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, take under consideration changing the name of the Michigan National Forest to "Tawas National Forest," since the name Michigan National Forest does not localize the forest and that it is misleading to the public as to where the forest is located and by whom it is administered. Carried.

It was moved and supported that this body recommend to the State Department of Conservation the maintaining of riparian rights. Carried.

It was moved and supported that netting be prohibited in Tawas Bay inside of a line drawn from Tawas Point to a point one-half mile west of the mouth of the Tawas river. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the East Tawas Chamber of Commerce ask the Department of Conservation to take under consideration the construction of a fish hatchery on Tawas Bay. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the trout season remain closed until June 1 and that the limit be reduced to fifteen per day. Carried.

It was moved and supported that the limit on pike and bass be reduced to five each per day on all inland lakes and rivers, and the size limit on pike to fifteen inches. Carried.

Moved and supported that all spearing of fish be prohibited for commercial purposes on all inland lakes. Carried.

The chairman informed the gathering that all delegates going to Lansing to attend the conservation meeting would be furnished with a

list of the resolutions adopted at this meeting; also that the Tri-County Sportsmen's Club were sending three delegates, one to represent each of the counties of Iosco, Alcona and Oscoda. Meeting adjourned.
