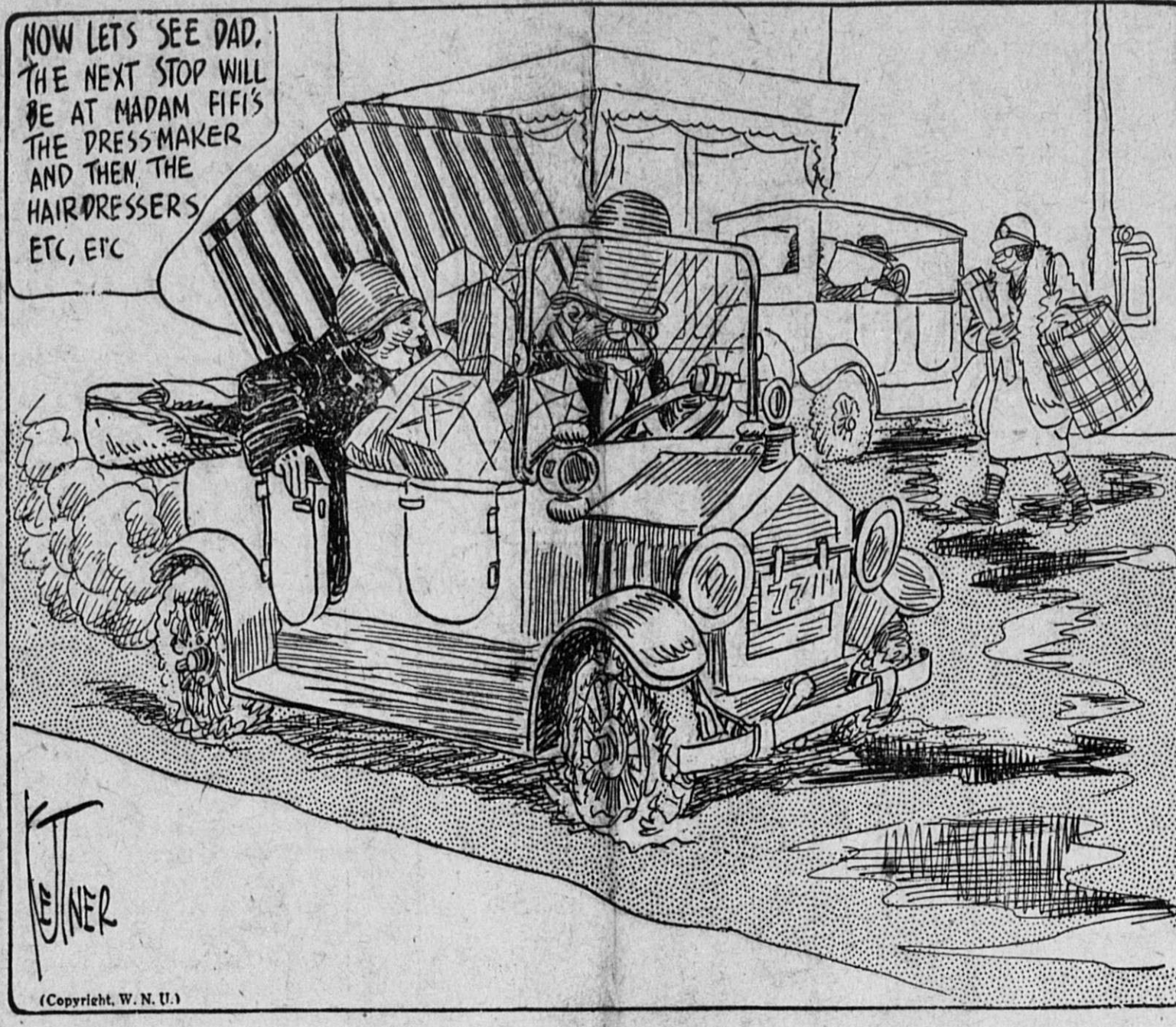

Mrs. Fred Look, age 77 years, died at her home in this city on Wednesday, March 24, after an illness of four years.

Augusta Timreck was born October 22, 1849, in Germany and came to the United States about 35 years ago. She was united in marriage to Fred Look in Germany. Her husband, two sons, Carl and Otto Look and three daughters, Mrs. Herman Gaul of this city, Mrs. Andrew Bridge of Detroit and Mrs. Wilber Rathholz of Detroit, 24 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren survive her.

The funeral services were held from Emmanuel Lutheran church, Rev. A. A. Kehrberg officiating. The remains were laid to rest in the Lutheran cemetery.

TAWAS WINS FROM OSCODA; LOSES TO ALPENA

Tawas led off, and kept a heavy lead throughout the game with Oscoda, this was due largely to Siglin interfering with Oscoda's high passes. However, the game was loosely played and ended in an easy win for Tawas by a score of 34 to 12.

Tawas loses to Alpena, Tawas playing against a team of higher classification, put up a gallant fight and would not accept defeat until the final whistle.

Taylor and Gurley held the Alpena forwards to the line, with only four field baskets, while Tawas put five through the loop. Siglin found it bit difficult to refrain from interfering with the baskets, and on several occasions reached over the Alpena basket to keep the ball from scoring.

Noel was a bit handicapped by the low ceiling the first part of the game and we raised it for the remainder of the game.

The day saw the classiest opening tilts in the history of the classic. Leads changed hands with disconcerting swiftness and the result of the game was in the air until the final gun, when Alpena tossed in four consecutive foul throws and nosed the Tawas boys out by a small margin of 12 to 16.

Tawas and Alpena play for the honors at Oscoda on April 13, each team having won the championship of their section.

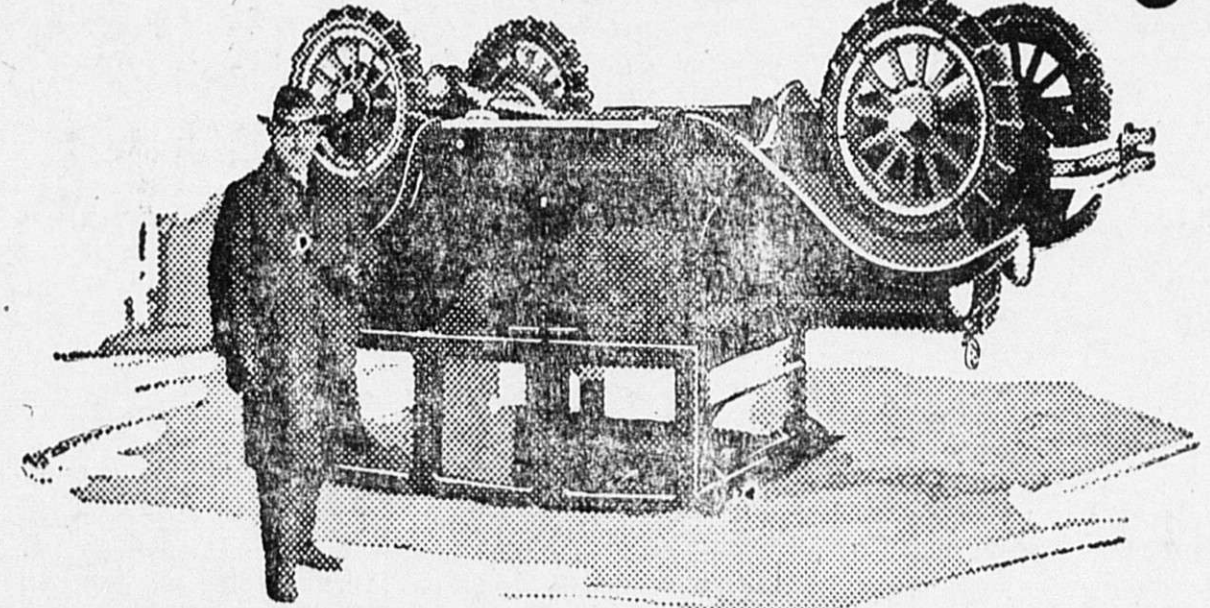

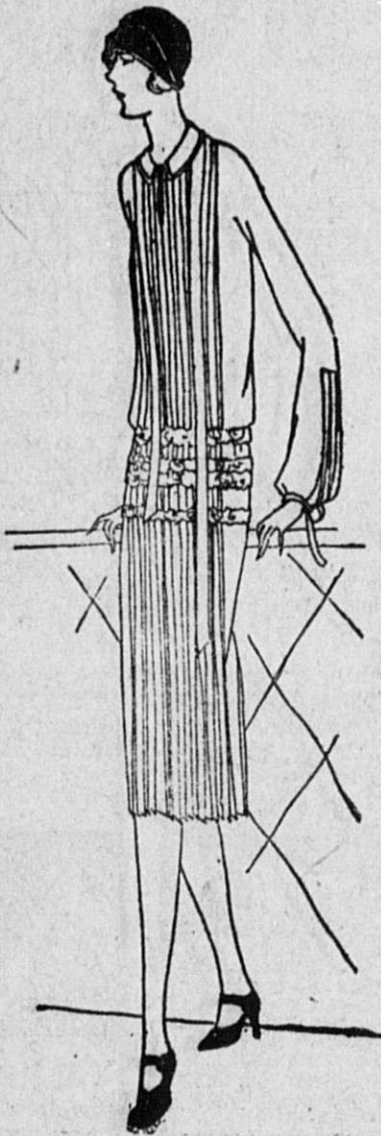
