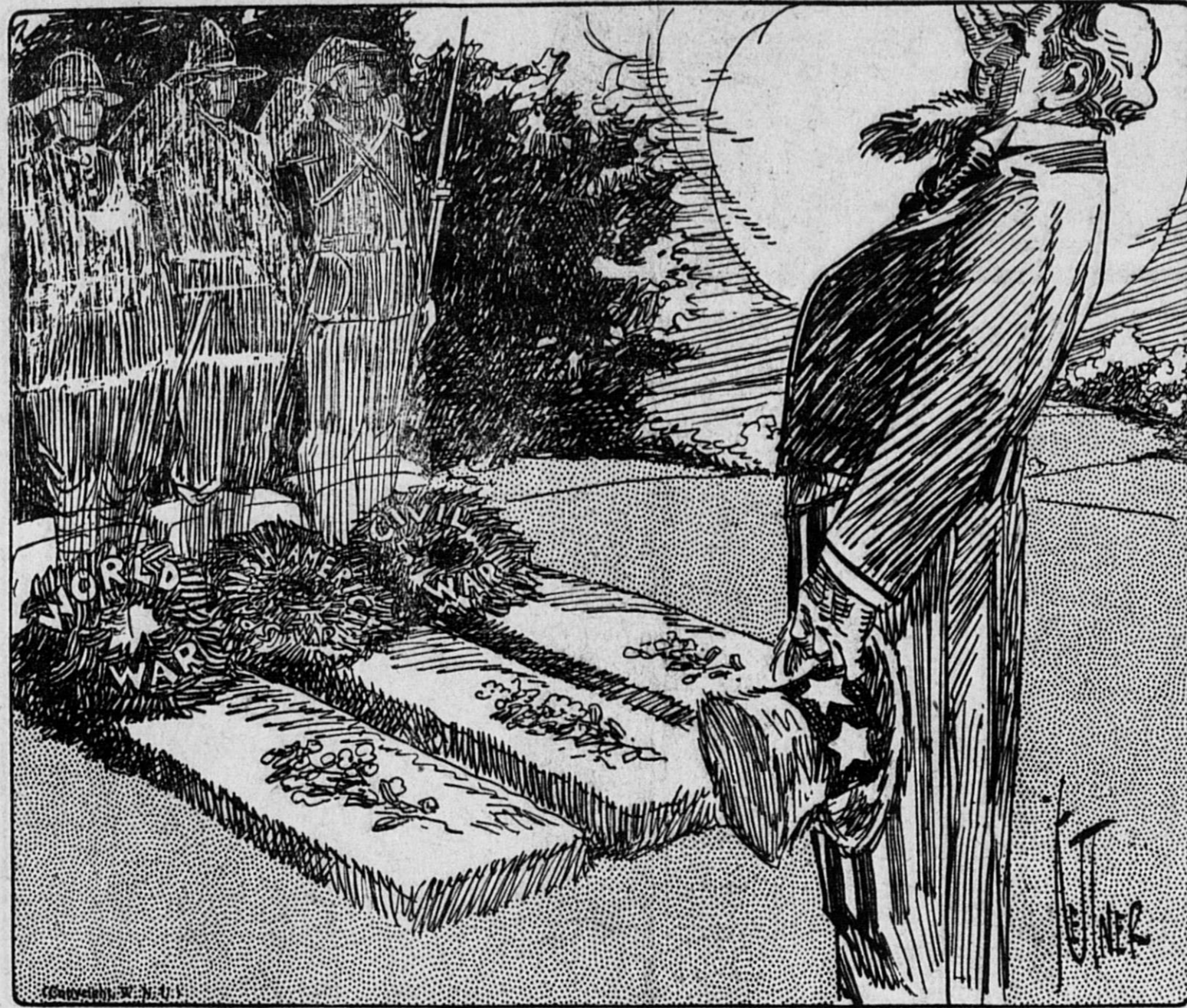

## PETER E. SHIEN DIES MONDAY

"Taps" have again sounded, and the venerable and beloved figure of Peter E. Shien, Civil War Veteran and prominent lumberman of the "Old Days" of Isoco county, becomes a memory, to be cherished by his many friends. Mr. Shien passed away at fifteen minutes after five Monday afternoon, May 24th. His health had been failing for a number of years, he having seldom been seen on the streets during the past year, but his strong spirit was never broken.

The funeral services were held Thursday afternoon with a large number present to pay their last tribute. Rev. George Smith of the Methodist Episcopal church officiated. The Masonic burial rites were given by Tawas City Lodge No. 302, F. & A. M. Jesse C. Hodder and Audie Johnson Posts, American Legion, jointly gave taps.

Peter E. Shien was born February 14, 1848, at Almira, N. Y. He came to Michigan in 1852 with his parents, who were pioneer settlers at Holly, Oakland county.

Mr. Shien left home March, 1862, being 15 years of age. He served as drummer for over a year, and on January 23, 1864, enlisted in Company K, 5th Michigan Infantry and was assigned to mounted orderly duty on brigade staff, under Col. Beech. He later served as orderly to Generals Grant and Hancock. It was Orderly Shien that carried Grant's instructions to General Burnside before the Petersburg mine explosion. Some time after this engagement President Lincoln reviewed the Union army south of Petersburg, and Mr. Shien was assigned to drive the carriage of the president.

In Washington Mr. Shien again met the president at his headquarters, and when Mr. Lincoln was told of the exploit of carrying the Grant to Burnside message, he appointed a meeting for the next day. That night Mr. Lincoln was shot, and what the purpose of the president was must remain a mystery. He was discharged from service August 16, 1865.

In 1867 Mr. Shien went to AuSable, where he was for a time engaged in the fishery business. Subsequently he embarked in the lumbering business with which he was actively associated for 38 years. He was an expert timber estimator and also managed the shipment of vast quantities of lumber and timber. He was with Pack, Woods & Co, during their lumbering activities, superintending Germany, and was married to Henry He took an active interest in the affairs of the county having served in several public offices, including that of sheriff. He was elected to that office in 1896.

In 1871, he was united in marriage to Jennie Van Wormer, who survives him. A child born to them only lived a brief time. He is also survived by his sister, Miss Kate Shien, of East Tawas.

Many tribes of savages retain to this day extraordinary powers in this respect. 
