### MEMORIAL DAY APPROPRIATELY OBSERVED HERE

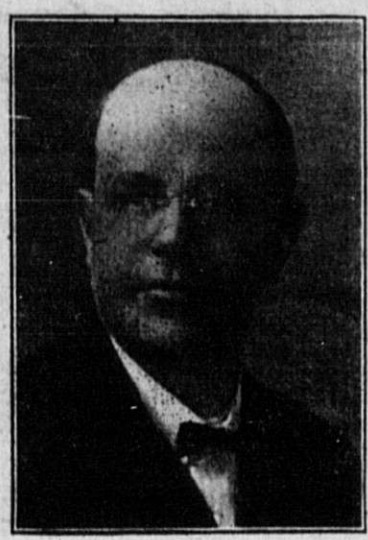

Now this present story may be of any age you please, but to the best of my personal knowledge and belief it belongs to our own Civil war period.

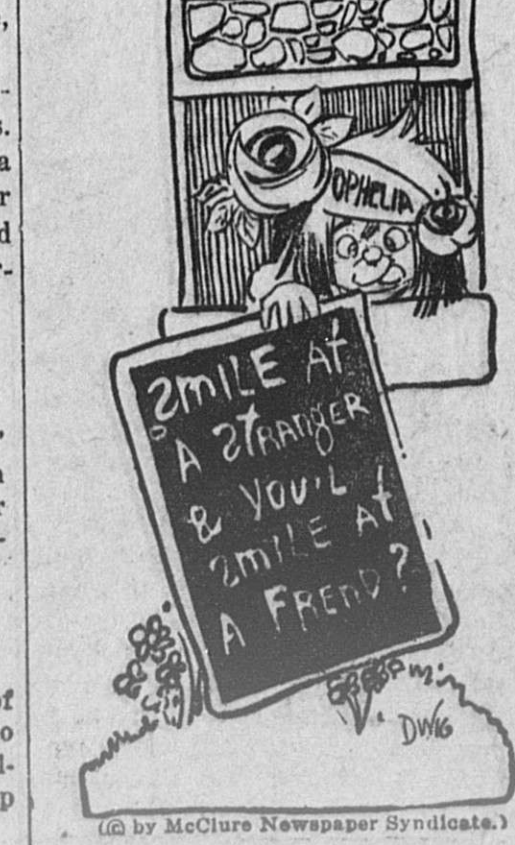
