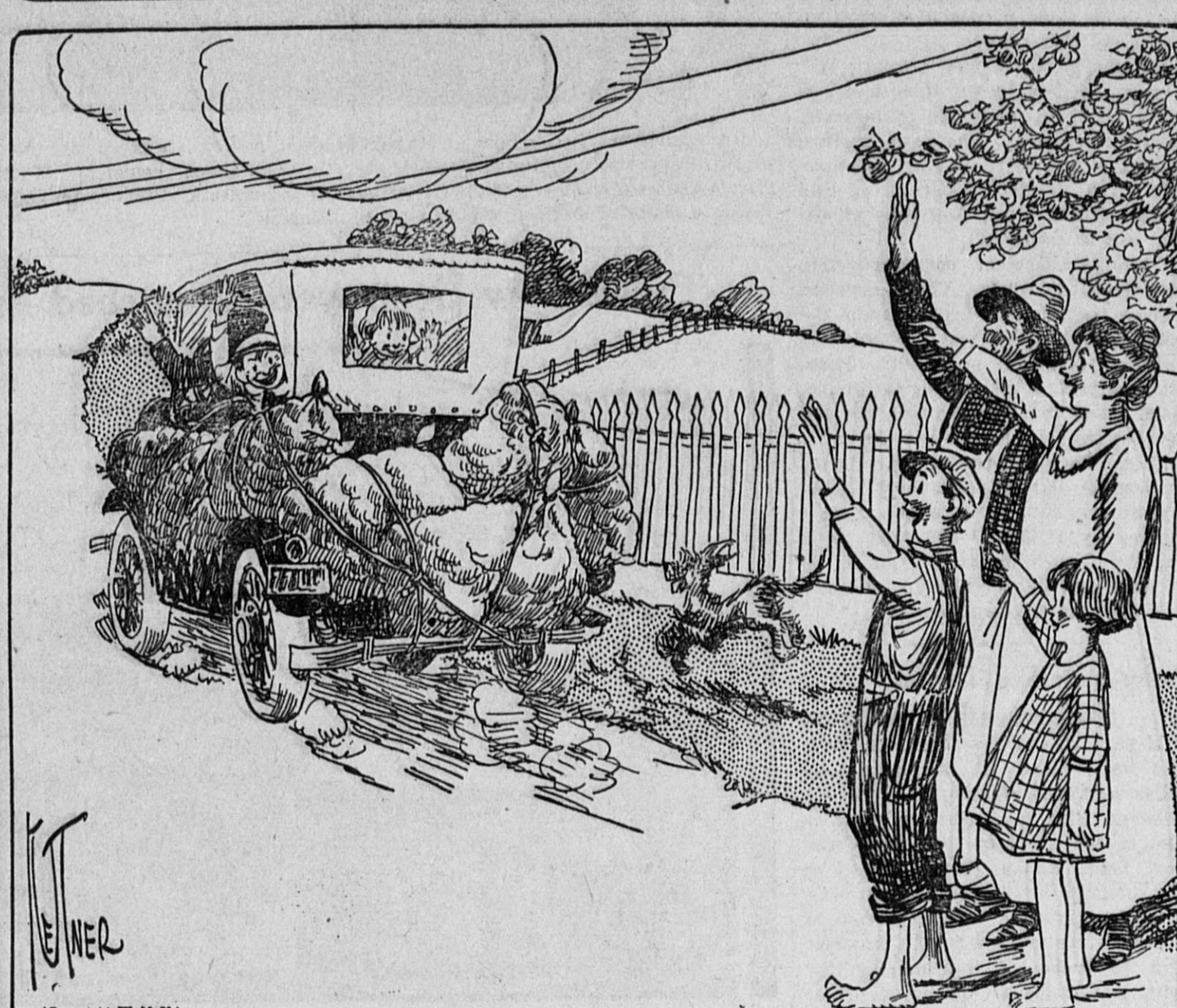

### KEISER MOVES PHARMACY INTO NEW BUILDING

During the past week H. J. Keiser has been moving the stock of the Red Cross Pharmacy to the new building, which will be opened for business Saturday, August 21.  
The newly completed home of the Red Cross Pharmacy is one of the finest and best equipped drug store buildings in northern Michigan. The building is 67 feet long by 30 feet wide and two stories high with full basement. It is of cement block construction with handsome brick and plate glass front. The windows are lighted with flood lights and the building proper with a modern lighting system. The upper story has been made into handsome living quarters, which will be occupied by the Keiser family.  
The masonry work of the new building was constructed by Leslie Nash, the wood work and interior finish by Charles and Merle Nelen and the lighting and plumbing was installed by Fred T. Luedtke.  
This is one of the most valuable additions made to the business section of the city for some years and Mr. Keiser deserves a great amount of praise for this and the faith he has displayed in the future of the city.  
The vacated building will be torn down at once. This is one of the old time business places in Tawas City. It was constructed sixty years ago for Oscar Taylor and was used as a hardware store with a tin shop in the basement. Then followed a varied career of occupancy—mercantile establishments, saloon, restaurant, publishing plant and drug store. Many of the names connected with the building are reminiscent of the days when people hereabouts thought and talked in terms of lumber and timber. Some of the owners were: Oscar Taylor, J. C. Cameron & Co., Nisbet, Green & Co., A. G. VanWey and J. M. Wuggazer. Mr. Keiser purchased it from Mrs. J. M. Wuggazer about three years ago.

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### EXTENSIVE IMPROVEMENTS TO FAIR GROUNDS

During the past three months the directors of the Iosco County Agricultural society have had underway plans for extensive improvements at the fair grounds, but a denite decision was not made until last week as to just what work would be done this year.  
The old horse barns have been torn down to make room for the County road commissioners garage, which will be built on the grounds and the cattle barn is being remodelled for a horse barn which will give horse men more and better accommodations for their horses this season.  
To provide a place for their stock, the board has decided on a new building 24 by 75 which will be completed before the opening day of the fair. This will have a concrete foundation and trussed roof, making the interior free from posts and obstructions and will be one of the best stock buildings on any fair ground in N. E. Michigan. The prospects at the present time according to reliable information are that this building will be filled to capacity with live stock and the board decided to locate the building so an addition can be made if necessary.  
The lighting system will be improved so as to provide plenty of light for a night fair as the present system has not been able to give the required light the past two years.  
Bleachers will be put up next to the grand stand so as to have plenty of seating capacity in front of the free act stand as the grand stand has proved to be too small since the board have been putting on acts between races.  
The race track is in better condition than ever and considerable work will be done on it between now and fair time. Inquiries are already coming in for race programs and indications are there will be some good races this season. The board has also provided plenty of entertainment in the line of acts and while they have not announced just what the free acts will be they have booked nine acts and as this is three more than they had last season, the patrons of the fair will be assured of plenty of entertainment and the officers feel that the people of this section will have as good a fair as any county in this section of the state.


