## WILL ESTABLISH AUSABLE RIVER GAME PRESERVE

A game preserve of 6,500 acres is being established in Iosco county by the department of Conservation under the supervision of P. S. Lovejoy. It will be fully protected at the opening of the deer hunting season. The new preserve is located on the north side of the Ausable river.  
The land surrounding the Iosco preserve is owned by the state and federal government and constitutes one of the largest hunting grounds in the state. The Consumers Power company owning large acreages along the Ausable river has co-operated with the state in establishing the preserve, having turned over several thousand acres to be used in the propagation of wild life.  
Included in the preserve is some fertile land which will be developed into feeding grounds through cultivation. Hay, turnips and other foods will be grown. The preserve will be under constant surveillance of game wardens and keepers.  
A fire line 30 feet wide and fence will entirely surround the new preserve. Crews of men are now busy with the work. It is planned to have the work completed by the time hunting season opens.  
The cover on the preserve is excellent, not having been touched by fire for the past 15 years. Partridge is said to be plentiful there.  
A second game preserve is being established between Lewiston and Atlanta and will cover more than 5,000 acres of land.

## COUNTY SUPERVISORS MEET

The committee on finance and apportionment at the October meeting of the board of supervisors, now in session, recommended that \$35,000 be appropriated for the general fund for this year. The appropriation is divided into the following items:

Officers salaries ..... \$13000.00  
Circuit court expenses .. 1000.00  
Poor fund and temporary relief .. 6000.00  
Agricultural tax ..... 896.00  
General expenses ..... 10699.00

The board voted to give \$1000.00 to the Northeastern Michigan Development bureau and Michigan Tourists association. The sum of \$200.00 was given to the Michigan Children's Aid society.

The state tax spread on the rolls for this year amounted to \$18,122.78. A tax of five mills will be placed on the rolls for county road purposes.

The board of supervisors will undoubtedly be in session during the entire week as there is a large amount of work for this meeting.

If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, or primary election, and shall under oath, state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the ward twenty days next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his or her residence and that he or she possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution; and that, owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or herself, or some member of his or her family or owing to his or her absence from the city on public business or his or her own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he or she was unable to make

Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on election day, or primary election day, by obtaining from a board of inspectors of election of the precinct from which he or she has removed a certificate of transfer, and presenting the said certificate to the board of election inspectors of the precinct in which he or she then resides.

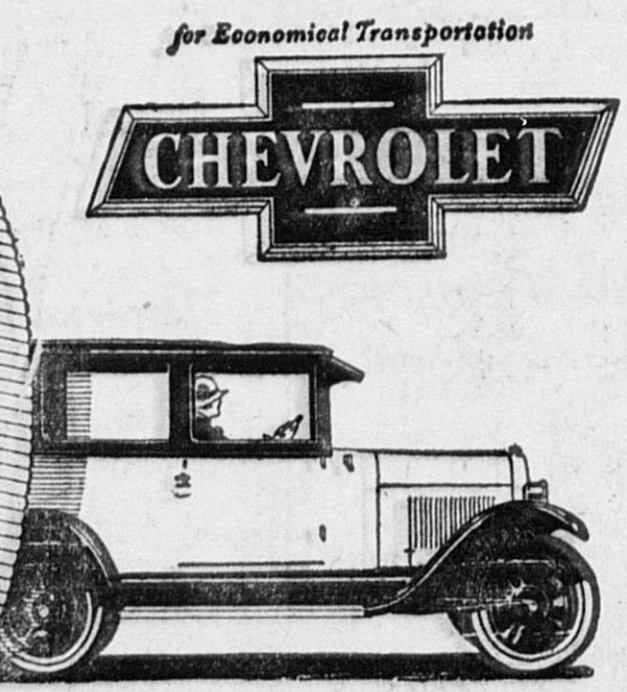
