HARTINGH APPOINTED FRIEND OF THE COURT

Attorneys N. C. Hartingh of this city, Theodore Halpin of Lapeer and Hubert J. Gaffney of Bay City were appointed to represent the unsecured creditors and depositors of the Ealy & Co. banks. The appointment was made by court order of Judge James S. Parker of the Genesee circuit court.
Attorney Hartingh in a statement made Wednesday, said: "I urge all creditors and depositors to simply be patient and forbearing until the audit or statement of assets and liabilities is ascertained. Then everybody will know how things stand." To this end he is now working upon a list of the lands and mortgages and assisting to get things in shape.
The following is a copy of the court order of November 27:

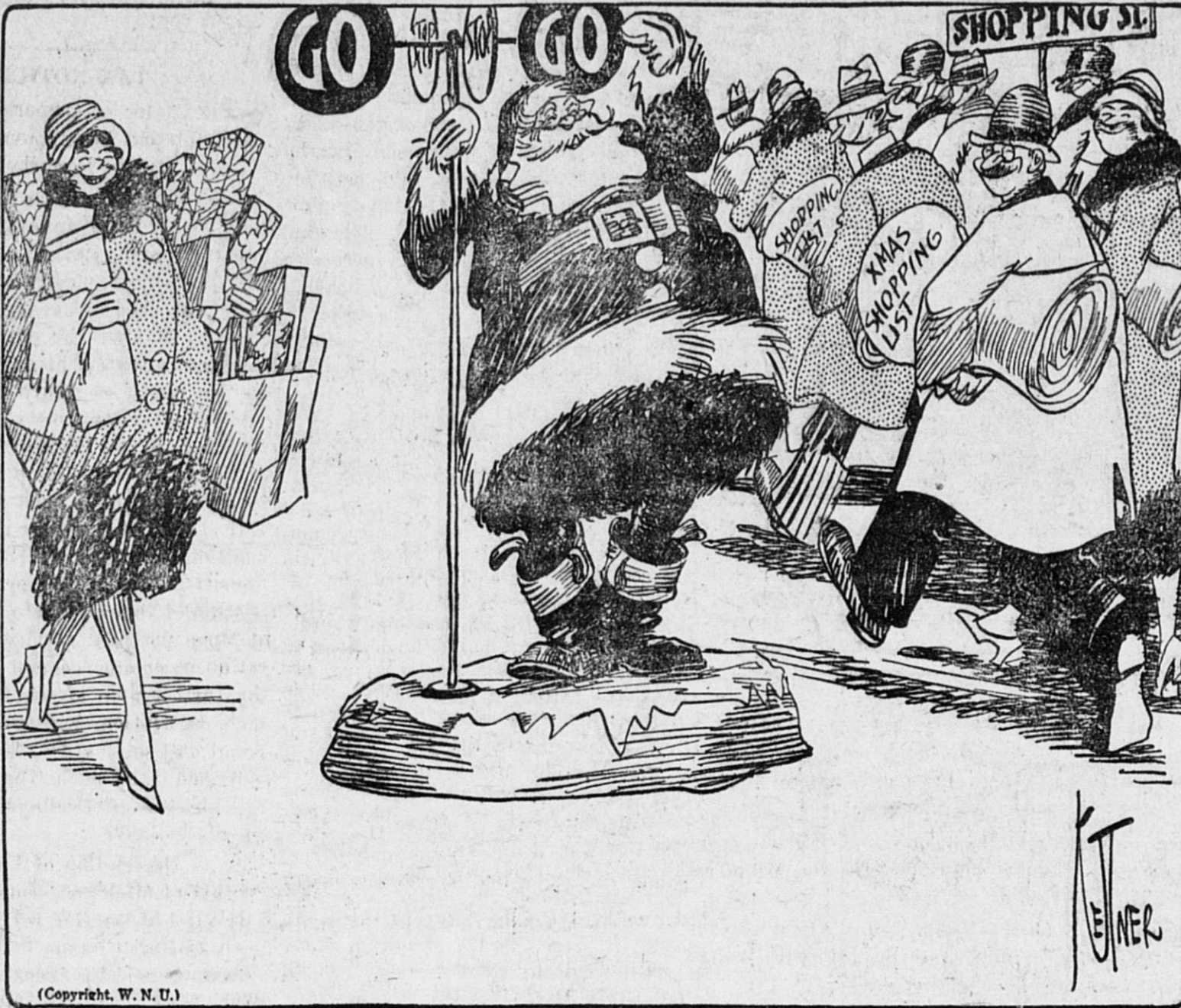
It satisfactorily appearing to the Court that the creditors of the bank copartnerships involved in the above entitled cause consist in greater number of depositors in such banks, and the court being deeply impressed that the rights of such depositors should be sacredly conserved and protected; and it further appearing to the court that many of such depositor creditors are persons of limited means and not of sufficient financial ability to enable them to employ counsel in said proceedings; and it further appearing that such depositor creditors as a body and a class ought of right to be represented by counsel of ability and standing throughout the entire course of the Receivership administration without the necessity of each individual creditor employing a separate attorney.

And it further appearing to the court that the said depositor creditors of the bank copartnership involved in said cause reside in greater part in the counties of Tuscola, Lapeer and Bay, Michigan, closely adjacent to the cities of Lapeer and Bay City, and that the appointment of counsel to represent depositors and creditors in the course of administration of the receivership and liquidation of the affairs of such copartnerships and the estates of the individual copartners, will tend to minimize and diminish the legal expenses thereto incident, and that such counsel so appointed act in behalf of such depositors and creditors in all matters requiring legal services in their aid and in the matter of the proof and enforcement of their several claims, the pursuit of assets therefor liable and in the scrutiny and investigation to be given to all transactions which may appear to be questionable or claimed to give rise to suspicion of lack of bona fides or good faith upon their face or under investigation, and in all other matters as they may arise under the varying circumstances which may develop in the course of the administration; and that the expense of the employment of such counsel should be defrayed as a general expense of administration, rather than borne by creditors and depositors individually, and that such creditors should have the benefit at all times of such advice and counsel in their aid as may be unto them necessary and proper in the premises.

The court now here, sitting at chambers, doth hereby of its own motion appoint Hubert J. Gaffney, of Bay City, Michigan, and Theodore D. Halpin, of Lapeer, Michigan, and N. C. Hartingh of Tawas City, Michigan, attorneys of high and reputable standing at the Bar, to represent and act throughout the course of administration of the Receivership herein as attorneys and counsel for creditors and, as amicus curias (friend of the court) and they and each of them acting separately or in concert are hereby ordered, appointed, authorized and directed to advise and bestow such counsel as may be required upon all such creditors and depositors without expense unto them, said creditors and depositors, direct; and to take any and all such steps as may be necessary in proving the claims of such creditors and depositors, and enforcing the same, and they are further authorized to pursue assets for such claims liable and to take all such actions and proceedings as may be necessary in the premises to secure the proper application of such assets in payment of liabilities unto creditor owing, and to investigate, scrutinize and pursue assets, if necessary, standing in the name of any person or persons other than the parties of this cause, and as such friends of the court and under this appointment to

It is said that a petition for bankruptcy will be made if a new receivership cannot be granted.

TWO DETROIT MEN KILLED AT R. R. CROSSING

George Mitchell and Carl Ammon of Detroit were instantly killed Saturday morning when their car crashed into the northbound D. & M. passenger train near Oscoda. At the inquest held Monday before Coroner L. N. Cagner the jury gave a verdict that the accident was caused by negligent driving. There is an electric crossing signal at the place of the accident.

The bodies of the unfortunate men were terribly mutilated, one of the men having his head completely severed from the body.

As there were no marks of identification except the license number of the car, several telephone calls to Detroit and Lansing were necessary before the men could be identified. The bodies were taken to their homes in Detroit.

This is the second fatal accident of this nature in the county within the past few months. The first crossing accident being that of John Jordan of Sherman which occurred at the Whittemore street bridge in Tawas City on September 25.

SEEK TO DECLARE MILLINGTON BANK BANKRUPT

A petition was filed Saturday at Bay City asking that the banking firm of Ealy, Davis & Co. of Millington be declared bankrupt.

The petition alleged that the firm of Ealy-Davis Co., composed of the copartners, J. McNair Ealy, of California, David J. Davis, Peter Pardee, Amos Kinney, Charles Stacey and William P. Campbell owed debts to the petitioner that amounted to \$6,688 alleging on this basis that the company is insolvent and seek that it be adjudicated bankrupt.

It declares further that it should be declared bankrupt on the grounds that a claim has been filed in circuit court of Tuscola county by the Ealy-Davis Co. asking that a receiver be appointed for the copartnership, charging that depressed conditions and lack of current funds have made it impossible to continue their business except at a loss. A receiver was appointed in chancery at the Tuscola county circuit court on November 5. Alleging further, the petition states that the copartnership, while insolvent four months preceding the filing of the petition, conveyed part of its property for the purpose of defrauding the creditors, and also transferred part of the firm property and assets to certain of the creditors for the purpose of preferring those creditors to certain of the other creditors.

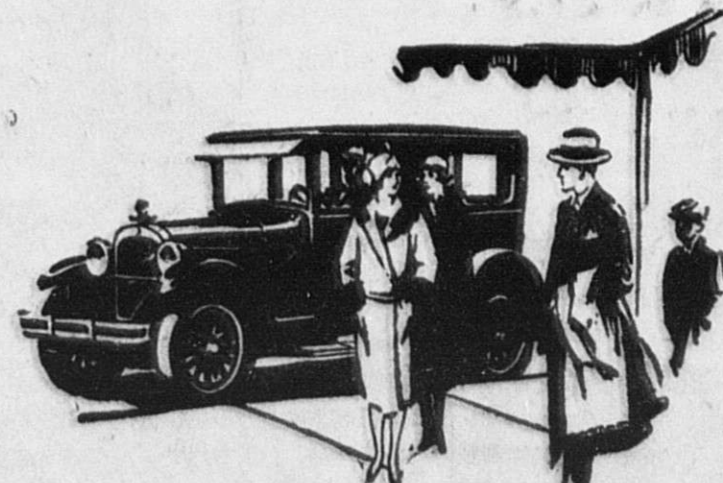

VETERANS STILL NEED RED CROSS

Aid to Disabled Men Increases as Problems and Legislation Bring Complications.

20,000 MEN DIE EACH YEAR

Many Entitled to Benefits Still Uninformed of Just Claims to Compensation.

Eight years after the World War finds service to disabled veterans still a major responsibility of the American Red Cross.

This situation is due to the increasing problems involved and the complex character of veteran legislation. There is also an increase in numbers of "death cases" handled, as compared with claims for living veterans, though the work for the latter remains heavy. About 20,000 ex-service men are dying each year, a considerable percentage of these having service-connected disabilities.

In a majority of cases, Red Cross Chapters find their assistance is needed in helping dependents present their claims for death compensation, insurance payments, bonus, burial allowances, and other government benefits due them. An episode of the past year illustrates the difficulties frequently encountered by the Red Cross experts in rendering such assistance. A veteran dying from service-connected disease, was trying from his bedside to establish at that late time his claim for Government aid to his family, and the necessary proofs were in a physician's records across the continent from him. To obtain the needed affidavits before it was too late, a cross-continent airplane flight was necessary, then a Red Cross Chapter in Pennsylvania hurried the investigation, sending the papers back to the veteran and his Red Cross helpers in Oregon, by air-mail. It reached there in time.

Another discovery in Red Cross assistance to veterans and their families is that many dependents of these men unquestionably entitled to Government aid, have struggled along, ignorant of their rights. Approximately 2,636 Red Cross Chapters carry on Home Service work, in assistance to veterans and their families. The Chapters also conduct campaign among veterans for reinstatement and conversion of their term insurance. Among its other duties, the Red Cross assumed at the request of the Canadian Government the administration of a fund allotted to the care of Canadian disabled veterans living in the United States.

In the United States the Red Cross assisted an average of about 80,000 disabled veterans and their families every month in the past fiscal year. Indicating the size of this undertaking, National Headquarters of the Red Cross expended \$1,641,178.18 on disabled veterans alone, and \$509,451.72 on assistance to men on active duty with the Army, Navy and Marine Corps, while Red Cross local Chapters expended a total of \$1,987,000. Red Cross assistance to service men overshadowed every other phase of its program, even its disaster relief, until the Florida hurricane.

Help for veterans covers many demands, from temporary aid until Government claims are adjusted or until the ex-soldier is properly hospitalized, to extending capital loans to rehabilitated veterans endeavoring to become self-supporting in business. Several such capital loans were to blind veterans.

Contact with veterans in hospitals is maintained by Red Cross personnel which doctors agree influences the veteran's welfare and improvement. The Veterans' Bureau was planned to carry on social work in its hospitals for mental cases, and in many cases the Government and the Red Cross are co-operating for the welfare of the men suffering war disabilities. The public is invited to assist this work by joining the Red Cross during the Annual Roll Call, November 11 to 25.

ALWAYS AT WORK TO RELIEVE DISTRESS

Since 1905 the American Red Cross has given relief to 354 disasters in the United States alone. A year seldom passes without a major calamity due to tornado, earthquake, fire or flood. The Red Cross in each case has remained on the job until relief was completed.

Last year the Midwest tornado which struck five states was the outstanding relief operation by the Red Cross. The Florida hurricane in September created a problem which exceeded in proportions any disaster since the San Francisco fire.

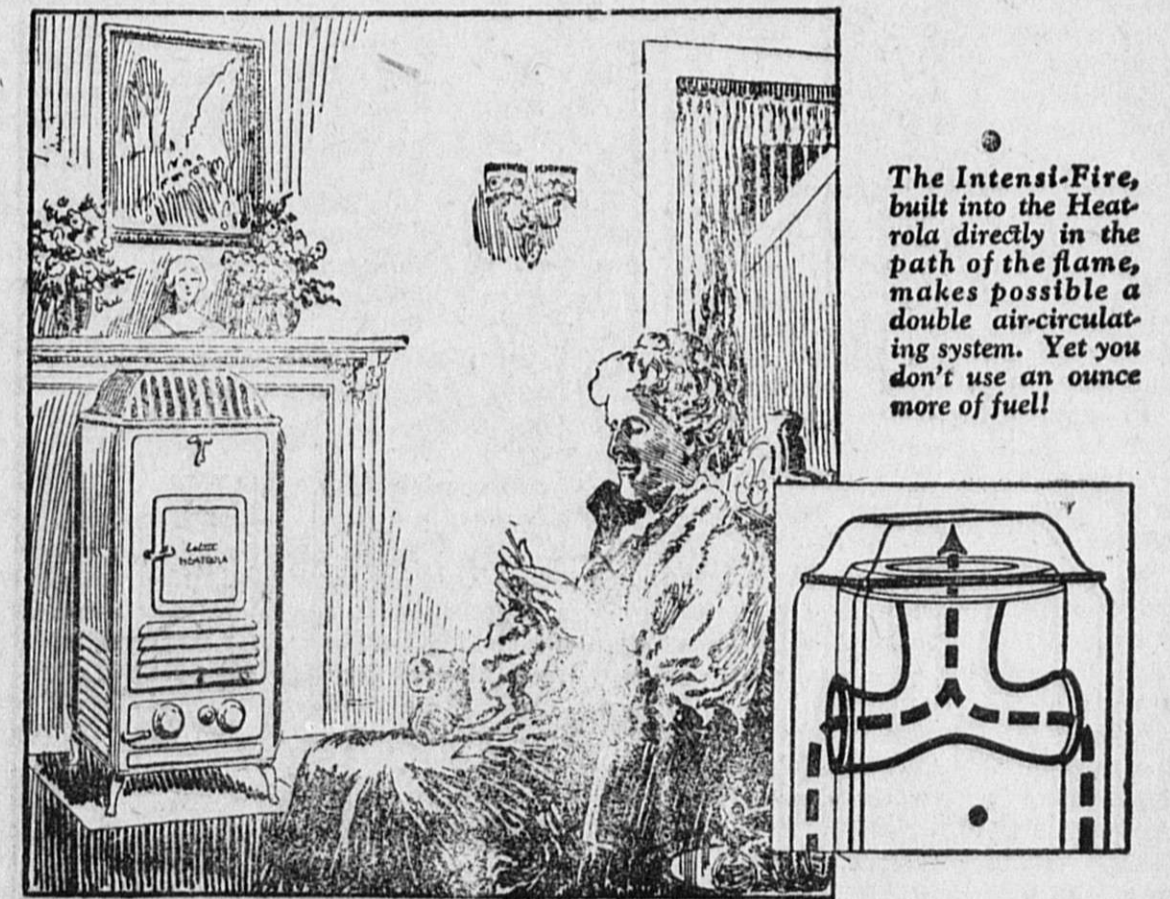
