ARENAC BANK ROBBER TAKEN AT EAST TAWAS

Marvin Smith, charged with robbing the Arenac Exchange Bank of Omer, was taken by Sheriff Chas. Curry at the Schill restaurant at East Tawas Tuesday night. Smith had shortly before arrived on the Bay City-East Tawas bus. All the money stolen from the bank was found in his possession. Shortly before closing time Tuesday afternoon, the lone bandit entered the bank building while Miss Carrie McKenzie, clerk, was alone in the office, and at the point of a shotgun demanded that she turn over all the money to him. The bandit was well dressed and wore a red bandana handkerchief over his face. Due to the fact that the time lock was on the large safe, it could not be entered, but Miss McKenzie turned over all the money in the till and the bandit then walked out, jumped into a Buick sedan, which he had left standing, with motor running, in front of the bank, and speeded away. Sheriff Sylvester O'Keefe was immediately notified and a posse was formed to follow the robber. He was trailed in automobiles to a point near Twining, where he abandoned his automobile and took to the woods. The posse tracked him through the snow for a considerable distance, until darkness intervened, and in the meantime the sheriff had telephoned to all nearby towns to be on the lookout for the man. Sheriff Curry was notified Tuesday afternoon of the robbery and a good description of the robber was given. Curry immediately notified the D. & M. officials for their train crews to watch for the bandit on the freights. Search parties were placed on the road leading into the city by Sheriff Curry. Shortly after 11 o'clock, when the East Tawas-Bay City bus arrived, it having a break down in Hale, Elmer Sheldon, manager of the Hudson-Essex Motor car co., located at East Tawas, was approached by a man wanting to be driven immediately to Bay City. Sheldon's suspicions were aroused and by putting the man off for a few minutes he called Sheriff Curry on telephone. Curry immediately told Sheldon and Marshal Moran to keep him there. This the men did with the aid of Charles Curry of East Tawas, pretending to fix the car for the trip to Bay City and finally crossing the street to get a lunch at Schill's restaurant. Sheriff Curry and W. J. Robinson arrived and arrested him, taking him to the county jail where he was held until Sheriff O'Keefe of Arenac county, who was immediately informed by Curry of his capture of the bandit, when O'Keefe arrived Smith declared his innocence and wanted to know for what reason he was being held, until he was searched by the officers and \$421.00 was found in his cap, he having \$23.00 in his trousers pocket, then admitted the theft. Sheriff O'Keefe and deputy took the bandit to Standish where he was put in the county jail. The license plates on his automobile, it was learned, were stolen from another car at Columbiaville. Sheriff Curry is to be congratulated on his quick work and the co-operation of those who assisted him.

START WORK OF COLLECTING AT BANKS THIS WEEK

Another step was taken this week toward the liquidation of the three Ealy, McKay & Co. banks, when the East Tawas bank was opened for the collection on paper held by the banks. L. G. McKay has been appointed representative of the receiver and will have charge of the office at East Tawas. The collection will be made from that office, except that one day each week he will spend at the Hale bank. A summary of the audit being prepared by Ernst & Ernst will be ready for inspection by the depositors on or before January 1. L. G. McKay in a statement made Wednesday said, "All the property held by the individual stockholders has been turned over by general assignment to the receivers. As these banks are being liquidated separately, and the assets retained here until all creditors are satisfied, these with the holdings of the individual stockholders will without doubt more than cover the obligations of the banks to the depositors and creditors. Any slow or frozen assets will be absorbed by the proceeds realized by the sale of property belonging to the members of the banking firm." Attorney Wm. T. Yeo, of West Branch represented Mr. McKay during the dissolution proceedings retained for the purpose of trying to secure a separate accounting and settlement. Mr. Yeo in reporting the attainment of this end to Mr. McKay wrote the following letter: Mr. Lloyd McKay East Tawas, Mich. Dear Mr. McKay: Upon the dissolution proceedings. There will be a separate accounting and settlement for each bank and a separate accounting for each co-partner according to the bill of complaint filed, as Mr. Wixon advises me. Under this proceeding the assets of each bank will go first in satisfaction of its liabilities and any surplus would be then credited and paid to each co-partner, subject to his liability as a co-partner in any other bank in which he might be interested. NORDLAND FARM SELLS GUERNSEYS TO H. M. JEWETT

Harry M. Jewett, owner of 7500 acre estate in Ogemaw county purchased eight purebred Guernsey cows from the Nordland farms owned by Fred C. Holbeck at Long Lake. Mr. Jewett is president of the Paige-Detroit Motor company. He is establishing a fine herd of Guernsey cattle on the estate. Included in the purchase was Arcadia Rose, present champion of the estate over all breeds on the strictly official two milking test over a period of one year. A fine Guernsey bull, Michigan Dolphin, purchased from John Lehman of West Branch, was added to the herd. In speaking of the sale of these cattle Mr. Holbeck said, "There was never a more better time to prepare to supply the great demand for grade cows that come from eastern markets. I receive letters weekly from eastern buyers asking for a good quality of grade milk cows and offering fancy prices. The higher testing breeds are preferred by these buyers, but any good grade milking cow can be used. One of the requisites, however, is that they come from a county free from tuberculosis. Inasmuch as the supervisors have authorized a tuberculin test of the herds of the county, this will be taken care of in a short time. In the meantime it behoves the wise farmer to purchase a good pure bred bull from one of the leading dairy breeds and be in a position to help supply the market that is already here as soon as the county has been tested.
