MORE BANKRUPTCY PETITIONS FILED SATURDAY

Two more petitions were filed in the Federal court last Saturday to declare the Ealy & Co. banks bankrupt. Action was stayed, however, by an order of Judge Tuttle until the petitions could be consolidated and arranged in an orderly manner. One petition was made by depositors of Ealy, McKay & Co. banks in Isoco county. This petition was filed by Attorney Lewis J. Weadock of Bay City. The action was explained and other points of interest covered in a letter received by Edward Trudell from Attorney Weadock. The letter is as follows:

December 13, 1926

Mr. Edward Trudell,
Tawas City, Michigan.
Dear Mr. Trudell:

Your letter of December 11 is received. I am writing you for your own benefit as a creditor of Ealy, McKay and Company and for the information of other creditors of the Tawas, East Tawas and Hale banks.

I attended a conference late Friday afternoon with Messrs. Clark, Halpin, Gaffney, Hartingh and W. B. Henry and it was agreed upon the filing of my petition in bankruptcy by you and other petitioners that affairs would remain in their present state and all attorneys agreed that an order be made by Judge Tuttle staying further action on the petition filed against the bank of Millington, the petition filed by me and any other petitions that come in until the attorneys could go before Judge Tuttle and agree upon the method of procedure, to insure orderly conduct of the affair without each attorney for petitioners' creditors in bankruptcy acting independently and thereby creating greater expense. I called you by telephone following this meeting and notified you of this situation.

The petitions against Mr. McKay and his partners were filed Saturday morning, December 11, at 9 o'clock, and would have been filed Friday afternoon except that the office of the U. S. court clerk here was closed, after the conference with the attorneys ended. The petitions, therefore, were filed at the earliest time the next morning and subpoenas have been issued and placed in the hands of the Marshal for service. A petition filed by Mr. Gaffney is also pending against one of the Thumb banks. This now makes three petitions pending against three different sets of co-partners.

Under the bankruptcy law the copartners named in the petition filed by yourself, Louis Trudell, John Cogle and wife and Anna Belle McLean, will have until December 27th in which to file their answer to the petition or in case of their failure to do so they, copartners, upon whom service is had, will be adjudicated bankrupt.

None of the depositors in the Ealy, McKay and Company will suffer any loss or lose any rights pending the time between December 11th, the time of the filing of the petition, and December 27th when their appearances are due and following this, the meeting of all the attorneys will be had before Judge Tuttle. In this interval, the First National Bank acting as trustee will continue to make such collection of assets as it can and proceed with the work of the audit and other work that it is doing and I do not have any fear that this action taken by the First National Bank in any way prejudice the rights of depositors in that time. The bank is under a bond and will have to account fully and completely to the Bankruptcy Court later if adjudication of Ealy, McKay and Company is had. Even though this bank were not under bond it is financially responsible.

Judge Tuttle has made it a standing rule that he will not in these cases appoint a receiver at this time of the filing of a bankruptcy petition before adjudication is had of the bankrupt individual, co-partner or corporation.

The filing of the petition on December 11th as fixing the period in which preference payments could have been made. All payments or securities received in that period will be fully investigated and if found to be preferential, that is, if one creditor is receiving a preference over any other creditor, such creditor receiving such preference will be obliged to return his security and be placed on the same footing as creditors without securities.

It is not to be lost sight of, however, that the First National Bank is acting in a dual capacity, namely as trustee and is probably the largest single creditor, and also secured, and which circumstances in the event of an adjudication in bankruptcy would preclude and prevent the First National Bank from acting as trustee for the creditors. It is to be remembered also that the expenses now being incurred by the First National Bank in the employment of its numerous attorneys will be payable out of the funds of the depositors. I do not mean by that that their entire expenses will come out of Ealy, McKay & Co., but out of the entire fifteen banks.

I wish to repeat to you what I have already said to you and other depositors that my belief is unshaken that bankruptcy affords better machinery for protection of your rights than the state receivership proceeding. Statements made to you of the expense in

bankruptcy as being greater are unwarranted. Much of the time now being spent by the numerous attorneys for the receiver in investigating the transactions of these partners would be greatly facilitated and shortened by an examination under oath of the partners which under the present receivership proceedings no provision is made, for such examination nor could it be compelled against the partners. It is true, too, on the other hand that the matter of the audit would have to be done in either proceeding so that expense is necessary.

On the filing of the petition against Ealy, McKay & Co. in your behalf and that of John Coyle, Louis Trudell, Annabelle McLean and Hyman Friedman, I was required to make a deposit of \$240.00 with the Clerk of the U. S. Court, which I will thank you to forward me check in reimbursement. A portion of this deposit will be eventually returned.

The filing of bankruptcy petition also affords an opportunity to Mr. McKay of turning over his individual assets so that depositors may be paid out in full even in the bankruptcy proceedings and further proceedings in bankruptcy or otherwise would be rendered unnecessary. If the amount of his individual contributions is sufficient to pay creditors in full.

Please be assured and assure all depositors that their interests are being looked after with reference to the full protection of their rights under the bankruptcy law and in the failure of Mr. McKay to make up the difference to make his co-partnership pay out 100% bankruptcy proceedings will go ahead and an endeavor made to have a disinterested trustee elected and the affairs worked out so as to produce the greatest amount for creditors with the least expense. It is impossible for me to write fully every detail connected with the matter, but I can only assure you that your interests are being looked after and that any depositor whom I represent is free to call on me at any time for information.
