ASK THAT IOSCO BE ATTACHED TO 34TH CIRCUIT

Many Resolutions Passed by Supervisors During Three Day Session

A resolution was passed during the three day session of the board of Supervisors, held here this week petitioning the legislature to attach Iosco county to the 34th Judicial Circuit. This move has been under discussion at various times during the past 10 years.

A number of other resolutions were passed some of which were: A resolution against the Rivers and Harbors bill in its present form before congress.

A resolution asking the legislature to place the property of the so called charitable institutions, such as the Y. M. C. A. and others, on the tax roll subject to taxation as property held by other individuals, companies and corporations. It is claimed that these are not charitable institutions in the true sense and should be taxed, as they are possessors of valuable property and derive benefits paid for by taxation. A large amount of such property is held in Iosco county.

The janitor was made custodian of the county property and was instructed to allow the court room for public meetings when not being used by the circuit court or the board of supervisors.

The board unanimously endorsed John Martindale for deputy state game and fire warden. This was in acknowledgement of the efficient service given by Mr. Martindale during his past years in office.

Supervisor Edward O. Putnam and Ernest Crego were elected delegates to the State Association of Supervisors which will be held February 1, 2 and 3 at Lansing.

In a resolution defining the services rendered by physicians in dangerous communicable disease cases, the price which may be charged and the several diseases which may be charged to the county, the following changes were made: Bills in Diphtheria, smallpox and scarlet fever cases were named as the only ones which would be considered by the board of supervisors. In all other indigent cases the accounts must be considered by the superintendent of the poor. A maximum rate of \$2.00 per call was made with a mileage charge allowed in cases beyond one mile. The physicians must advise health officers when an account of \$100.00 is incurred and such health officer must keep thoroughly informed as to the nature of the account. All bills of this nature must be approved by the health officer.

A sum of \$300.00 was appropriated for handling the county's work in the child accounting system.

OPENING OF STATE BANK DELAYED
C. H. Ridgley of the newly incorporated Iosco County State Bank stated Tuesday that the opening of the Tawas City bank would undoubtedly be delayed until February 1. This was caused by a delay in the printing of blank checks, stationery and other supplies. An election of officers of the new banking company will be held in a few days.

JUDGE EMERICK DENIES CHANGE OF VENUE
Judge Frank Emerick of the Alpena circuit Thursday denied the petitions of Attorneys John A. Stewart and N. C. Hartingh of Tawas for a change of venue for the trial of two cases, one from Iosco and one from Alcona county, both in the 23rd judicial circuit, of which Albert Widdis is judge.

The grounds set forth for disqualifying Judge Widdis were solely his alleged bias, prejudice and hatred of the petitioners.

In the language of the court, "such grounds of disqualification were neither alleged, or proven at the hearing, in any definite or tangible instance, form or degree so as to justify an order of transfer, and the same is therefore denied, but without costs."

The title of the Alcona county case involved is "Lena and Esther Solomon vs. John D. Howard, Sarah Lapp, Howard and Nicholas C. Hartingh," a chancery case. The Iosco case is "The Columbia Weighing Machine Co. vs. Peter Stanislas."

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LLOYD G. MCKAY DECLARES BANKS ARE SOLVENT

Iosco Banks Held Out of Consolidation, Bankruptcy Hearing Postponed

With the exclusion of the banks of Ealy, McKay & Co. at East Tawas, Tawas City and Hale from the order of the court consolidating the various petitions for involuntary bankruptcy which had been filed against the Ealy & Co. banks in the United States district court and the postponement of action until February 1, a new phase has been entered in the local bank situation.

At the hearing held before Judge A. J. Tuttle of the United States district court Tuesday morning, on motion of Edward S. Clark, attorney for the receiver, the First National Bank of Bay City, an order of the court was made consolidating the several petitions for involuntary bankruptcy which had been filed against the Ealy & Co. banks. In an answer to the petition filed against Ealy, McKay & Co. Lloyd G. McKay declared that he was not insolvent. Further action was postponed until February 8. This was had to permit Mr. McKay to turn over his personal assets to cover any loss which might be encountered by the three Iosco county banks and to work out plans for clearing up the situation here. Attorney Lewis J. Weadock, attorney for the creditors against the Ealy, McKay & Co. banks stated that the course adopted by the court was agreeable to him.

Attorneys W. B. Henry and Lewis Weadock were here Wednesday conferring with Mr. McKay, Attorney N. C. Hartingh, friend of the court and a number of the creditors. They announced that a public meeting would be held Saturday, January 15, at Tawas City and Hale at which time the plans formulated for handling the situation in its new phase would be explained and discussed with the depositors. Attorney W. B. Henry for the First National Bank as receiver, and Attorneys N. C. Hartingh, Lewis J. Weadock and John A. Stewart representing the various depositors and creditors will be present at this meeting.

The Bay City Times Tribune gave the following report of various statements made at the hearing.

"Attorney Edward S. Clark in his statement urged that the abstract company of Ealy and Co. at Caro, which concern is solvent, file a voluntary petition in bankruptcy, in order that their assets may help tide over those places where there are little or no assets. Attorney Sibley, of Flint, representing the partners involved in the petitions, agreed to file such a petition, in order that the entire assets of all the partners should be united.

"In a further statement to the court Mr. Clark recited the progress that had been made in the matter since the previous hearing in the case. Mr. Clark said that the collateral in the bank at Saginaw had been redeemed and that considerable money had been paid for the creditors through this transaction. He also said that it was his wish that all orders of stay on the proceedings of the banks remain. Nearly all of the banks have been appraised regarding their property worth, and some of them have been sold. Mr. Clark said, referring to the bank at West Branch, Mr. Clark said that no petition had been filed against it, and that one of the partners in the West Branch bank, Robert McKay, had not been named in the petitions against the other banks.

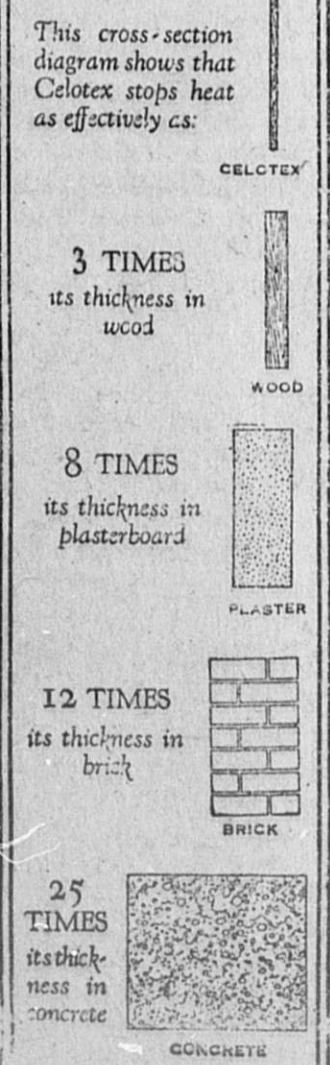
