The combined assets of the banks at Tawas City, East Tawas and Hale have been appraised by Honorable David Davison, Probate Judge of Iosco County, and Charles W. Curry, Sheriff of said county, who were appointed for that purpose by an order of the Circuit Court for the county of Tuscola in the receivership proceedings in that court, in the sum of \$674,141.19. These assets are carried upon the books of the banks in the amount of \$787,624.06. The total liabilities of the three banks as shown by the books of the banks amount to \$726,811.37. The difference, therefore, between the amount of the assets and of the banks as appraised and the total liabilities is \$52,670.18, or in other words, \$52,670.18 less than sufficient to pay the creditors of the banks the full amount of their claims.

The appraisers above named have appraised my individual property at the sum of \$140,000.00, which after deducting my individual indebtedness, substantially all of which is owed to three banks leaves a net value of my individual property together with the appraised value of the three banks equals the sum of \$770,245.21, being \$63,433.83 in excess of the combined liabilities of the banks.

Said trust deeds shall provide that the title to the property conveyed and transferred shall remain in First National Bank as trustee until all of the creditors of the three banks have paid their lawful claims, but without interest, after November 1, 1926. In case of dispute as to amount or validity of claims same shall be referred to and determined by said Circuit Court for the county of Tuscola in the above named receivership proceedings. The balance or remainder of the property so deeded and transferred shall, upon completion of payments as above provided, be deeded back to me.

The deed of trust shall also provide that liquidation of the said banks and individual assets shall be had under the supervision of First National Bank, trustee, with leave to said trustee to apply to the Circuit Court for the County of Tuscola for instructions or directions as to the administration of the trust.

Proceeds realized from said assets shall be deposited with and sold by First National Bank, trustee, and as speedily as possible, dividends shall be declared and paid to the creditors of the banks in payment of the accounts of depositors and creditors thereof.



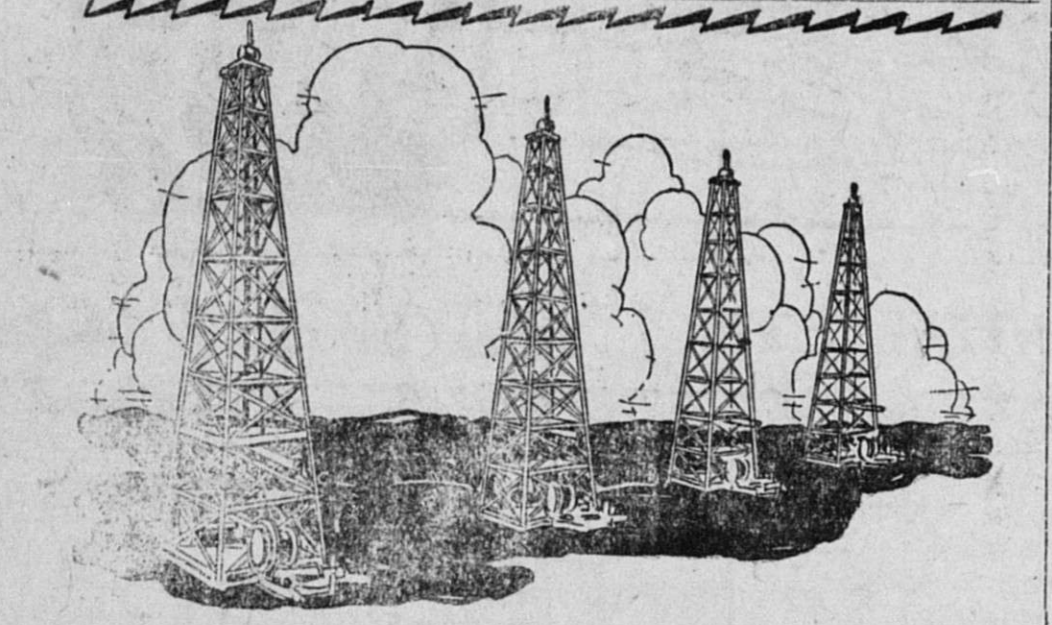
