### Randall Ensemble Will Present "Madam Butterfly" at State Theatre

The Randall Ensemble will present "Madam Butterfly" at the State Theatre, Saturday, March 26. This is the last number in this season's lyceum course. The ensemble comes here with a high recommendation as to their merit as dramatic artists and musicians.

The Randall ensemble players offer a feast of good things in dramatic, vocal and instrumental music, impersonations and comedy. Eleanore Randall distinguished dramatic artist, heads the company.

"Madam Butterfly," Puccini's immortal opera, is presented in dramatized form with a musical setting, and with handsome lighting and scenic effects. Miss Randall gives a synopsis of the first act, and interprets the second and third acts wherein Madam Butterfly awaits her American lover, Lieutenant Pinkerton. She waits for three years and when at last his ship comes into port, Pinkerton brings with him an American wife. Butterfly, taking heart-breaking farewell of her infant son, kills herself. Pinkerton finds her dying because he did not return to her "When the robins nest again." Incidental to the story is given much of the exquisite music of the opera by piano, violin and voice. The costuming, lighting, and scenic effects are elegant.

The miscellaneous half of the Randall program is in lighter vein. There are comedy sketches by the company; cuttings of modern plays, exclusive readings and child impersonations by Miss Randall; readings with piano and violin accompaniments; violin, piano and soprano solos; comedy, fun, and beautiful costumes in generous measure.

Eleanor Randall is nationally known as a dramatic entertainer, and as a costume recitalist she is in a class by herself. She is the head of the Department of expression in Chicago College of Music. For fourteen months she played with the late Frank Bacon in his famous play "Lightnin'" in the outstanding comedy role of "Mrs. Davis," when the play first opened in New York few years ago. Miss Randall has a marvelous repertoire. It consists of sixteen programs which include ten modern plays, two operas dramatized, and four miscellaneous programs in costume. She is equally successful in humorous and children's readings as in sadly sweet emotions of Madam Butterfly. Boys and girls fairly go wild with joy when she gives Booth Tarkington's "Penrod," "The man with one hair," and the story of the small boy in his "Supervised Bath."

Ruth Cowie is a dramatic soprano and concert pianist of ability and ample concert experience.  
Leroy Vernae is a concert violinist with an important part in the Madam Butterfly presentation and in the miscellaneous musical program.

## CONSTRUCT NEW STAR GARAGE

### Grahams Start Work on Attractive New Building at Whittemore

Ed. Graham & Sons are constructing a new garage and salesroom for the Star and Durant cars at Whittemore. The new building will be of cement block construction, with plate glass display windows, 80 feet wide and 100 feet long and one story high. It is being constructed on the site of old building which has recently been torn down.

The new building will improve the appearance of main street, and will give Whittemore two fine appearing, well equipped garages.

## GYPSUM UNIT TO OPEN SOON

Activities of the National Gypsum company, which has its principal office in Buffalo, were outlined by President Haggerty in a recent letter to stockholders in which he announced an addition to their Clarence, N. Y., wall board plant had just been completed, increasing the output 50 per cent. A second plant in Michigan, representing an expenditure of about \$1,000,000, is nearing completion and will begin operation April first. Large plaster mills are also being constructed at both Clarence, N. Y., and National City, Mich.

"National mineral wallboard, one of our main products," said Mr. Haggerty, has surprised the industry as well as the dealer. Due to an entirely new manufacturing process, developed and exclusively controlled by National it represents the outstanding achievement since the inception of the wallboard idea.

"We now have in the field to be served by the Michigan plant a competent force of salesmen doing advance work to provide business for that plant. This force will be increased as production grows.

"The company is in excellent financial condition with no bank loans and a large cash balance drawing interest. When the two plants have been completed in their entirety, this good financial condition will still maintain," he said.

The first plant of the National Gypsum company at Clarence was put in operation only eight months ago.—Detroit Free Press

## W. H. DICKINSON PASSES AWAY

### Supervisor of AuSable Township 16 years; Resident of County 50 Years

William H. Dickinson, supervisor of AuSable township for the past 16 years, suddenly passed away at his home Saturday night. Mr. Dickinson has been a resident of AuSable for 50 years. He would have been 79 years old on April 26th.

Saturday evening Mr. Dickinson attended the AuSable township caucus where he was unanimously nominated candidate for supervisor for the April election. This would have been his 7th term as supervisor.

Rev. E. T. Haddock, who lived with him, states that Mr. Dickinson was apparently in good health. He was an especially good spirit that evening and retired to his bed shortly after recounting the proceedings of the caucus. The next morning after calling to him several times, Mr. Haddock investigated and found that he had passed away.

Mr. Dickinson is survived by one son, James A. Dickinson of Cheboygan, and two daughters, Mrs. Letha Cochran of Seattle, Wash., and Miss Laura A. Dickinson of Detroit. Mrs. Dickinson died May 2, 1922. Mr. Dickinson, through his long experience in public office and amiable disposition was well known and had many friends throughout northeastern Michigan.

The funeral services were held at two o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the home where a large number gathered to pay their last tribute. Rev. E. T. Haddock officiated.

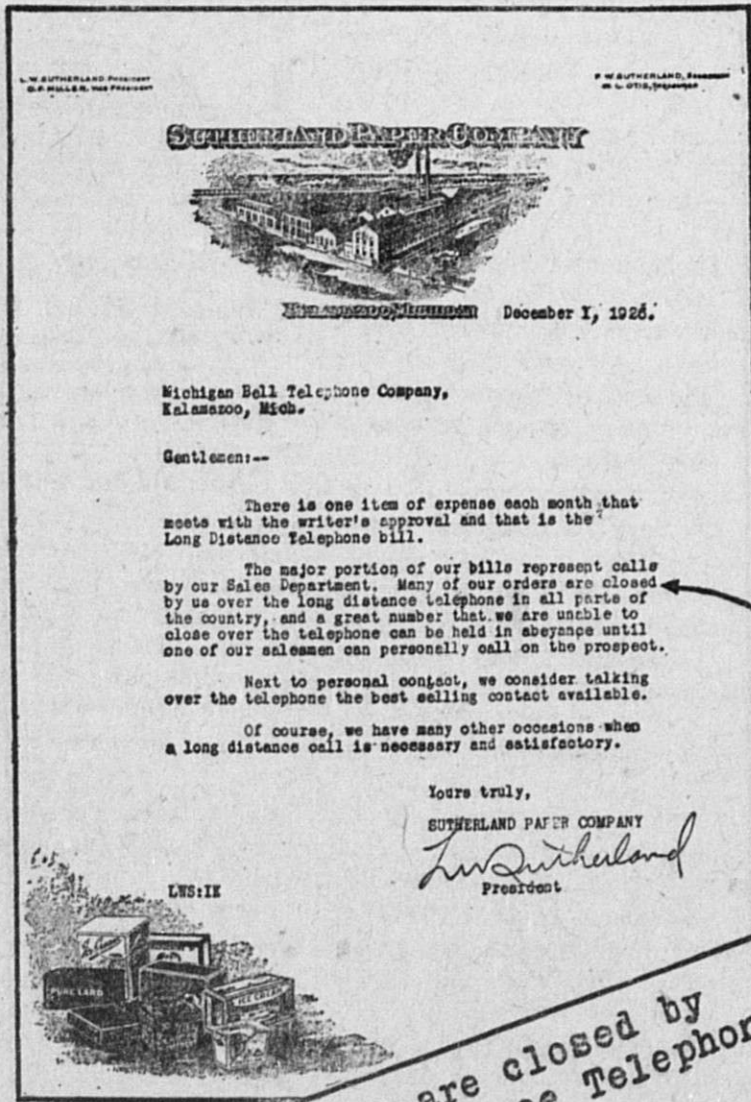

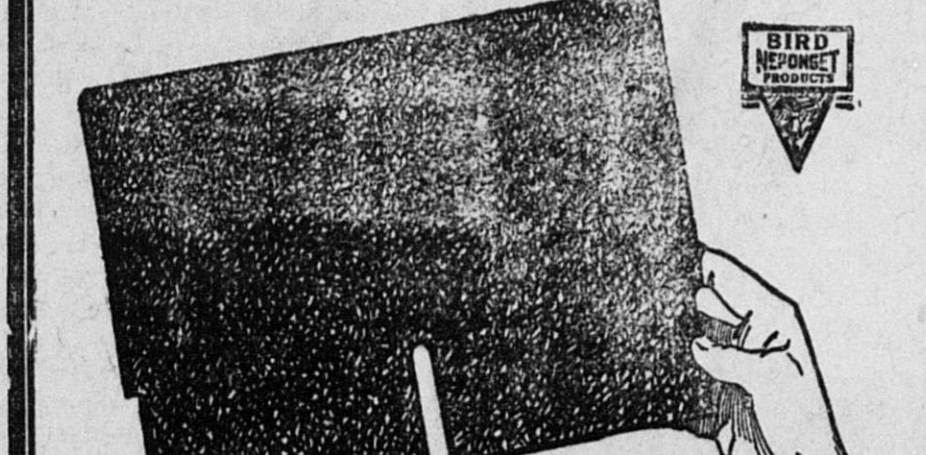
