ARTHUR ROSS, GYPSUM COMPANY EMPLOYEE, KILLED

Arthur Ross, an employe of the United States Gypsum company at Alabaster, was smothered to death by a cave-in of crushed gypsum rock at the mouth of a conveyor at the plant about 11 o'clock Tuesday night. Mr. Ross was a night operator of an electric shovel used to transfer crushed rock to this underground conveyor. The rock had been dropped in a cratered conical pile over the mouth of the conveyor. At times the opening to the conveyor clogged and it is thought he may have attempted to break the jam of rock while standing at the edge of the crater like hole, and the loose crushed rock caved in, carrying him downward and burying him. The exact time of the accident is unknown, but he was missed at about eleven o'clock and a search was made. The lifeless body was discovered at about two o'clock Wednesday morning. It was found that the head had been nearly torn from the body. An inquest was held Wednesday.

The family of the deceased are quarantined at their home with scarlet fever.

Arthur Ross was born Nov. 19, 1877, at Forrest, Ont., and came here with his parents when a child. He was married in March, 1910 to Miss Gertie Wright of East Tawas. He leaves his wife, seven children, Raymond, Harry and Harold, Mable, Richard, Gladys and Glenn, three sisters, Mrs. Chas. Curry of this city, Mrs. Ed. Tompkins of Flushing, Mrs. Frank Conlin of Flint, two brothers, Fred Ross of Flint and Robert Ross of Detroit.

The funeral services will be held Friday (today) at the Alabaster church at 2 o'clock Alabaster time. Rev. George Smith officiating. Burial in the family lot at Tawas City. Out of town relatives who are attending the funeral: Mrs. Ed. Tompkins of Flushing, Mrs. Frank Conlin of Flint and Fred Ross of Flint, Robert Ross of Detroit and a cousin, Sam Ross of Forest, Ontario.

Mr. Holloway was born in Howell, Livingston County, Mich., on Mar. 8th, 1855, and moved to Tawas City in 1882. In the year 1878 he was united in marriage to Addie Harris, to which union eleven children, seven sons and four daughters, were born.

Besides his wife he is survived by seven sons and one daughter, William L. Harry B., Charles H., Russell S., Albert W., Admiral D., Addison H., and Mrs. C. Brown all of whom were present at the time of his demise. He is also survived by two sisters and eleven grandchildren.

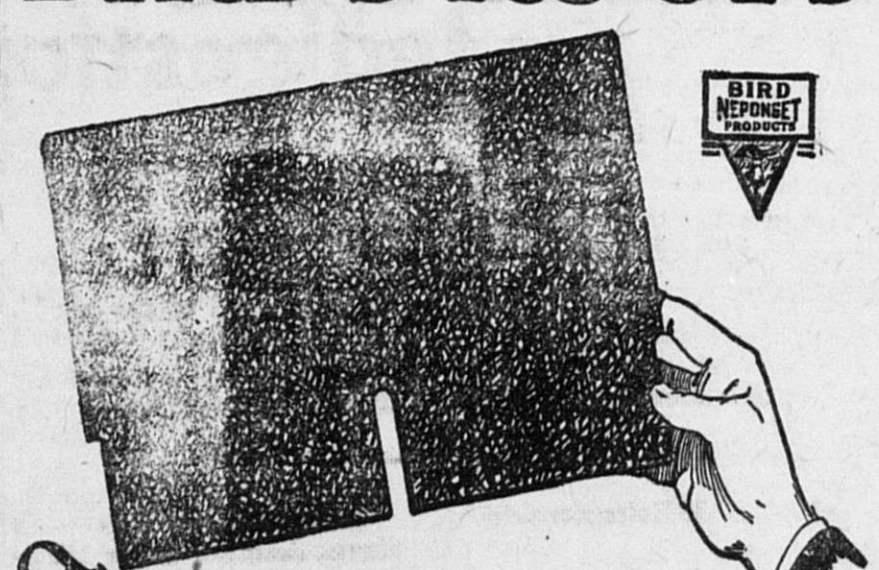
