MIELOCK ELECTED CHAIRMAN OF SUPERVISORS

John Mielock, supervisor of Alabaster township, was elected chairman of the board of supervisors at their meeting held Wednesday. Mr. Mielock succeeds Edward O. Putnam, of Plainfield township, chairman during the preceding year. Mr. Mielock, who has been supervisor for the past four years, is the youngest member of the board, a veteran of the World War and is one of the youngest men to have ever been elected chairman of that body in this county.

Wednesday's meeting was the first held by the new board elected April 4th. Thirteen of last year's members were re-elected. The new supervisors are Frank Brown of Baldwin township, Andrew Schaaf of Wilber township, Jas. Hull of Oscoda township, Edward Colbath of AuSable township, John Burt of Grant township and B. M. Long of Tawas City. B. M. Long is a veteran supervisor, having held a seat on the board for four successive terms prior to and including 1897. Several of the other new members have held seats on the board prior to this year. The fair sex is represented by Mrs. Anna Matthews, supervisor from AuSable City. Mrs. Matthews will represent that city this term in place of Bruce Lockhart, who was re-elected Mayor. She substituted last year as a member for Mayor Lockhart.

MAY MOVE U. S. CHEMICAL PLANT TO EAST TAWAS

The daily press of the state during the past few days have reported the formal proposal by Henry W. Berger which has been submitted to the War Department for the removal of the United States chemical arsenal from Edgeworth, Md., to East Tawas. The proposal to the department has been pending for some months.

One powerful argument in favor of the removal of the arsenal to an inland site is that its present location on the seacoast is extremely undesirable because subject to air raids in wartime. Furthermore the salt wells at East Tawas would make production of chemicals possible at a most of one twenty fifth of what the government can produce them at Edgewood. On this point Mr. Berger says:

"From a strategic standpoint Edgewood arsenal is improperly located, the plants are not being properly maintained, are deteriorating very fast, which will be a total loss within a few years; it is impossible to maintain these plants in an idle condition, even with an expenditure of a large amount of money and keep abreast of developments and improvements.

"None of the plants at Edgewood are capable of successful operation either in peace or war; the proposal submitted makes a large immediate saving to the government on its present investment, places the war department in constant control of an actually operating chemical warfare arsenal, and in the event of a major emergency will prevent unnecessary expenditure of perhaps thirty or forty million dollars. The location at East Tawas on the bay, is strategically satisfactory."

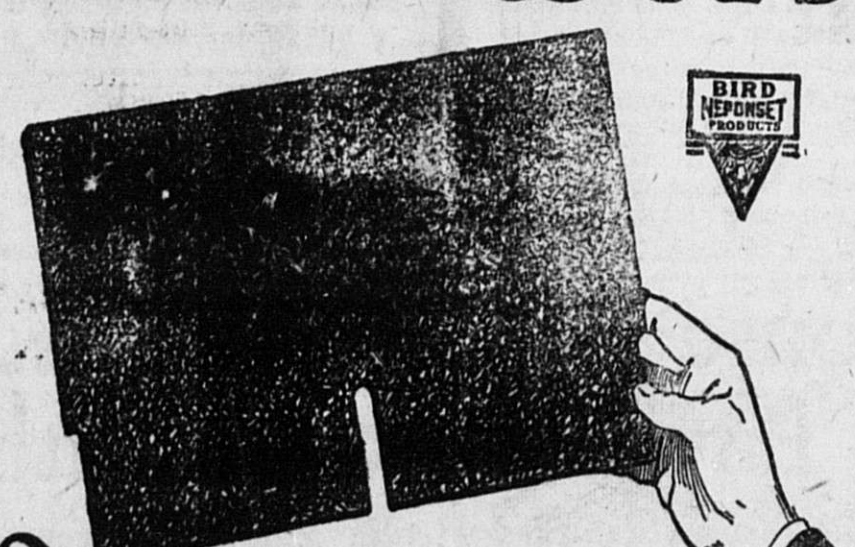

rights superior to that of the soldier may file their applications beginning at 9 o'clock a. m. May 14, 1927 and all applications received between the dates of May 14 and June 2, both dates inclusive, will be considered as filed simultaneously at 9 o'clock a. m. June 3 and conflicting applications by soldiers not otherwise in conflict will be disposed of by lot.

"Ex-soldiers should file certified copies of their certificates of discharge with their applications and persons claiming preference rights by settlement or otherwise should file affidavits supporting such claims attaching same to their applications. All applications must describe the land by legal subdivision, section, township and range numbers; must be executed before some officer qualified to administer oaths under the laws of the State of Michigan, and must be accompanied by a remittance of \$5.88 to cover filing fee and commission."

"Application forms and additional information may be obtained by addressing the commissioner of the General Land Office, Washington, D. C. where all applications must be filed."

"From information on file at this office it would appear that one Claude Salisbury has been claiming the land for a number of years."
